

TIMES DYNAMITE CASES NOT ENDED; S. F. MAN ACCUSED

Assistant District Attorney Ford Says Bay City Labor Leader to Be Arrested as "Directly Responsible."

(United Press Leased Wire.) Los Angeles, Dec. 13.—The Times dynamite case is not to end with the sentencing to San Quentin penitentiary of James J. and John B. McNamara. This much was made plain here this afternoon when Assistant District Attorney Ford positively announced that a prominent San Francisco labor leader, who has not been heard from since he left New York for the Pacific coast, after the Atlanta convention, would be arrested and vigorously prosecuted for the part he is alleged to have played in the dynamiting of the Times building.

"This man," said Ford, "is directly responsible for the loss of 31 lives in the blowing up of the Times building. We know that John J. McNamara sent Jim out here with the understanding that he was to do the work required of him by this San Francisco labor leader, and it was this man who ordered Jim McNamara to dynamite the Times building."

"Although this man is supposed to have disappeared, we know where he is, and when the proper time comes he will be arrested. He is being shadowed night and day and cannot escape."

"John McNamara did not know when Jim was sent out here that the Times building was to be destroyed, and Jim did not know it, either."

"This man was in Los Angeles at the time of the explosion and we will convict him when the case comes to trial."

RATE ON MT. CALVARY LINE ANGRERS PATRONS

Action of the Portland Railway, Light & Power company, in putting into effect a change in the fare charged on the Mount Calvary extension has aroused the wrath of the people served by the line. Until a few days ago the company charged a 5-cent fare to the city limits. The fare is now 5 cents to Shoshone avenue, a mile within the city limits. An additional 5 cents is charged beyond Shoshone avenue whether the distance traversed is one block or to the terminus of the line. The franchise granted the United Railways provides that only a maximum of 10 cents can be charged for a fare to Mount Calvary.

"The Portland Railway, Light & Power company has jurisdiction over only that portion of the line extending to Shoshone avenue," said Vice President Fuller of the company yesterday. "We charge a fare of 5 cents to that point, and the United Railways pays for the operation of the cars beyond there and receives all the fares."

"The United Railways' line beyond Shoshone avenue is not covered by the franchise. It being laid through a private right of way."

STOLEN GOODS FOUND HIDDEN UNDER TREE

In the discovery by John Webber of Macadam and Miles streets, of a sack concealed under a tree in the gulch near Riverview cemetery, a large quantity of jewelry that has been reported stolen from various residences and apartment houses in the city has been returned to the owners. An investigation is being made in the neighborhood of where the things were found to determine if there has been a "hoax" camp or shack where the thief might have slept. Mrs. C. T. Travis of the North Hampton this morning called at police headquarters and claimed a watch, two bracelets and several other valuables.

\$58,000 CREMATORY BONDS AWARDED

Council Paves Way so Mayor Can Take Over New Plant on Lake.

By awarding \$58,000 of crematory bonds to Mayor Rushlight this morning, the city council made possible the taking over of the Guild Lake incinerator, which will be up before the health board for final acceptance Friday next. The mayor bid for the city. The purchase price of the bonds will be taken out of the sinking fund.

The council awarded the contract for the improvement of Sandy boulevard, from East Twenty-eighth street to Laurelhurst, to the Oregon Independent Paving company, the lowest bidder for the work. The contract for the improvement of the boulevard from Laurelhurst to East Eighty-second street, was awarded to the same company. Asphalt will be the pavement laid.

Public improvement bonds to the amount of \$448,148.48 were awarded by the council. The premiums ranged from 2.51 per cent to 3 per cent. The council disallowed the claims of owners of the launch Dix and steamer Brown for damages sustained in collision with a broken pier in the Willamette river.

An ordinance vacating certain streets in Mount Taber Park for park purposes was passed unanimously. Sixteen time and manner ordinances and 28 improvement assessment ordinances were passed by the council.

2 MISSING WITNESSES WORRY GOVERNMENT

(United Press Leased Wire.) San Francisco, Dec. 13.—The whereabouts of Olaf A. Trivette, president of the San Francisco Labor council, and Anton Johansson, a fellow official, continues to puzzle the federal authorities. Nothing has been heard from Trivette since he left New York for the Pacific coast after attending the convention of the American Federation of Labor at Atlanta, Ga. It is alleged that he was closer to the McNamara than any of the other labor leaders in this section. Trivette, Johansson and Mrs. David Caplan are the only witnesses of the 134 wanted who have not been located. Subenas have been served on the others.

CONSTRUCTION COMPANY SUES CITY FOR \$29,477

A suit to recover \$29,477 from the city as the balance due on the Hawthorne avenue bridge has been started in the circuit court by the United Engineering & Construction company. Of this amount, \$25,677 is for extras, and \$3740 the amount due on the contract.

GRAND JURY TAKES UP GARRARD CASE

The grand jury this morning took up the case against A. J. Garrard, a crookery salesman, charged with a statutory offense against Beale Wood, a 17-year-old girl. The girl, who was before the jury for an hour, told her story. Garrard was given an opportunity to tell his side of the case. He was in the jury room only a short time.

According to the story told by the girl, she was introduced to Garrard by an elderly woman going under the name of Wallace. Garrard then took the girl to lunch, and later induced her to go to his apartments, where wine flowed freely. The girl says she became drunk, and Garrard kept her in his room over Thanksgiving. She also tells of a ride to Clatsop street, where they were served with liquor.

Frank Leith, proprietor of the tavern, and Charles Anderson and J. J. Delout, employees at the tavern, were arrested yesterday by Constable Weinberger for serving the girl with liquor. They were arraigned in the justice court and released upon bail of \$1000. The girl identified the men as the persons serving her with liquor. The men each deny seeing the girl.

BUCK SHARPE MAY TAKE OAKLAND MANAGERSHIP

New York, Dec. 13.—Representatives of the American association and International and Pacific Coast leagues met this afternoon with the national league mission for the purpose of holding a general business session. It was announced that Buck Sharpe, formerly first baseman for the Pittsburgh Pirates and later manager of the Buffalo team, has been formally appointed to manage the Oakland Coast league team, to succeed Manager Harry Wolverton.

DECLARES TRAFFIC MUST ROLL DOWN HILL TO PORTLAND

Charles W. Stanford, Chief Engineer of New York, Praises Harbor Conditions—Board Meets Realty Men.

"Portland has the most wonderful water grade connecting between her harbor and her vast tributary territory of any city I know," declared Charles W. Stanford, chief engineer of the New York department of docks and ferries, after listening to an explanation of traffic movements given by the harbor board and dock commission by Carl H. Gray, president of the Hill system in Oregon.

"No matter where the traffic starts, it can almost roll down hill to Portland," continued Mr. Stanford. "Such a natural situation coupled with the aggressive, peculiarly Oregon, enterprise in going ahead in development will unfailingly make the Portland harbor important to a degree that cannot now be estimated."

The other two members of the harbor board, W. J. Barney, second deputy commissioner of the New York department of docks, and E. F. Goodrich, consulting engineer of the New York board of estimates, were as enthusiastic as Mr. Stanford.

"We saw the possibilities of this harbor almost as soon as we came to Portland," said Mr. Goodrich. "Since that time we have been occupying ourselves with details. Portland people will realize soon that the value of public docks for the city and for the development of the territory tributary to the city is incalculable."

"I expect, in fact," said Mr. Barney, "that the value of public docks in development of the wonderful Portland harbor and in caring for the commerce that will inevitably be ready to come to the city after the opening of the Panama canal will be placed beyond question."

"I am greatly taken with Portland, too—almost ready to send out for family and goods and locate."

"Mrs. Goodrich has already said she wants to stay here," said Mr. Goodrich. "We are particularly pleased with the courtesy shown us by the members of the dock commission. It is the most gratifying and helpful I have ever experienced."

The conference with Mr. Gray this morning was of a private character.

He is understood to have told dock experts that the opening of the Panama canal will change traffic movements, and make the business of carrying merchandise and imports from the coast inland of high importance. Mr. Gray added that the Hill lines have dredged the channel from the Columbia slough to their water front property at Burlington, and are getting ready for extensive improvements.

At 9 o'clock this morning the harbor board and the dock commission met with President Samuel Meers and Consulting Engineer J. B. C. Lockwood of the Port of Portland. Questions concerning the cost of dredging, the nature and price of material for fills and whether the Port of Portland would dredge in front of municipally owned docks, were asked. The representatives of the port commission said that it was a policy to dredge only in front of those docks that had bulkheads.

At 11 o'clock this morning a meeting was held with the real estate men. President W. H. Chapin of the Realty board, H. W. Fries, H. P. Palmer, J. O. Rountree and others answered questions as to water valuations.

It was established that the average valuation put upon waterfront holdings is in the neighborhood of \$1500 a front foot.

Ralph W. Hoyt appeared before the board and commission, saying that he has a waterfront property near the Willamette Iron & Steel Works, and asking how he might improve the property to conform to the general harbor plan after the present lease expires two years from date.

An informal meeting will be held this afternoon with a select committee. The harbor engineer will go to Seattle tonight and spend tomorrow looking over conditions at the competitive port. They will have a public meeting with representatives of east side civic organizations Friday at 2:30 p. m. in the Chamber of Commerce.

WOULD TELL JURY OF WHIPPING OF DAUGHTER

Mr. and Mrs. G. G. Shadinger today asked permission to go before the grand jury and tell of the way Miss Elizabeth Speight, a school teacher, is alleged to have whipped her daughter. A question was raised this morning over the right to again subject the teacher to another charge, which question will be settled by submitting it to the presiding judge of the circuit court.

SCHMITZ CASE MAY COME TO A CLIMAX ON NEXT SATURDAY

Bay City's Former Mayor Now Ready for Trial—Attorneys Seek to Have Charges Dismissed.

(United Press Leased Wire.) San Francisco, Dec. 13.—The long drawn out case against Eugene H. Schmitz, former mayor of San Francisco, charged with receiving a bribe of \$60,000 from the street railways and a portion of \$20,000 from the gas company, will be brought to a conclusion on Saturday, according to the announcement from the office of the district attorney today. They will be pressed to trial at once or dismissed. Attorneys for Schmitz one week ago served notification in court that they intended to take advantage of a clause in the law providing that a defendant must have trial within sixty days if he so desires.

This is the first time in nearly four years that they have announced themselves ready for trial, and they evidently intend to force an issue in an attempt to have the charges against Schmitz dropped, as in the case of the other defendants.

The district attorney's office asked for a week's continuance at that time and today in Judge Laviar's court they requested a further continuance until Saturday in order to determine what to do.

The charges against Schmitz are divided into two groups, the gas and trolley cases, and embrace 14 counts each. In case trial is had, it is probable that Abraham Buet, former boss, will be brought from San Quentin prison to testify.

PREACHER-EDITOR WILL USE TEXT IN EACH ITEM

(Salem Bureau of The Journal.) Salem, Or., Dec. 13.—Every story beginning with a quotation from the Bible and a streamer headline "Blessed are the Pure in Heart for they shall see God" are to be some of the features of the Salem morning paper which is to be edited by Rev. E. E. Viollita, Christian evangelist holding meetings here. The minister took charge of the city editor's desk when work began this afternoon and City Editor Lockhart will preach at the revival services tonight. The newspaper man has not announced his text.

LONG WAR IN TRIPOLI STIRS ITALIAN WORKERS

(United Press Leased Wire.) Vienna, Dec. 13.—There is a steadily growing unrest among the Italian working classes over the unexpected length and difficulties of the Italian campaign in Tripoli, according to arrivals here from Italy. Censorship allows no mention of dissatisfaction to be sent out by correspondents. The press campaign against Austria and Germany continues in the Italian papers.

CHANGE ELIMINATES INFANTRY FROM O. N. G.

Without formal discussion other than the reading of a short resolution by Captain L. A. Bowman, the general staff of the Oregon National Guard recommended by unanimous vote yesterday afternoon that the Third regiment of infantry, O. N. G., be disbanded January 1. In event the governor follows the advice of the general staff in this instance, what is now the Third regiment will after the first of the year, be eight independent military companies, each under the direct control of a captain, and the state will be without a regiment of infantry in its National Guard.

The immediate effect of such action will be that the field and staff officers of the regiment will be without official military position. Those affected will be Colonel Dunbar, Lieutenant Colonel Peckman, Major Wilson, and Settlementer and four staff officers.

That the regimental will be reorganized, in the event of its disbandment, immediately after January 1, is known to be the intention of the general staff, but with the new organization will appear several new faces in the line and staff. It has been known for some time that some of the captains are dissatisfied with the present field officers and it was said today by those in close touch with National Guard affairs that a complete new set of line officers will probably be named by the captain. However, Colonel Dunbar, who is popular with the captains, may be honored with a reelection.

The regimental staff, who receive their appointments at the hands of the colonel, in case some other than Colonel Dunbar is put at the head of the regiment, will probably be entirely reorganized.

RED FATHER-IN-LAW INTERFERES; SHOT

Abe Logan Protests Against Alleged Ill-Treatment of Daughter; May Die.

(Special to The Journal.) Newport, Or., Dec. 13.—Word has just been received here that Abe Logan, an Indian on the Siletz reservation, was seriously if not fatally injured Sunday in a shooting scrape at the mouth of the Siletz. Duncan, an Indian, in search of the agency physician, Dr. Clausius, who was at Newport, brought in particulars.

Logan is said to have gone to the cabin of Ed Chase, have charged him with mistreating his wife, who is Logan's daughter; to have drawn a knife and despite his daughter's protestations that she was not ill treated, threatened to "cut Chase's heart out." Chase drove him out with a gun and chased him down the beach, shooting him in the breast when he turned.

The bullet lodged underneath the shoulder and last reports show Logan's condition is serious. Word has been received from Toledo that Chase came in and gave himself up to Sheriff Geer this afternoon.
