



Shanghai, Dec. 7 .-- Republicans are not satisfied with the abdication of the regent, Prince Chun, uncle of the baby emperor, and they plan organization here of a provisional assembly Nanking will then be made the capital of the proclaimed republic, after which the rebel army now occupying that city will leave for its march against Pe-

king. Yuan Shi Kal, it is generally believed tere by republicans, will soon join the ebels. is the general impression that he is diplomatically weeding out the Manchus and bringing the throne nearer a complete fall than could be done by sacrifice of the whole army in the field. He is given credit for the abdication of Prince Chung.


