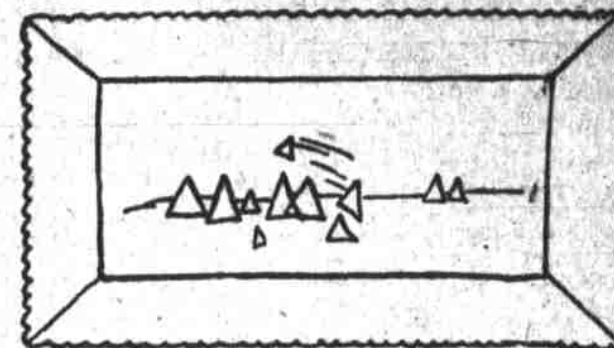

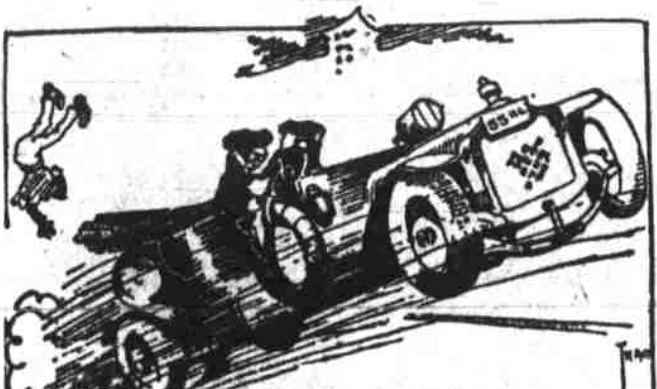

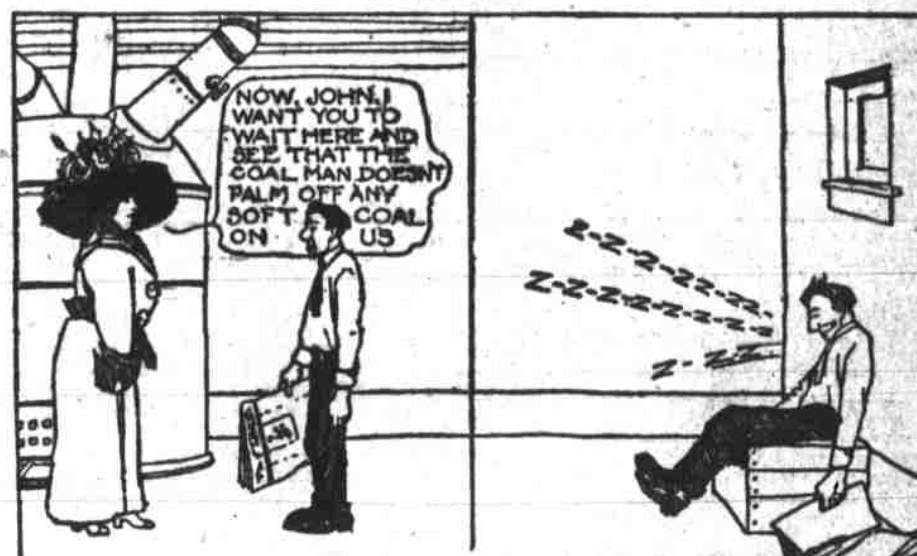

News of Friday and Friday Night

Short Paragraphs of World Happenings Not Received in Time for Yesterday's Issue of The Journal.

Congressional.

Secretary of War Stimson strongly urges the passage of a bill to supply discarded army Krag-Jorgensen rifles and ammunition to schools and rifle clubs.

Congressman Hawley has introduced a bill appropriating \$250,000 for the construction of a road over the Cascades near Mount Hood. Another bill by Hawley would appropriate \$13,500 for the completion of a road across a portion of the Crater Lake National forest.

Representative La Follette, of Washington, has introduced a bill providing for postage of 1 cent an ounce or fraction thereof on first-class mail matter. Beet sugar growers told the committee of the magnitude of the industry; declared that agriculture had been developed on a large scale through sugar production, and disputed the statements made by farmers of hardships in the field.

The bill appropriating \$1,350,000 for joint military maneuvers and mock battles for the coming summer has been approved by the house committee. The maneuvers will be held at some point on Puget sound and the militia of Oregon, Washington and Idaho will take part.

The committee investigating the affair has exonerated ex-Governor United States Senator-elect Vandaman of all blame in alleged irregularities concerning handling of legislative contingent funds.

The senate commerce committee has reported favorably the Bourne bill appropriating \$150,000 to construct a lightship for service at Orford Reef, Cape Blanco, and his bill for a fish hatchery on the upper Columbia was reported favorably by the house fisheries committee.

J. H. Reed, Carnegie's counsel and Secretary Knox's former law partner, will testify before the steel committee; Panama canal hearings will begin Monday; American Federation of Labor urges the creation of a department of labor; additional appropriations for field artillery are asked by Major-General Wood; Carnegie continued his testimony before the steel committee.

Senate committees received petitions urging \$500,000 appropriation for permanent memorials at Gettysburg; and listened to Lorimer in continuation of his testimony regarding his election.

The senate was not in session, having adjourned until Monday.

Political.

W. W. January has been appointed postmaster at Harlan, Lincoln county, upon recommendation of Representative Hawley.

Senator Borah is authority for the statement that a bill will be passed in some form giving the people an opportunity to vote on the direct election of United States senators.

It is thought Representative Hum-

phrey, of Washington, will be appointed United States district judge for western Washington to succeed Judge Donworth, who resigned. He is strongly endorsed by Senator Jones.

Colonel William J. Bryan is preparing to start south for a series of lectures and will begin in Philadelphia and Washington.

In a speech at St. Louis, Governor Harmon criticized Taft for signing the tariff measure; attacked the last three administrations for having increased the federal outlay from \$500,000 to \$1,000,000 a year and severely arraigned the tariff policy of the government whereby manufacturers receive three dollars for every dollar paid to the government in duties.

Judge Hook of Kansas has addressed a letter to President Taft denying the charges recently made against him with the idea of preventing his nomination to the supreme bench.

Eastern.

A special train of five cars is en route to the military prison at Alcatraz Island, Cal., bearing 125 common law offenders. The convicts are under the care of 25 military guards.

Legislation that would permit the consolidation of large business interests, instead of more rigid anti-trust laws, was advocated by Charles M. Schwab, president of the Bethlehem Steel company, in a speech at a dinner given for him in Philadelphia by members of the Manufacturers' club.

Striking operatives and police clashed in a hand-to-hand fight in Lawrence, Mass., Friday, in which missiles of all descriptions were hurled and many hurt. Fifteen thousand operatives in the city are idle.

A safe in the treasurer's strong box at Oklahoma City, equipped with a time lock and all burglar proof appliances, failed to respond, and the state was compelled to secure the services of Paul Hayes, a convict in the Tecumseh prison who successfully opened the safe. Hayes had been convicted of several safe robberies.

The much talked of dance to be given by John Jacob Astor to introduce his bride, formerly Madeline Forde, to New York society, has been called off. Cancellation of the big affair is ascribed to the snubbing of Mrs. Astor by the Four Hundred.

A possible special session of the Illinois legislature will vote on a bill to abolish capital punishment. The bill embodies a provision that the man who slays shall be forced by the state to life labor in support of his victim's family.

Samuel L. Lewis, the oldest rural mail carrier in the United States, died at his

home in Auburn, Ill., Friday. That county was the first to get rural service in the country and Lewis, who was 73 years old at his death, was the first carrier.

Pacific Coast.

New city officers of Union, Or., were sworn in Friday, with Robert Withycombe as mayor.

Luigi Donato Ventura, an Italian of noble birth and of great ability as a writer and lecturer, committed suicide at San Francisco by shooting himself through the heart in a fit of despondency due to family troubles and poor luck as a teacher of languages.

Seeking new opportunities and a start in life, Abner Hammond, 90 years old, and his wife, who is 80, arrived in San Francisco Friday. They were loaded down with advertising matter regarding the resources and advantages of the west, and stated they had \$150 in the bank at Lyons, N. Y., and drew it out to come out here.

John Walter Wilson, acquitted of the murder of his partner, Harry Boas, at San Jose, has confessed to the district attorney that he purchased poison and sent it to Boas, at the request of the latter, who wished to commit suicide without his act becoming known.

J. C. Sterling, former cashier of the Union State Deposit bank of Stockton, Cal., has confessed today to having taken \$16,000 of the bank's funds and lost it speculating in land.

An effort is now being made by the Dallas Pipe & Oil company to raise a sum of money to begin work at the Whiteaker oil well. One thousand dollars of the amount has been raised by President Emery in Portland, and it is desired to raise the rest of the money in Polk county.

The state taxes to be collected for 1912 amount to more than the taxes collected altogether in 1906, 1907 and 1908. The taxes for 1912 total \$3,363,818, while in the three years mentioned the sum was \$2,900,000.

Three more indictments have been returned by the special grand jury investigating the failure of the State Bank of Commerce, at Wallace, Idaho. As in former cases, the names of those charged were held secret.

Following an investigation in alleged attempted jury bribery, George W. Bush, attorney for the Southern Pacific, and J. J. Harold and George W. Mundorf, secret agents of the road, have been indicted by a grand jury at Redding, Cal.

A. B. Hammond, head of the Hammond Lumber company, is in Watsonville, Cal., arranging details for consolidating all lumber interests in which he is interested into one concern. The

properties include nine mills in California and Oregon.

The situation in Bahia has become serious. The federal government has dispatched a warship to the city of Bahia, where fighting was reported. Business is at a standstill and the citizens are in terror.

A band of Bulgarians threw three bombs into a Turkish open air mass meeting at Zellovka, near Uskub, European Turkey, killing three persons and injuring 23.

Heavy Socialist gains proved the feature of the 1912 election to the German Reichstag. Socialists polled 4,903,000 votes and captured 21 seats.

Foreign.

Canadian mineral production last year totalled \$105,000,000, an increase of 14 per cent. Gold production amounted to more than \$10,000,000; silver, \$17,000,-

000; nickel, \$11,000,000, and pig iron, \$11,000,000.

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Miscellaneous.

The postoffice department has made an adverse report on the establishment of a railroad mail service on the Oregon-Washington line between Attalla and North Yakima, requested by Portland citizens.

President Taft admitted before a delegation of Foreign Language Newspa-

pers that he had been compelled to at-rogate the Russian treaty more quickly than he had intended.

There were only 48 accidents, in which but 392 lives were lost, out of 314,768,885 passengers carried, during the year ended June 30 last, on steam vessels.

Captain Robert A. Bartlett, commander of the Arctic steamer Roosevelt, during Peary's polar expedition, now visiting San Francisco, hopes to induce Californians to finance an expedition in search of the South Pole.

The pamphlet report of the Southern Pacific and proprietary companies for the fiscal year, which ended June 30, 1911, displays a decrease in gross revenues of \$2,612,376, or 1.78 per cent below figures for the previous year.

The voluntary pension distributions of the Southern Pacific company will reach the million dollar mark before April 1. An average of more than \$100,000 a year has been paid since the establishment of the pension system, nine years ago, the total paid out thus far being \$948,523.
