

BOISE BUSINESS MEN VISIT WEISER

Special Train Carries One Hundred to Opening of Model Hotel.

Ontario, Or., Dec. 12.—The Boise booster train, carrying 100 prominent business men and members of the Boise commercial club, on their way to Weiser to attend the opening of the new Weiser hotel, were guests of Ontario for one hour and a half, leaving here at 3 p. m. for Payette. The time spent here, was longer than the schedule called for. Many of the visitors expressed surprise at the great improvements since they last visited the business town in eastern Oregon, which recent railroad developments point to be the coming railroad center of this section.

The Boise delegation was met at the depot by a committee of prominent business men headed by President Blackaby and members of the Ontario commercial club and the Ontario commercial club band. They were given a demonstration of natural gas resources at the city well, when after the pump had been running for a few minutes a match was applied to the flowing water by Mayor Trow, when a flame shot up 10 feet and continued to burn for some time. They were shown through the new Moore hotel, which is to be opened to the public next month.

NO FURTHER BAIL IS REQUIRED IN BAIN CASE

Los Angeles, Dec. 12.—When Bert H. Franklin, chief investigator for the McNamara defense, charged with having bribed permanent juror Robert F. Bain, appeared for arraignment before Justice Young today, former Governor Gage, his attorney, asked that there be no fresh bail demanded for his client, as he is already under a \$10,000 cash bond for his appearance on a charge for attempted bribery of prospective juror George N. Lockwood. Justice Young allowed Franklin to go on his own recognizance in the Bain case.

No time was fixed at the arraignment for Franklin's trial on the present charge because Deputy District Attorney Ford, in charge of the Franklin case, desires to examine the text of a recent supreme court decision before going to trial with the case against Franklin.

This decision refers to one which prevents the conviction of a defendant on a felony charge on the unsupported evidence of an accomplice, which should apply to the case in hand, would upset the prosecution of Franklin on the present charge.

WHITE HOUSE DINNER OPENS SOCIAL SEASON

KING IS NOT GIVEN PEEP INTO HAREMS

Queen Mary Entertains High Caste Indian Woman, But George Is Barred.

Delhi, Dec. 12.—Though fatigued by yesterday's Durbar festivities there was little rest for King George and Queen Mary today. The announcement that his majesty has determined to show his appreciation of the reception tendered him at Delhi by displacing the government seat at Calcutta and changing its location to Delhi is received with great acclaim.

In the afternoon there was a garden party in the grounds of the fort for big personages and the general subject discussed was the wonders of yesterday. King George's liberal money gift and pardon for political prisoners and the proposed shift of the government seat were the topics. The party was unique in that the native potentates do not as a rule look favorably upon this form of entertainment for women. Today, however, there was a big muster of high caste Purdah ladies. The king did not get a peep at them, but Queen Mary made herself agreeable to the harem beauties.

For the common people there was a fête in the great open space known as Belak, below the walls of the fort. Here the governor of the Punjab, Sir Louis Bland, presided over the arrangements for feeding and amusing a vast multitude, representing not only the native population of Delhi but the countryside for miles around.

OFFICIALS SAY ROAD IN CANYON IS CERTAIN

Ontario, Or., Dec. 12.—A special train bearing the general manager and other Oregon Short Line officials from Salt Lake, on their inspection of the depots along the line visited Ontario today and confirmed the report that the contract for construction of 176 miles of the Oregon & Eastern through the Malheur canyon, had been awarded to the Utah Construction company and that work will commence at once. The first construction is to be on rock work and

tunneling in the roughest part of the canyon, as this work can be done during winter months. By early spring all the teams that can possibly be used will be rushed into the canyon and the work pushed to completion.
