JIMMY CARROLL IS FIGHTING BIG MEN

Bantamweight Goes Out of His Class to Get Gotham Fights.

New York exchanges to hand carry an account of Jimmy Carroll's first bout in the east with a lightweight named Young Brown. Though Carroll is but a good sized bantam the New York scribers seem to have the idea that he is a lightweight. Young Brown is a legitimate lightweight and Carroll had to give away a lot of weight to him. Here's what one of the New York papers had to say of the Brown-Carroll combat:

"Jimmy Carroll, the California lightweight who arrived here a short time ago in the rear of a widely heralded reputation, did not create a favorable impression with the local fight fans in his initial bout with Young Brown, an east side boy, at the Fordon A. C. The local youngster earned the decision and earned it by a comfortable margin.

"In the opening round Carroll narrowly escaped a knockout when he collided with a hard left swing to the jaw that put him down for a count of seven. Thereafter the native son had a healthy respect for Brown's punches and assumed the defensive, which he maintained throughout nearly all succeeding rounds.

"The bout was a good one and full of action. Brown repeatedly winged in jolting left hooks and jabs, but they lacked steam, and while they staggered Carroll several times he was unable to make the victory a knockout one. In the fifth round Brown led for the stomach with a right, and when Carroll dropped his guard crossed a left to the jaw. The blow dazed the Californian, but he hung on and managed to weather the round.

"Carroll gained strength as the bout progressed, and toward the end did not hesitate to stand toe to toe and swap punches. Brown, however, had piled up a big lead, and at the finish there was no question as to the decision."

CHICAGO BANNER BASEBALL TOWN

Cubs Play to Greatest Number of Fans; Nationals Lead Americans.

The Chicago Cubs played to more people in the National league than any other club and even bettered the mark set by the Philadelphia Americans, who led the American league in attendance during the past season.

The Cubs played before 872,206 people and the Giants, who were second in the list, played before 835,602 fans. The St. Louis team played to 730,060 baseball people during the season.

Cincinnati was the poorest drawing card in the National league. Even the Boston team, which finished in the rear end of the race, drew better than Garry Herrmann's team.

In the American league the Athletics entertained 618,100 people and the New York Yankees were second in the list. The Cleveland club drew better than it did in the 1910 season, on account of playing Sunday baseball. Washington was the poorest drawing card of the American league.

Dolly Gray will not be with the Washington team next year, according to the latest report. Gray will likely go to the Rochester club of the Eastern league in a trade.

Ted Sullivan, the veteran manager and scout, is willing to organize a new league in western Canada and place a team in Winnipeg if the Canadian fans will help in the good work.

KIRBY PRESIDENT OF AMATEUR UNION

College Chairman Succeeds Everett Brown; Records Are Given Standing.

New York, Nov. 21.—Gustavus T. Kirby was elected president of the Amateur Athletic Union of the United States over George F. Pauling, president of the Middle Atlantic association. Kirby received 23 votes and Pauling received but six.

Kirby was chairman of the executive committee of the intercollegiate A. A. U. Kirby will succeed Everett Brown of Chicago as president of the A. A. U. The following vice presidents were elected: A. J. Lill, Boston; Dr. B. M. Hopkins, Baltimore; George James, San Francisco; J. J. O'Connor, St. Louis.

The all round championship for the 1911 season was awarded to F. G. Thompson of Princeton, who had 6769 points to his credit. J. W. Donahue of Los Angeles was given second place and E. Schobinger of Chicago was awarded third place.

DATES CHOSEN FOR LINK-HILL BATTLE

Exact Line Depends on Washington-Jefferson Game Next Thursday.

The Lincoln High school football eleven will likely meet the Hill Military team on Multnomah field December 2. This was practically settled at a conference held yesterday afternoon.

The Lincoln players promised to meet the Hill boys if they defeated the Washington school, but now want to postpone the game until after the Washington-Jefferson contest on Multnomah field next Thursday. That game will decide whether or not Lincoln must play the Jefferson team again for the championship.

Coach Rinehart of the Lincoln team does not want to run any risks of injuring his star players in the Hill game and then meet the Jefferson eleven, if necessary, with a weak team.

If Jefferson defeats the Washington team, Lincoln and Jefferson will probably play on Multnomah field December 1 and on December 9 Lincoln will tackle the Hill team. Otherwise the game will be played December 2.

The Jefferson and Washington High school football elevens will meet Thursday afternoon at 3:15 o'clock. Both teams began tapering off practice yesterday afternoon.

Coach East of the Washington team has two full squads out and is training the players on several new plays which will be used in the game Thursday afternoon.

Coach Smith of Jefferson is confident that his men will make a better showing against the Washington team than they did against the Lincoln eleven.

Reports from the Jefferson field indicate that the Jefferson team has improved its style of play a good deal and will be ready for a hard, rushing game Thursday afternoon.

GREGG AND SOMERS BICKER ON \$2000

Naps Offer Southpaw Contract for \$3000; McCredie Mixed on Trains.

Translated into figures, the difference existing between Vean Gregg, the sensational southpaw and the Cleveland Americans is \$2000. Vean's contract unsigned is reported in one of the pigeon holes in President Somers' desk in Cleveland. In the meantime the kingpin gunner is telling his friends in Portland of his hunting trip to the Rogue river with never a thought of the unsigned instrument that binds him to the Naps for another year.

Gregg wants \$5000 for his services next year. He knows he had a great year in the American league and he also knows that he is a drawing card. Vean has a reputation for getting pretty nearly what he goes after. In 1910 he held out entirely from the Naps and instead played with the Beavers. Last year he finally compromised with the big show club on \$2100 after being offered \$1800 and holding out for \$2400.

Somers added \$800 to Vean's contract when he offered it to him at the close of the American league season. Gregg refused to sign it. He wants \$6000 and says there will be no compromise this time.

Ryan, Steen and Peckinpah have not been tendered their contracts this year. It is likely that they will cash for \$1800, just as those of the preceding Beavers. Very likely there will be some more holding out. Buddy Ryan will want more than \$1800, and so will Bill Steen. They can earn more than that in the Coast league.
