White Beans Are Higher.

White beans are Higner. With the east still a heavy buyer of white beans on the Pacific coast, the market both for small and large sizes is firmer and higher. While the bulk of the eastern demand is for large white owing to the fact that the trade there is accustomed to that fize, small white are feeling equal strength here. Pinks are weaker and lower but there has been a further substantial advance in limas.

Dressed Meats Very Weak.

All through the dressed meat trade a weaker tone is showing today. Quite a number of hogs were carried over from Saturday owing to the more lim-ited call even at shaded prices. A few dealers carried over a small number of veal but that portion of the trade is better than for swine. Mutton market is easy.

Sharp Loss in Grapes.

Front street handlers have lost considerable money on grape shipments within the past week owing to the greater offserings and the poorness of quality. Sales of overripe stock were made this morning as low as 40c a crate, these same grapes costing the seller \$1 earlier in the week.

Cheese, Prices Are Holding.

While showing practically no change in the higher limits, although several wholesale grocers are asking 15% o for flats in case lots, the cheese market is firmer. None are now offering fresh stock under 15% c a pound. Broken cases bring 170 generally for flats.

Orange Movement Better.

A much better movement of new crop oranges than expected is shown along Front street. Sales are generally re-ported at \$3.75 a box/ Some old crop Valencias are still offering in a nominal way.

Car Celery Arrives Today.

A car of celery from Los Angeles was reported in by the local trade this morning. Quality was good. Some local stock is still offering around 75@850 a dozer

Cranberries Very Scarce.

Cranberries continue very scarce along Front street, although a number of cars are already overdue from the east. Sales are generally reported at \$12 and \$12.50 per barrel.




