

### LOCAL MINISTERS JOIN MOVEMENT TO URGE TREATIES

#### Plans for Arbitration Between Great Countries to Be Made Subject of Sermons on Sunday, November 26.

Many ministers of Portland will join in the movement to arouse sentiment in favor of the arbitration treaties between the United States and Great Britain and the United States and France, which are now pending before the United States senate. The American peace and arbitration league of New York has designated November 26 as "Unity Sunday" and requests have been made of the preachers of all denominations in all parts of the nation to preach on that day in favor of the treaties and to hold special services to urge their ratification.

"The arbitration treaties between the United States and Great Britain and between this country and France, now pending in the United States senate, stand in grave danger of failure of ratification," says Madeline Black, chairman of the department of propaganda, in a letter to *The Journal*. "In the opinion of those who have given the subject much consideration, they represent the greatest step yet taken in the movement for peace, and the opposition is being negotiated by a few members of the foreign relations committee of the senate which has reported against them. "The president of the United States, the secretary of state, the federal administration and the clergy and press of the country are urging their ratification and that the people come to the support of the government. I have asked the clergy of every denomination to set aside November 26 as 'Unity Sunday,' on which day sermons will be preached throughout the country upon the subject of the treaties, and special services held to urge their ratification. The responses received to date have shown a willingness on the part of the clergy to cooperate far beyond our expectations."

The first part of the program will be the regular black face minstrel with songs and jokes of a local character. The second part will be an entirely new feature.

### SALT LAKE LINE IS AGAIN COMPLETED

#### New "High Line" Regarded as Stupendous Feat of Railroad Building.

A spike was driven in a tie out in southeastern Nevada Sunday, which marked the perfection of one of the most stupendous feats of railroad construction accomplished in recent years—the completion of the San Pedro, Los Angeles & Salt Lake railroad's new "High Line" through Meadow Valley.

The possibilities of the line were discovered years ago in the romantic days of the west, when Mormon settlers in Utah, drawn by the lure of the unknown and seeking an outlet to the Pacific seaboard struck out from Salt Lake City into the wilderness towards the sea. There was but one way to go. That way down the canyon since made famous by the Salt Lake route—the way of the Meadow Valley Wash, across Nevada, where in some bygone age, a kindly nature heaved a pass through the giant mountains of the Sage Brush state.

In 18 months 75 miles of modern railroad have been placed in commission; 75 miles of line, containing ten tunnels, totaling 6972 feet in length, and 24 bridges built of solid steel and installed

on gigantic concrete abutments and piers which are sunk to bedrock.

The old line crossed Meadow Valley creek 35 times, the new line but 24 times. Through its entire length the new line winds around the walls of the canyon, far above the encroachments of the stream. Whenever the necessity exists to cross the opposite wall or, by any chance the peculiar nature of the canyon seems likely to give the water added force, titanic bridges and concrete retaining walls are in place. For miles, huge granite boulders, hewed from solid mountains, line the embankment, a lining permanent as the hills themselves.

It was to save this stretch of mountain scenery for the eastern traveler that the officials of the Salt Lake company authorized the expenditure of \$5,000,000 more on a stretch of track which had already cost up \$7,000,000 in losses and repairs besides its original cost.

### Two Clam Canneries Go Up.

Aberdeen, Wash., Nov. 21.—Preparatory to resuming operations in clam canning, two new canneries are now being built at Copalis. One is near the site of the plant destroyed by fire a few months ago, and is being erected by Guy Halferty, one of the proprietors of the Sea Beach Packing works of this city. The other is being built by Messrs. Smith & Beatty, who have bought 20 acres from Charles Horn, upon which they are building. They plan to have it ready for use by spring.
