W. M. C. A. Exhibit—Indicative of the large number of young men who are coming to Portland from all parts of the United States will be an exhibit to be installed early this week in the lobby of the Portland Young Men's Christian association. This exhibit will consist of hundreds of membership cards that have been presented to the Portland Y. M. C. A. from associations in other parts of the country and in foreign lands. Nearly every state in the union will be represented in this collection. There will also be many cards from foreign countries. The larger number of the applicants come from the middle west, but there is also considerable representation from the south and east, as well as from the neighboring states of Washington, California and Idaho. This exhibit is made possible by the system of membership exchanges that is maintained. By this system a card from any association is good for full membership privileges wherever it is presented. All parts of the world are represented in the cards that have been received by the Portland association.

Sentenced, Then Paroled—Gordon Dickey, leader in the St. Johns Hindu riots last year, was given a sentence of five years in the state prison yesterday and paroled. He was convicted last May in the circuit court. Judge Coke of Marshfield was called to hear the case. The jury found Dickey guilty after deliberating three hours. In the course of the hearing, the testimony showed that Dickey was the organizer and leader of the mob which made the attack on the Hindu mill workers. Several of the foreigners testified they easily recognized him as the man who broke down the doors leading into their rooms, which were plundered by other members of the mob. Attorney Dan J. Malarkey represented the British government in prosecuting Dickey and the other rioters. Attorney John Stevenson defended the rioters.

Mysterious Fire in Trunk—A mysterious fire in a trunk owned by J. W. Cottle of the Euclid hotel at Eighteenth and Washington streets, caused considerable excitement among the roomers at 7:30 o'clock last night and necessitated the calling out of two engine companies. It is thought that the fire had been smoldering in the trunk since 2 o'clock in the afternoon, when one of the employees of the building detected the odor of burning rags. It was not until 7 o'clock in the evening that it was located. On breaking into the room the clothes closet was found ablaze, but the fire was soon extinguished. No explanation has been given of the way the fire started, with in the closed trunk.

Passenger Frigate Company—With the signatures of 23 passengers of the Oregon Trunk North Bank train, which was snow bound at Fallbridge, Wash., for some time during the recent storm, a letter of appreciation of the courtesies and hospitality extended by the Spokane, Portland & Seattle railway has been received by J. P. Rogers, superintendent of the company. Thanks were also extended to Mrs. Helen M. Shaw, of the Hotel Fallbridge, John C. Andreoli, proprietor of the restaurant at that place and F. S. Appleman, agent of the company. The majority of the passengers were from central Oregon, with a few from Portland and Washington points.

Turnbull, state secretary for the Child Labor commission, will give an interesting and instructive address. It is to be hoped that the large assembly hall will be filled. About a dozen years ago Mr. Smith was in the employ of the Southern Pacific traveling among the farmers in the Willamette valley and it is in a great measure due to his activity that the system of diversified farming was so successfully introduced. Prior to that time the farmers had been devoting most of their efforts to wheat or one crop farming with the result that the ground became worked out and yielded rather poor crops.

Aged Man Wanders Away—William Harris, aged 85 years, of Brooks, Oregon, who is visiting with his daughter, Mrs. G. H. Craven, at 438 Monroe street, strayed away from the home yesterday and became lost. Last evening, Patrolmen Stewart and Murphy found the man in a dazed condition at Morris and Mississippi avenues, injured slightly from several falls he had taken in trying to find his way back to the house. The patrolmen finally located the home of the man's daughter and he was taken there.

Secondhand Store Burns—Fire which started from an unknown origin destroyed the goods in a secondhand store at 181 and 183 1/2 Front last night, doing at least \$1500 damage, of which \$1000 will be repaid by the insurance. The store was conducted by E. Schaeffer and the building, which was also considerably damaged was owned by Meier & Frank. Several fire companies responded to the alarm.

Was Certificate Stolen—Ben Williams, railroad porter, was arrested several days ago by Detectives Coleman and Snow for the theft of a suit case and was given a fine of \$50 by Judge Taswell for the offense. But when the man started to settle with his attorney, Leon Parkes, he offered a certificate of deposit on the State Bank of Almont, N. D., for \$500 made out in favor of E. Radke, which he wanted the attorney to cash for him. As the check did not bear the name of Williams and was for such a large amount, it was decided to investigate the affair, and on telegraphing to the bank which issued the certificate it was found that the certificate had been reported as stolen and payment on it had been stopped. An effort is now being made to locate Radke to determine whether or not the paper was stolen.

PORTRAYS A NEW JEW, ON STAGE

"The Son of Solomon" Feature at Orpheum—Musical Number.

Undoubtedly first place on the new Orpheum bill belongs to Hugh Herbert, assisted by Margot Williams and Thomas A. Everett, in "The Son of Solomon," an unusual picture of Jewish life and character. The scene represents the home of a well-to-do Jewish family and is so real that it almost ceases to be only a stage picture. An intense story is built up on the son's weakness, but the character of Solomon, as portrayed by Mr. Herbert, throws the light of comedy in the most serious moments. Mr. Herbert shows a new Jew to the stage, one void of the usual burlesque and true to life. It is a whimsical character that is not soon forgotten, although it seems difficult at times to understand all that Mr. Herbert says. Miss Williams and Mr. Everett give splendid support.

Quite as interesting, but in another way, is the headline act, the Arkalof Russian Ballets orchestra. Fourteen Russians, gorgeously attired, play on their native string instruments. The orchestra is entirely of their own land and the second number, especially, is strongly descriptive of an underlying note of tragedy. "Alexander's Rag Time Band" was not omitted and captured the house as usual. Features winning a storm of applause were the sensational Russian dances.

Maurice Burkhardt, "author entertainer," proved a favorite in the songs which he sang and the poem which he recited. His voice is unusually good and he has a way of his own in getting things over.

Charles Brown and May Newman have built an act on the idea of something doing every minute, and they stopped the show. They know how to do rag, they change their costumes and close with a clever melody of the high hit kind.

Corigan and Vivian open the bill with a clever sharpshooting act. Miss Vivian is a crack shot, as is Mr. Corigan. They introduce yodling and musical sharpshooting. The act went big.

Clever wire walkers and acrobats are the Alpine troupe. They use a double wire so that all work at once. The three girls are quite the best of their kind. A. O. Duncan, ventriloquist, shows that he can do clever things in that line, but his act is not well constructed. It is too long and much of the patter is old.
