

TWO BIG SHOVELS WILL DIG TUNNEL ON COOS BAY LINE

Contractors Rush Men and Machinery Through Eugene to Mountain Camp, Where Work Is Going On.

(Special to The Journal.)
Eugene, Or., Nov. 28.—Two steam shovels to be used by Twohy Bros. contractors on the Coos Bay railroad, arrived from Portland yesterday and are being hauled "knocked down" on wagons to the site of the big bore through the mountains west of Eugene. They will be used in excavating for the tunnel and in building the grade on the higher levels in the vicinity, although it is thought there will be little grading on the prairie between Eugene and the mountain, as most of the ground is low and during the rainy season it would be very difficult to work. Twohy Bros. have 100 or more men at work at the tunnel site, most of them clearing the right of way. Several men come in on each train from Portland and are at once sent to the "front." They are compelled to walk the entire distance from Eugene to the camp, which has recently been established near the tunnel. A model camp has been established there, and almost a small city has sprung up there during the past week.

Large shipments of supplies are being received by Twohy Bros., and they are being stored in a warehouse on the depot grounds. Offices have been established at the warehouse, and the contracting firm will make their headquarters there while operating from Eugene.

The contract was let yesterday to Labbe & Peterson to drill the holes for the bridge foundations on the banks of the various streams between Eugene and the tunnel site. They began work today with a drill operated by gasoline power. There will be 11 bridges this side of the tunnel. The first out of Eugene will be across Coyote creek, about seven miles from here, and the next one will be across Long Tom river. This stream will be crossed by the foundations for the bridges will be of cement and the excavations will vary in depth from 15 to 20 feet, according to the depth of the bedrock beneath the surface.

Several chimney and roof fires required the attention of the fire department last night. Shortly after 8 o'clock an alarm was turned in for a chimney fire at 511 North Twenty-fourth street. Later in the evening the roof of the Bungalow theatre caught fire from sparks from a nearby chimney, but this blaze was extinguished before the fire department arrived.

At 5 o'clock two alarms came in at the same time, one for a small blaze at 409 Shaver street and the other for 821 East Eleventh street. The home of E. A. Austin, at 358 Stanton street, was damaged slightly when the roof of his home caught fire. Many other false alarms were turned in.

FIRE IN TIMBER ON CORBET ESTATE DESTROYS CABINS

Fire broke out in the timber on the Corbett estate, which is located 18 miles east of Portland on the Base Line road, yesterday evening and raged throughout the night. A call for help was sent to Sheriff Stevens, and Deputy Sheriffs A. J. Salisbury and Jack Dolan were sent to the place to recruit fighters.

The fire was first noticed on the south side of the Base Line road to the west end of the timber tract. The strong east wind whipped this into a blaze that could not be controlled. Sparks carried the fire to the north side of the road and farther east. Before assistance could be given two cabins belonging to woodchoppers were destroyed. A cluster of cabins farther in the timber was the next to be destroyed.

When the deputy sheriffs arrived the woodcutters were trying to save the heavy timber by backfiring. This scheme checked the blaze and gave the fighters a chance to move the contents of several cabins.

The wind subsided at 10 o'clock, and the men were again able to check the heaviest part of the fire. Shortly before midnight the wind whipped strongly from the east, and drove the fire into slashings that burned like tinder. Several thousand posts were burned, and damage to the extent of \$5000 is estimated. The fire was under control this morning, and at noon was reported to be practically over.

ROADMASTER RUNS DOWN POLECAT; TOWN FOLKS RUN FROM HIM

INLAND EMPIRE CLUBS FORM A FEDERATION

Spokane, Wash., Nov. 28.—Representatives of organizations in Washington, Oregon, Idaho and Montana met in Spokane today formally to organize the Federation of Commercial Clubs of the Inland Empire.

The delegates were entertained at luncheon in the assembly hall of the chamber of commerce at noon, Edwin T. Coman, president of the chamber, presiding as chairman. Officials of outside organizations were the principal speakers. Three hundred members of the local organization attended the luncheon.

The Myrtle Order of Enakops, headed by W. S. McCrea, Imperial kopsan, has arranged a complimentary banquet for the delegates in the hall of the Doges tonight, beginning at 10 o'clock. There also will be banquets in honor of the princesses of the empire and official representatives of northwestern delegations.

The afternoon is being passed at the fourth national apple show and in witnessing the sham battle near the Monroe street bridge between seven companies of federal troops, under command of Lieutenant Colonel C. W. Penrose, U. S. A., commandant at Fort George Wright, and the fraternal orders' parade in connection with the Enakops night jubilee.

A special entertainment arranged for the visiting delegates is the coronation of King Pip and the initiation into the mysteries of the order of 75 mayors of inland Empire cities and towns. This ceremony will take place at 8:45 o'clock tonight.

DISCONTINUE WORK ON THE WIND RIVER PLANT

Stevenson, Wash., Nov. 28.—Work on the power site and plant of the Cleom-Tumwater Power company on Wind river has been suspended. Nothing more will be done until spring. Considerable progress has been made already, an excellent wagon road has been completed to the site and a substantial log dwelling house has been erected for occupancy by the workmen. The road is four and one half miles long.

In the meantime preparations have been made for utilizing the power. A franchise has been granted through Skamania county and a right of way has been obtained through Clarke county from the proposed plant to Vancouver. This line will run through Washougal, Camas and other towns along the North Bank line.

The site chosen by the company is considered by authorities to be by far the most admirable in the entire Pacific northwest. Not only is the power obtainable almost limitless, but the lay of the land, the topographical location and the continuous supply of water combine to make it a source of power unsurpassed.

RELIGION CRAZED, KILLS 10 WITH AX

Negress Confesses Crushing Heads of Those Who Did Not Obey "Orders."

Lafayette, La., Nov. 28.—Crazed with religion, Clementine Barnebat, an 18-year-old negress, confessed today to having crushed the heads of 10 victims, all negroes, with an ax, because they refused to obey "church orders, according to God's message."

The confession followed the killing last Sunday night of Robert Randall, his wife and his four children, all under 9 years of age. Last February, according to the Barnebat woman's remarkable statement, she assisted in the murder of four members of the Andrus family.

The murderess is believed to be insane.

GRAY, PINK, BLACK STONE IS QUARRIED

Bend Ships Seven Carloads for Redmond Depot From the Big Deposits.

Bend, Or., Nov. 28.—Seven carloads of pink and black stone to be used in the construction of the Redmond depot have been shipped from Bend the past week. This is about half enough material for the building. There is an unlimited quantity of this stone less than two miles from the railroad, and in addition to that being shipped out much is being used for local work. The depot here, which is being rapidly completed, is constructed out of this stone; J. I. West has just completed a two story stone business block and D. A. Boyd, of Seattle, is erecting another.

The stone is very light but firm and strong. It is found in gray, pink and black. The black is used mostly for trimming. The city of Redmond is paying \$2 a perch for the rock free on board cars here, and the Oregon Trunk hauls it free of charge.

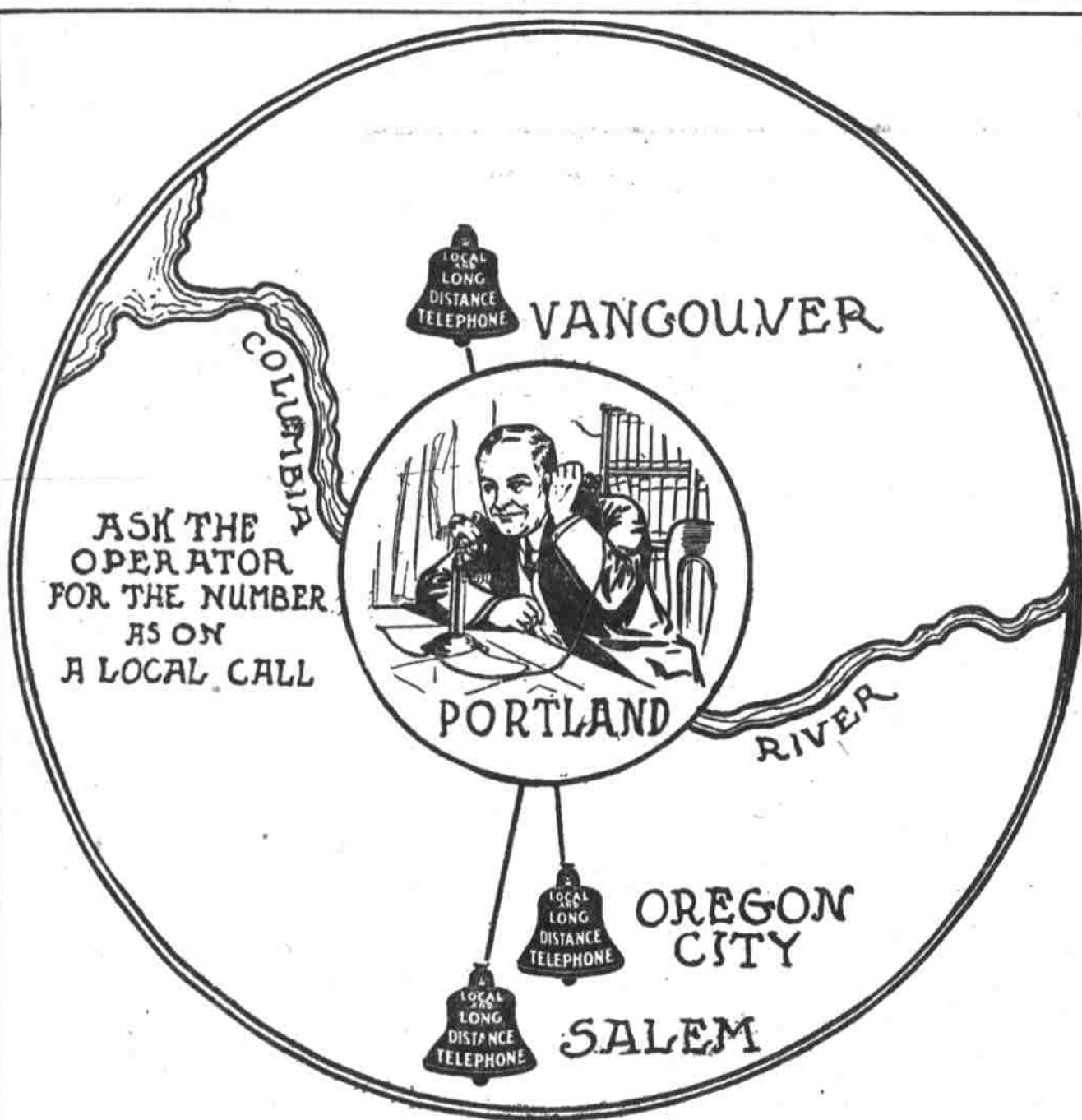
