

# MAKE SCHEDULE AND NUMBER MEN

## Coast League Directors Will Help Fans to Identify Players.

Los Angeles, Jan. 13.—Directors of the Pacific Coast league met here yesterday and arranged the schedule for the 1921 season, supplementing this by deciding to number all ball players on each team so that the fans may know who they are.

The numbers will be allotted to the players at the opening of the season and accurate tab of them will be kept in the scorecards at all the baseball parks.

The opening games and holiday dates were awarded as follows:

**Jamison Says He Hasn't Signed.**

Eugene, Or., Jan. 13.—Homer Jamison, star first baseman, pitcher and captain of the Oregon varsity nine, has not signed up with Hogan's Vernon coast league club, as was recently announced. While Jamison has received several offers, he has not as yet put his name to a contract.

**Fullerton to Stay in East.**

Seattle, Wash., Jan. 13.—President Dugdale of the Seattle baseball club announced yesterday that he would be without the services of Charley Fullerton this season.

Fullerton was brought to the coast last season by Manager McCredie of Portland and lasted for about two months in the Coast league.

McCredie was without a southpaw and he framed up a deal with the Seattle club whereby Ferd Henkle became a member of the Portland team.

Fullerton enjoyed a successful season with Seattle, as pitcher and captain holding out is known to Dugdale, who tendered an increase in salary. It is thought that he prefers to pitch in the eastern part of the country.

Dugdale also announced that he may trade Pitcher Jimmy Wiggs to some Southern league club.

**Million to St. Louis.**

Cleveland, Ohio, Jan. 13.—Ten Million, who was drafted by the Cleveland Americans from the Victoria Northwest league club, is now a member of the St. Louis Nationals. He was purchased from the Naps last week and his sale was reported yesterday.

**Finns Very Much Roused.**

Heilingsfors, N. Y., Jan. 13.—Public indignation runs high today against the latest edict from St. Petersburg. This order is to the effect that Russia, regardless of any action the Finnish diet may take on the subject, shall receive from Finland contributions of horses and transport, for the Russian army.

While the Finns generally approve of contributing to the defense of the empire, they insist on the diet's constitutional right to handle the question. Meanwhile, the Russianized senate has decided that Finnish officials who refuse to carry out the new regulation shall be tried in Russian courts, where their conviction would be assured.

# R. ROSE BREAKS SHOTPUT RECORD

## World's Weight Champion, in Indoor Meet, Clips Off Another Hunk.

(United Press Leased Wire.)

San Francisco, Jan. 13.—That Ralph Rose has retained all his wonderful skill as an athlete, and that he is likely to maintain America's supremacy in the shotput event at the Olympic games in Sweden next summer, is indicated by the fact that at the indoor meet of the Olympic club here last night the giant Californian smashed the indoor record for the 16 pound missile by hurling the weight 45 feet 9 1/2 inches.

Harry Lemoine of the New York Athletic club held the former record, 45 feet 10 inches.

Before he went on the floor Rose told his friends that he would hang up a new record, and he made good with his first throw. On the first attempt he sent the weight 47 feet 5 1/2 inches, well over Lemoine's record.

He then put this throw into the discard by hitting the new figure of 48 feet 9 1/2 inches, which makes, the putters say, is likely to stand for some time.

Forrest Smithson, holder of the world's record for high hurdles, won both the hurdle events last evening and proved that he is not ready to be taken down and out class. Smithson set the pace and made 60 yards in 0:08 4-5. In the 75 yard low hurdles Smithson won in 2 seconds flat.

**CARNEY 3-CUSHION CHAMPION OF WORLD**

# FAMOUS HIGH JUMPER CLEARING BAR



Egan Erickson, national champion high jumper of the Mott Haven Athletic club of New York, who has decided to become a policeman. Beware, you second story men. Erickson has done phenomenal work during his practice the last few weeks. This picture of him was snapped when the bar was at 6 feet 2 inches. In five successive days he cleared the bar at the following heights: 6 feet 3 inches, 6 feet 2 inches, 6 feet 5 inches, 6 feet 3 inches, and 6 feet 4 inches. Probably never before in the history of athletics did a jumper do such remarkably consistent work. His leap of 6 feet 5 inches was the highest since Mike Sweeney hung up his world's record 11 years ago at 6 feet 5 1/2 inches. If Erickson works in his present form when the Olympics are held at Stockholm next year, the United States will capture the high jump without any trouble.

**When Greek Meets Greek.**

Tafalos, the Greek strong man, who had pulled down top money—or whatever takes the place of kale in an amateur event—by raising the greatest weight at the Olympic games, came to America shortly after to purloin honors on the mat.

Tafalos was a "handsome brute," with black, curling mustaches and marcelled hair—as jet as the locks of any first-rate raven.

Tafalos is back in Athens this long while, so how he met his Waterloo isn't private property, so much as it was about the time he was meeting it.

William Demetral, known as the "Greek Demon," is built much after the design of a race horse—lean and speedy—and good on a heavy spurt.

Demetral saw in Tafalos a rival—and that made things worse, was the winner of the Greek generally—converting Bill Demetral into a sort of lone orphan whom nobody loved.

Tafalos was desirous of winning honors—of being banqueted and winned and all the rest of it—and what could start the Greek hearts throbbing faster for him than to win over Demetral?

For weeks Bill tried to get Tafalos on, but the weight-lifter was shy and uncertain.

Then there were whispered consultations and at the end of these conferences Tafalos came out smiling. Never mind what was started buzzing in his bonnet, he was certain that he would win. Demetral had said "Open sesame," and sesame obeyed. The men were matched.

Into the Coliseum in Chicago that night the Greek population poured. Fear-

and popcorn stands were deserted; the festive banana was left idling in the cart and the descendants of Leonidas and Homer and the rest of the family came in pairs, quartets, mobs, confident that they would see the downfall of Demetral and the crowning of Tafalos.

Jack roses, tea roses, American Beauties, and even funeral wreaths (purple and blue) were heaped in the corner of the beaming, smiling Tafalos.

When the men met, Tafalos saw Demetral not at all, but bowed acknowledgment of the lusty cheers in his behalf. Had he only been in time for the beauty contests there would have been nothing to it!

Then Bill Demetral, quivering in his excitement, dived and caught the other Greek's legs and lifted him up. Once on high, Bill let go. Newton was right. The law of gravity is unfalling.

Twice, thrice, the process was repeated, and Tafalos began to understand. The King George look went out of his eyes and he took on the appearance of a Blenheim spaniel caught with the goods. Tears glistened in his limpid orbs. He had been deceived!

Next day Tafalos was on his way to New York. The day following he was gliding over the Atlantic for "Attica." His heart was broken.

But Bill Demetral smiled in a wan, sad sort of way.

"You do feel rather bad about it, eh, Bill?" somebody asked, thinking that "blood is thicker than water."

"Yes," Demetral admitted, "I do. By gee! Eef that referee hadn't call bets off—um! Today I would be the king of the peanut trust in Chicago. I wonder who told the referee!"

**FRISCO PROMOTERS PEEVED AT PERMITS**

Allege Two Professional Clubs Are Owned by Jim Coffroth.

San Francisco, Jan. 13.—Much dissatisfaction was expressed here today by would-be fight promoters who had made application for permits to stage fights here, and who were counted out when the board of supervisors distributed the professional permits.

The lucky promoters were James W. Coffroth of the Shasta club; Jack O'Connell of the Humboldt club; Eddie Grane of the Tuxedo club and John J. Rafferty of the Canal club.

Several of the disappointed clubs, it was announced today, will protest the action of the police committee, when the supervisors meet Monday. Among other things it is charged that the Shasta and Canal clubs are one and the same, both being controlled by Coffroth.

One of the most disappointed promoters is Harry Foley, the referee, who believed that he would be given a permit.

**TROTTER HAD GREAT RECORD ON TRACK**

R. T. C., trained and driven by Thomas W. Murphy of New York city in the season just closed made the best record of any trotter in the history of the state. Thirty-two thousand and twelve dollars and 50 cents was the amount won by this product of the state of Delaware, and aside from his money winning record, he is the only trotter of note that ever went through a campaign of like duration without the loss of a single race and but one heat.

He won nine races, embracing 27 heats, ranging from 2:10 1/2 to 2:12 1/2. He received from 2:14 1/2 to 2:16 1/2, and touched the latter figure three times—at Grand Rapids, in July; at Columbus, in August, and again at Columbus, in September. The "plow horse" won five events of the value of \$10,000 each and the sum of the earnings foot up the figures quoted above.

## Be Strongest Ever Developed at Eugene.

University of Oregon, Eugene, Jan. 13.—The University of Oregon basketball team started regular practice this week. There is a wealth of material in the university for the development of a five of exceptional strength. The interfraternity league has brought nearly every man on the university on the basketball floor, and no one with ability at the game has escaped the eagle eye of Trainer Hayward, who is coaching the team. Five veterans are now in the university. Moore and Jamison are being subbed at the forward positions. Fenton at center, and Walker and Simms at guard. Walker was shifted from forward to guard to fill the place left vacant by Elliott, and Moore, who subbed on last year's team, has been filling the vacancy at forward. The team will leave Eugene February 9, for Seattle, the first stop on the tour of the northwest. The California tour has been called off.

The men who will make this trip are at this time uncertain. However, if the usual seven men are carried the personnel will probably be about as follows: Forward, Captain Jamison, Moore and Rader; guards, Walker, Simms and Bradshaw; and center, Fenton.

He is strong and can be played at center as well as at guard. The varsity five this season will probably be the strongest ever developed in Oregon.
