The movement has proved, thinks the secretary, that intelligent enthusiasm for foreign missions is not a hindrance but a help to every other Christian activity. The spirit of Christian unity has had a phenomenal development. Great communions are now cooperating to a degree supposed to be impossible

Churches of Canada have increased from \$1,492,300 to \$3,216,000 annually in their combined home and foreign gifts. Taking United States and Canada together the increase of foreign missions alone has been from \$8,980,000 to \$13,350,000 annually, or a gain of about 50 per cent. In addition to this increase to current gifts, more than \$5,-000,000 have been raised during the past two years in special equipment or endowment for foreign work,
