

FAMOUS ACTRESS DEAD AT RIPE AGE

Miss Rose Eytinge, Old Time Favorite, Lived Several Years in Portland.

New York, Dec. 21.—Rose Eytinge, aged 72 years, once leading woman of the Wallack Stock company and well known as a writer and dramatist, died yesterday at the Burnside home, Amityville, L. I. The career of Miss Eytinge was of peculiar brilliance, she at one time being among the most famous actresses of the country.

Eleven years ago Miss Eytinge retired from the stage, having reached an age far beyond the allotted time given actresses by custom and precedent. Even after retiring she appeared for a season—1907—in the production of "The Bishop's Carriage."

Rose Eytinge went on the stage at the age of 10 in children's plays, and became a great favorite about 1860. She appeared in support of Edwin Booth in 1862.

In the season of 1868-69 Miss Eytinge was the leading woman at Wallack's theatre. In 1871 she made a great hit as Nancy Sykes in "Oliver Twist." In 1873 she became the leading woman of A. M. Palmer's Union Square stock company, remaining in that position three seasons. Subsequently she starred in "Rose Michel," "Miss Moulton" and "Love's Sacrifice."

As an author Miss Eytinge wrote a number of books. For a number of years she taught stage work.

Following the death of her son several years ago Miss Eytinge came to Portland and lived in retirement among new scenes and new friends. Death took her children in her declining years and she shock nearly broke her brilliant mind. About three years ago she went to New York and since that time had been cared for by the Actors' Fund of America. During recent years Miss Eytinge had been an invalid, paralysis fast eating up the waning vitality.

Miss Eytinge was a woman of wonderful brilliancy, courage and independence. Her stage career she accumulated three fortunes and lost each in turn. A woman of open hearted benevolence, she was wont to give without stint, and at the same time many of her business arrangements were turned to her disadvantage. It is said that when Paul, the well known New York manager, gave Miss Eytinge credit with being the most remarkable woman given the world by the American stage.

As a traveler Miss Eytinge was among the foremost of the country. She had friends all over the world, where stage superiority is recognized.

opinion that he who knowingly files a fraudulent petition is no less morally culpable than he who traffics in counterfeit money.

"Hercules, upon beholding the accumulated fifth of years, took drastic measures to avenge the Augustan stables. And the court is of opinion that the defendant, upon learning of the mutilated and disarranged condition of the petition, will positive evidence of irregularity as to the form of the same, might well have refused to file them, thereby throwing the burden of proof of the legality of the petitions upon the parties at fault, by mandamus proceedings as provided in statute.

ant issues, not only as they affect the particular case under consideration, but as they affect the public at large. The case is not one involving merely the private rights of nominal parties to suit, but they are essentially public matters which affect the welfare of the whole body politic. The 26th legislative assembly of this state passed house bill 210, being an act appropriating \$328,250.92 for the support of the state university of this state. Within 90 days from adjournment of the legislative assembly, a petition was filed with the secretary of state, demanding reference of this measure to a vote of the electorate of this state at the general election. If the petition is a valid exercise of right reserved by section 1 of article 4 of the constitution, then the act does not become operative from and after the expiration of 90 days after the adjournment of the session, but it is stayed and must be submitted to a vote of the people, as demanded by the petition. But if it is not a valid petition, it cannot have that power against the measure and the latter becomes law.

Judge Galloway also settles the whole matter of jurisdiction argued so vehemently by Colonel C. E. S. Wood, by quoting this law:

The Law on Jurisdiction.
"If the secretary of state shall refuse to accept and file any petition for the initiative or referendum, any citizen may apply within 10 days after such refusal to the circuit court for a writ of mandamus to compel him to do so. On showing that any petition filed is legally insufficient, the court may enjoin the secretary of state and all the other officers from certifying or printing on the official ballot for the ensuing election the ballot title and number of such measure."

On the point of the alleged improper form of the petition, in that a copy of the measure was not printed at the head of each sheet, Judge Galloway, among other things, quotes the Oregon supreme court in Palmer versus Benson: "Evidently the petition must be on every sheet on which signatures are to be placed, but the act will be on a separate sheet, etc."

Duties of Circulators.

Judge Galloway also holds that circulators of initiative and referendum petitions have all the responsibilities of election officials when he says: "If, as usually happens, a number of persons joined in the same petition, each one and each of the latter committed frauds in preparation of the petition, those who signed it must bear the consequences at least to the extent of the right to have their names counted thereon. For, in case of an election where the people select election officers, and they disregard their duty and aid in committing frauds on election, voters must be responsible for the conduct of officers to the extent of losing their votes, although they may be innocent of fraud."

"The right of petition reserved by the constitution to refer to a vote of the people any measure passed by the legislature, was not intended to be used to settle or adjust private and local grievances, but the measure contemplates the right to express the honest sentiment of disaffected voters upon public matters only. The evidence in this case disclosed that the petition originated in a case of local neighborhood contention and spite and that in carrying into effect this unworthy motive, money was obtained by the petitioners upon a money basis and to further a personal spite and revenge by a committee of Cottage Grove citizens."

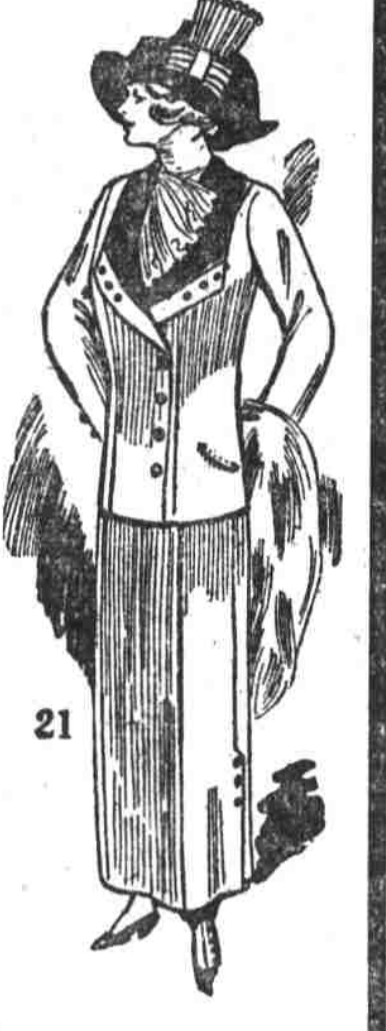

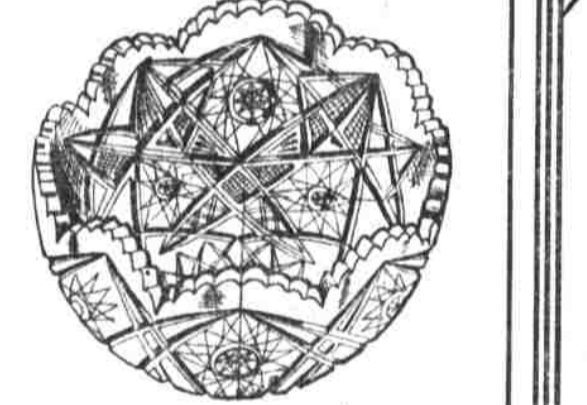
