

GARDEN CONTESTS AMONG PUPILS

Details of Plan Are Discussed
Before Teachers' Committee.

Details of the plan for organizing garden contest societies in each of the Portland public schools were presented before the teachers' committee of the school board yesterday by the committee of business men that has the matter in charge.

The committee consisting of I. N. Fleischner and R. L. Sabin will, it is said, report favorably on the plan at the school board meeting Friday. Superintendent of City Schools Frank Rigler, who attended the meeting, expressed his belief that the earth education for boys and girls in city schools is practicable and desirable.

The plan, briefly stated, is to organize in each school an agricultural society, enrolling as members boys and girls above the fifth grade.

Prizes Are Offered.

All who can will furnish their own garden plots, tools and seeds. For those who cannot their needs will be attended to by an advisory committee of citizens appointed for each school. Bulletins on method will be furnished. In congested districts where back yards or other ground is not available, lots and entire vacant blocks will be secured through the efforts of the advisory committee. To meet the expense of plowing and fertilizing the soil each child will give his or her note for, say, 50 cents, the amount to be repaid out of the proceeds of the gardening.

Prizes will be furnished by the Retail Merchants' association, an exhibit will be made in connection with each school.

Cooperation of the principals and teachers in the plan will be asked by Superintendent Rigler.

They will be encouraged to give as much help as they can to the movement, apart from regular school duties as opportunity and inclination permit.

Board of Work.

The active burden of the work will be carried by the committee representing the Commercial club, the state board of immigration, the Y. M. C. A., the Retail Merchants' association, state board of education, Oregon Development league, Bankers' association, Livestock association, Progressive Business Men's club and other organizations enlisted in the new educational movement.

There were in attendance at the meeting yesterday State Superintendent of Schools L. R. Alderman, O. M. Plummer, secretary and treasurer of the Union Stockyards company, General Secretary Harry W. Stone of the Y. M. C. A., C. C. Chapman, development manager of the Commercial club and the Oregon Development league, and the secretary of the state board of immigration, together with Mr. Stone, Mr. Sabin and Superintendent Rigler.

HARPER'S ERASES NAME OF WILSON

At Request of New Jersey,
Weekly Will Cease Booming
His Candidacy.

New York, Jan. 17.—Fear of being branded as Wall street's candidate for the Democratic presidential nomination today has caused Governor Woodrow Wilson of New Jersey to demand of Colonel Hargreaves, publisher of Harper's Weekly, that that publication cease booming his candidacy.

In explaining Wilson's position, a representative of the New Jersey executive said today: "Governor Wilson has a horror of being misrepresented. He was told that western newspapers were representing him as the candidate of Wall street because he was being 'boomed' for the nomination by Harper's Weekly. This prompted the governor to ask that Colonel Hargreaves cease mentioning his candidacy in his periodical."

A current issue of Harper's Weekly said: "The name of Governor Woodrow Wilson as our candidate for the presidency is taken from the head of these columns in response to a statement from him to the effect that our support is injuriously affecting his candidacy."

Governor Wilson was in New York today, en route to Detroit, where he will speak tomorrow night.

WEBER FAMILY SUES SPOKANE FOR \$10,000

Spokane, Jan. 16.—Attorneys for the Weber family filed a \$10,000 damage suit against the city of Spokane for the detention of Elizabeth Weber on December 24. The girl is a sister of Anna Weber, murdered recently. The complaint states the girl was subjected to severe questioning by officials at the time of Elizabeth Weber's arrest. Public sentiment was strongly against her detention.

Pitchblend Found in Ore.

Phoenix, Ariz., Jan. 17.—Samples of ore believed to carry pitchblend, from which radium is extracted, were sent today to Washington, Denver and Tucson for assay by W. H. Slaughter, a Phoenix miner. Slaughter brought the ore from claims near Columbia, in southern Yavapai county, where he says it exists in great quantities.

WIDOW'S ATTORNEY WILL CASE WITNESS

Legal Adviser Declares Mrs.
Thurston Extravagant
With Her Money.

San Diego, Cal., Jan. 17.—Judge John G. Van Etten, for years legal adviser for Mrs. Harriet Patterson before she married Clark Thurston, resumed the stand today in the Thurston will case.

Van Etten has proved the most damaging witness for Mrs. Katherine Tingley, who was left the bulk of Mrs. Thurston's fortune. He told how his client was reckless with her money and how she purchased much land, leaving the title in the name of Mrs. Mary Hastie, a spiritualist who benefited in many ways from her benevolence. He declared that Mrs. Thurston, then Mrs. Patterson, once gave him a draft for \$17,000 and would not even accept a receipt for the amount. The money was to be expended by Mrs. Hastie, he said.

Judge Van Etten was also questioned about the character of George L. Patterson, the contestant. Mrs. Tingley in her testimony continually referred to his gambling and drinking. The witness declared that as long as he had known Patterson he had never seen him under the influence of liquor.

MINERS ADVOCATE PUBLIC OWNERSHIP

Delegates in Convention Adopt
Resolution Urging Federal
Control of Industries.

(United Press Leased Wire.)
Indianapolis, Jan. 17.—Governmental ownership of all industries was advocated in a resolution adopted today by the convention of the United Mineworkers of America here by an almost unanimous vote. The resolution was introduced by Philip Burgh of Manfield, Penna.

Speaking as representatives of the Western Federation of Miners, Edwin Young of Montana and John McKinnon of British Columbia predicted the consolidation of their organization with that of the United Mine Workers. McKinnon said he believed that a referendum vote would show that the western Federation favored the amalgamation. He stated that the way for consolidation could be made clear by the western Federation surrendering its charter.

The consolidation of the two organizations would result in the most powerful labor union in the world with approximately 500,000 members. McKinnon's prophecy was received by the delegates with cheers.

PREACHER M'FARLAND PROTESTS INNOCENCE

Pittsburgh, Jan. 17.—That the Rev. W. F. Prior to accepting the pastorate at Greenville, McFarland was a professor in a local high school. Miss Coe was his private secretary.
