

'UP TO GOMPERS TO BRING OUT TRUTH,' SAYS FREDERICKS

District Attorney Asserts That Leader Can Unseal Lips of John J. McNamara; Public Request Means Nothing.

Los Angeles, Jan. 2.—Before leaving for Indianapolis Saturday to assist in the federal dynamite investigation, District Attorney John B. Fredericks, according to a local morning publication, declared that it was up to Samuel Gompers, president of the American Federation of Labor, to unseal the lips of John J. McNamara. In the course of the interview, Fredericks is quoted as saying:

"It is up to organized labor to clean house if it wishes to retain the respect of the world. If Gompers does not know of the cancer that exists in labor unionism, let him appeal to John J. McNamara in the way he best knows how to unseal his lips and disclose the extent and ramifications of the disease in order that it may be rooted out for all time."

"A mere superficial public request from Gompers to McNamara in San Quentin prison means nothing. Labor unionism cannot rise or continue to succeed unless it is made apparent to the great mass of American people, who believe in justice and law, that these men are for once and for all cast out."

"The question uppermost in the minds of thinking men is, 'What is labor going to do about it?' John McNamara's lips must be unsealed in order that the disease may be rooted out for all time. It is no more possible that unionism can go on to its ultimate and proper destiny in the affairs of the nation and carry this condition even if it is concealed, than it is for an individual to do a man's work with a cancer sapping his strength, destroying his vitality and weakening his energy. Samuel Gompers, as head of the American Federation of Labor, it is up to you to do your part. Will you do it?"

JURY HOLDS LEWIS FOR CHILD'S DEATH

Compromise Verdict Reached After 50 Hours in Case of Step-Uncle.

Groville, Cal., Jan. 2.—Juror Lewis, charged with having murdered Helen Rumball, his step-niece, is today convicted of manslaughter, after the jury had deliberated 50 hours. He will be sentenced Thursday. It was a compromise verdict, eight of the jurors wanting to convict him of first degree murder and four holding out for acquittal.

Mrs. Rumball, the child victim's step-mother, who was jointly indicted with Lewis, will be placed on trial January 22. Little Helen Rumball's body was found bound to the studding in the attic of her home, her neck broken in two places.

NO FRIEND STANDS BY GRAVE OF JUDGE YODER, ONCE POPULAR LAWYER

Centerville, Wash., Jan. 2.—The funeral of Judge Moses Yoder, one of the most prominent attorneys of Chehalis, who died at the asylum at Steilacoom Sunday, was held in Chehalis yesterday afternoon. At one time, surrounded by wealth and friends, the aged lawyer sank lower and lower through his addiction to drink, and not a person was at the graveside to mourn. The old man's death, Yoder was found in his bed in Chehalis in a ravine and half starved condition, and after being examined by a sanitary commission, was sentenced to Steilacoom.

UNCLE SAM'S PAPER GETS SUBSCRIBERS

Demand for Daily Congressional Record Is Rapidly Increasing.

Washington, Jan. 2.—With the close of the year near at hand and everybody taking stock of the business done in 1911, it is gratifying to be able to state that the circulation of Uncle Sam's newspaper, the daily Congressional Record, is growing.

Members of congress are noticing an increased demand for the publication in question. This does not appear to be because the Congressional Record is any more ably edited than it used to be or because it is any more of a yellow journal than it used to be. The true explanation seems to be that the country is bent on keeping a little closer eye on congress and finding out what the national legislative body is getting paid for.

It is stated by members that there is an increasing demand for the Record from farmers and workmen. It used to be that only a few folks in a congressional district took the Record. Even libraries used to be careless whether they got it or not. But nowadays it is different. The farmers are reading more about congress and so are the working people. Whereas members used to find that they had few requests for the Record, they get plenty of them now. The chief class that used to take the Record was the lawyers. One of the reasons attributed for the growth of circulation of the Record is the establishment of rural free delivery. Another is to growing intelligence of the public on political and legislative matters.

SLAIN MARSHAL HAD GOOD RECORD

Had Lived in Lakeview Twenty Years; Murderer Newcomer and Former Convict.

Lakeview, Or., Jan. 2.—Details of the New Year's eve tragedy that shocked the entire community and resulted in the death of City Marshal Ernest M. Brown and Bertram L. Taylor, were as follows:

Marshal Brown had just arrived home, a few doors from the scene of the tragedy when he received a call to go to the Taylor home in the house owned by William Bernard on Western avenue. Gathered around the table was his family, expecting to enjoy its evening meal. Saying he would be back soon the city marshal left and just as he was about to place a younger brother of Taylor into the kitchen of the house, the crazed man shouted to his brother to step to one side. As he did so Taylor fired two shots into the officer, who was appearing out of the darkness into the light of the open door.

The victim uttered a groan and turned to leave the premises. When he had gone about 30 feet he fell dead.

The wife and brother of the murderer witnessed the crime, but were powerless to prevent it. Just as Taylor committed suicide his wife grabbed her baby and made her escape from the room, leaving another child sick in bed. Shouting to a neighbor he asked him to get the remaining child and then they were all taken to a neighboring house.

Marshal Had Good Record.
No man who has held the office of city marshal here has been better liked or more respected by every one than Brown. Having resided 20 years in Lakeview, he had won high regard and nearly every home in town feels it has sustained personal loss. He was 52 years old, a member of the A. O. U. W. and Foresters lodges and had been secretary of the Lakeview Water company for some years. He leaves a widow and one child.

Taylor was a newcomer here, having arrived by wagon from Kennewick, Wash. with his wife, brother and two children on November 9. Both men had been busy at odd jobs around town since

then. Taylor had worked yesterday at putting a job for a local firm, returning in the evening to his home and starting the trouble that resulted so disastrously.

Taylor Once a Horse Thief.
At the coroner's inquest the widow of the murderer testified that she had married him in Baker county, where the parents of both reside, about five years ago, and that previously to her meeting him he had served a term in Walla Walla penitentiary for stealing horses, though she stated that he had not committed any crimes since.

The family is in almost destitute circumstances and many here have subscribed small amounts of money for their assistance.

ALPHABET TO CUT WRITING IN HALF

University of Michigan Professor Chops Nine Characters From List.

Chicago, Jan. 2.—A new alphabet that will save time, give more space to the letter writer and by which thoughts are to be expressed direct without waste is proposed today by Professor Fred

Kewton Scott, of the University of Michigan. The new alphabet is designed to meet the needs of modern scientific management and has the approval of type manufacturers and typewriter houses. It will reduce the present alphabet by nine characters and do away with many cumbersome combinations.

Professor Scott explained his scheme, saying that certain perpendicular strokes and stems would be used to denote consonants, while a dash or broken circle would represent vowels. The system resembles shorthand.

Such a change in our alphabet would be a hundred fold more beneficial than simplified spelling, according to Professor Scott, who added: "Writing would take but half the time it does now, and no more would the eyes of the tired business man avert before the long words and rambling sentences that now confront him."

3 DAY TYPHOON TOSSES NORWEGIAN STEAMER
