

HEADS OF EASTERN STATES ARE ASKED TO VISIT OREGON

Governor West, Passenger on Recent Governors' Special, Issues Return Invitation in an Eloquent Strain.

(Salem Bureau of The Journal.)
Salem, Or., Jan. 12.—With a view to getting the heads of all the states east of the Rocky mountains to join in a grand governors' special, to visit the Pacific coast states, Governor West today addressed a letter to each chief executive east of the Rockies, inviting him to see the wonders of Oregon and to take further note of the greatness of the west by swinging through Washington, Montana, California, Nevada, Arizona, Utah, etc. Other important and far reaching developments in the plan will follow as eastern and southern governors respond to the invitation from West and other governors. Governor West in the letter to his fellow executives of the east, middle west and south, says:

"During the recent past, in common with others aboard the Governors' special, I was the fortunate recipient of the splendid hospitality of the executives and people of the east and south. Our visit with you brought on us still more intimate realization of the magnitude of your interests and activities and bound us yet closer to you in our mutual desire to aid in every way in our power in the upbuilding and advancement of our nation.

"Realizing that still closer acquaintanceship will bring reciprocal benefit to all, as governor of Oregon, I wish to extend to you and to the executives of other eastern and southern states, on behalf of the people of the state of Oregon, a cordial invitation to visit the west.

"We of this vast western empire would cherish the honor of leading you through the living panorama of our magnificent country, with its waiting acres of fertile soil, its varied and healthful climate, its unsurpassed scenery and its boundless and unmeasured opportunities.

"If the wonderland of Oregon does not satisfy your appetites, we can warm you with the ever falling sunsets of southern California, and rest your eyes with the cold majesty of Shasta; we can lull you to rest with the whisperings of the evergreen forests of Washington; in Idaho and Wyoming we can teach you how to transform the desert into a garden; in Montana we can show you thousands of cattle upon a thousand hills, and leading you beneath them, point to the treasure houses of nature; in Nevada we can lead you, literally, over golden sands; in the Dakotas and in Minnesota we can show you the fields from which the granaries of the nation are stored. We can show you the wonders of the grand canyon of the Colorado and take you up the Columbia to where the mystic bridge of the gods has been replaced by the twentieth century work of man. We can show you the beauties of the Yosemite and of Crater Lake, we can lead you, literally, at unmeasured depths beneath the surface. We can show you the wonders of

the Yellowstone and of Glacier Park and explore with you the rugged fastnesses of the mountains where the silent snow peaks stand sentinel over the children of the forest and streams.

"We of Oregon reach out from the shores of the Pacific the hand of western hospitality, and trust you may be our guests."

CAPTAIN HAS SEEN ALL LEADING CITIES; PORTLAND IS CHARM

"It may seem a little strong for a foreigner to say that there are but two cities in the world that appeal to me—one Moscow, the other Portland. But this is the way I feel about it," said Captain John Leader, formerly a captain in the British army, but now an executive rancher at Nicola, B. C., at the Imperial last evening.

"Somehow I love the very air in Portland. I feel at home here more than in my own country, and some day I shall make my home here. It is a wonderful city. I brought my wife down to see Portland so that she may get a look at her future home. 'I have seen every city of prominence in the world,' continued Captain Leader, 'but Portland has me captivated. Within 10 years New York will be only slightly ahead of Portland in greatness in my opinion. This may sound strong, also, but I am firm in that belief.'

Captain Leader operates one of the greatest stock ranches in British Columbia. He is typically English, and carries a cane. Whenever it rains, he immediately goes upon the streets to get a taste of pure dampness, he says.

The fame of Portland's rose carnival has spread to British Columbia, says Captain Leader, and as the "Rose City," Portland is known to everybody.

DEMOCRATS DESERT HOUSE PROGRESSIVES

Washington, Jan. 12.—The Democrats in the house yesterday afternoon broke their voting compact with the progressives and voted with the standpatners in electing Congressman Campbell of Kansas to the vacancy on the rules committee caused by the death of Congressman Madison, also of Kansas. Campbell is a standpat Republican. Congressman Norris of Nebraska nominated Victor Murdock of Kansas for the vacancy, but Murdock was beaten by Campbell, 167 to 107.

Democratic Leader Underwood, on behalf of Congressman Mann of Illinois, the house minority leader, nominated Campbell.

MOTIONS TO QUASH DYNAMITING BILLS

Attorneys for Accused Labor Leaders to Ask That the Charges Be Dropped.

Los Angeles, Jan. 12.—Motions to quash the federal indictments against Olaf A. Tveitmo, Anton Johannsen and J. E. Munsey, along with demurrers to the indictments, probably will be filed late today, according to counsel for the accused labor leaders.

Shortly before noon the trio, with their legal advisers, appeared in the federal courtroom. No immediate action on the indictments, however, was expected.

It was stated further that arrests might follow the disclosure of the contents of the second series of indictments returned by the federal grand jury if the disclosure is made today. This belief was strengthened by the constant presence in the lobby of the federal building of two deputies who refused to divulge their mission.

E. A. Clancy, who also was indicted with Tveitmo, Johannsen and Munsey, was arraigned today. His illness had prevented his appearance at the time of the arraignment of the other three. He waived the reading of the indictment, and it was reported that motions to quash and demurrers in the case of the indictments standing against him would be made simultaneously with the disposal of the other cases.

Judge Welborn intimated unofficially today that he would set January 23 as the day for hearing arguments on the motions.

COMMERCIAL CLUB NEEDS NEW HOME

Propositions for New Location to Be Considered by Members at Annual Meeting.

In a day or two President Harvey Rockwith and the board of governors of the Commercial club will draw up in definite form a proposition for a new home for the club, to be placed before the membership at the annual meeting on the evening of January 27. It will also provide for the disposal of the present quarters.

"The club has outgrown its home at Fifth and Oak streets," said President Rockwith this morning, "and we have been casting about for a suitable location for some time. A proposition has come up for the lease of four stories of the Central Market building that is to be erected on the block bounded by Sixth, Ankeny, Fifth and Pine, and we have given the matter some consideration. The board will hold a meeting in a day or two to consider the matter more fully and prepare outlines of our tentative plans to be placed before the membership at the annual meeting."

The Commercial club building, that occupies 100x100 feet on the northwest corner of Fifth and Oak streets, it is believed, could readily be sold for a price not less than \$450,000, which would give the club \$125,000 for its equity. By leasing quarters in the new building, built to suit the club purposes, it is believed the club would do better than to build a new building of its own, although this of course will be the main question for the members to decide.

That the club is in need of larger quarters has long been realized, and especially so in regard to its dining rooms, for they have been found inadequate on many recent occasions. The largest dining room seats 350, but if quarters are secured in the Central Market building a room could be arranged that would accommodate 600. This would meet the demands for a long time to come, so it is figured unless the growth of Portland should happen to exceed even the most sanguine expectations.

Tentative plans for remodeling the old building have also been made, and they will also be considered, for should the membership not deem the proposed move advisable, then the present quarters will undoubtedly be remodeled.

"WANT TO TALK TO YOU"; SLAYS HER

Former Husband Calls at Woman's Home, Kills Her and Makes Escape.

Oakland, Jan. 12.—Mrs. Jessie P. Bigelow, 63 years old, today was shot through the heart and instantly killed at her home by Joseph Rider, her former husband, from whom she was divorced in St. Louis two years ago, according to the police. Previous to the granting of the divorce the couple had been separated for five years. After divorce Mrs. Rider came to California and later met and married Bigelow in Piedmont. Rider followed her and secured employment in Los Angeles. It is believed that Rider arrived from Los Angeles last night. Rider went to Mrs. Bigelow's residence early today, say the police, and rang the bell. He was admitted by Mrs. Bigelow. Rider said he wished to talk to her. "You have no business around here," she said. "What do you want?"

The next moment Rider drew a revolver and shot her through the heart. Still holding the smoking weapon in his hand, Rider ran from the room, encountering his own daughter and son in the hallway. Rider pointed the gun at her and backed out of the house. The girl followed him to the street, Rider finally jumping on a street car.
