Isaac Buxton's Death.—The news of the death of Isaac N. Buxton, son of the late pioneers, David F. and Fanny Buxton, of Troutdale, comes as a shock to his many friends and acquaintances in this county. He passed away at the Pasadena hospital in California on January 1, 1912. Mr. and Mrs. Buxton left their home in Troutdale December 11, 1911, to visit relatives in Los Angeles. On the way to California Mr. Buxton became ill from ptomaine poisoning and expired shortly after his arrival in Los Angeles on New Year's day. The interment took place at Pasadena. Buxton was born at Troutdale May 11, 1856. On April 26, 1880, he married Emma J. Stafford, who with two sons, Clarence and Roy, survive him. The deceased also left three sisters, Misses Mary E. and Nancy F. Buxton and Mrs. J. N. Bristol.

Had Concealed Weapons.—Four men, giving their names as Muchalla, Augustia, Fivola and Desantes were arrested last night by Captain Keller, Sergeant Kleinen and several patrolmen in a saloon at Fourth and Sheridan streets, all for carrying concealed weapons. Three of the men had revolvers in their pockets. The entire crowd in the saloon was searched for weapons when it was learned that one of the men had displayed a revolver. The fourth man arrested had a very large hunting knife concealed in his sleeve. Augustia was fined \$20 for having the knife in his possession and the three others were each fined \$50.

Ordinance Unconstitutional.—That the Ellis bill amendment to the city charter is unconstitutional and can be only partially enforced is the verbal opinion expressed by City Attorney Grant today. Mr. Grant will make a detailed study of the amendment and redraft it for submission to the voters at the next election. It is said the amendment was copied after a Chicago ordinance which was declared unconstitutional. City Attorney Grant compared the two ordinances and found them very similar. The Ellis amendment was passed at the last general election.

Civil Service Examinations.—Secretary W. A. Tupper of the city civil service commission announces four examinations for the purpose of securing eligibles for various municipal positions. The first will be February 6 when an examination for stenographic clerks will be held. February 9 an examination to secure eligibles for the position of city watchman will be given. Examinations for eligibles for police jobs will be held from February 13 to 17, inclusive. February 23 applicants for the position of deputy building inspector of the second grade will be examined.

Arrested at Hospital.—Pete Louis, a former employee of the Good Samaritan hospital, was arrested last night in a store room at the hospital by Patrolmen Wade and Bewley on a charge of trespass and attempted burglary, after the man had been cornered in a room by two nurses who had discovered him prowling through the halls of the hospital. In his possession was found a gold watch, a nugget pin and several sets of cuff links which are said to have been stolen from inmates of the hospital. The man's case will come up for hearing tomorrow.

Settled Out of Court.—The second case wherein a settlement was reached through the mediation of Judge Gantenbein of the circuit court was yesterday of Roy W. Haster against the Lewis-Wiley Hydraulic company. While the attorneys were waiting for the return of a juror the judge suggested they settle their case without taking the time of the court. Haster was injured by falling from a flume near Gull's lake and asked \$2500 damages. The company offered \$2500, which was accepted.

Woodlawn Teachers' Meeting.—The Parent-Teachers' association of Woodlawn will hold its regular monthly meeting tomorrow at 8 p. m. Mrs. Webster will give a talk on "The Life of Jean Millet, a copy of whose famous painting 'The Shepherdess and Her Flocks,' has been presented to the school by a member of the association. The picture is now on display in that room of the school wherein is enrolled the greatest number of children whose parents are in attendance at the monthly meetings.

Fingers Blown Off.—Gustav Povich, 90 Knott street, yesterday lost three fingers of his right hand when he applied the lighted end of a cigarette to a hole he had filed in the end of a cartridge. The man had called on a friend at 495 Northwold street and had filed the hole in the cartridge which he had found, when he suddenly became curious to know what would happen if he applied the cigarette. He was taken to the office of Dr. Hamilton which was near by, where the wounds were dressed.

Asks \$200 Damages.—Charging careless and negligent driving of his automobile caused him to run down the wagon in which Brock and his son Harry were riding, Brooks has filed suit against W. A. Townsend in the justice's court for \$200 damages alleged to have been sustained as a result of the accident. The smashup occurred on September 25, 1911, on the Base Line road near Rockwood. The wagon was badly smashed. Harry Brooks was slightly injured.

Committee Will Report.—The membership committee of the Greater Portland Plans association will hold an important meeting in the Commercial club at luncheon tomorrow. Vincent Jones, chairman of the committee, announced today that "We will listen to reports of the subcommittees on printing, on buttons and on publicity and on headquarters for the coming campaign, and we will make plans for the success of the work."

Report on Ladd Estate.—The final report of the administrators of the estate of Caroline A. Ladd, who died in October, 1909, was filed today in the county court. The report shows the

state received \$13,928 for inheritance tax. It is noted that the estate has personal property to the value of \$1,341,005, real estate to the value of \$193,300, and cash on hand to the amount of \$21,867. The administrators of the estate were William, Charles E. and John Wesley Ladd. The law firm of Williams, Woods & Linthicum represented the estate.

Charges Against Lawyers.—Attorneys C. H. Libby and L. C. Garrigus are under investigation by the grand jury for exacting fees from clients. The complaint against Attorney Garrigus has been before two previous grand juries, each jury hearing the matter to the following body. He is alleged to have kept part of the proceeds of a real estate transaction, in which he was counsel. Mrs. M. E. Canelle charges that Attorney Libby represented her in the purchase of a rooming house, and that he has refused to make an accounting. It is charged by the woman that he owes her \$1000.

Man and Woman Arrested.—Leonard Brock, a baseball player, was arrested last night by Patrolman Evans at 250 Montgomery street on a statutory charge made against him by his wife, who is said to be seeking a divorce. With Brock at the time of his arrest was Mrs. Josephine Grigg, aged 23, a waitress, who is also charged with the same offense. Mrs. Brock, the wife of Judge Charles T. Tozier who died 12 years ago, is in a very precarious condition at St. Vincent's hospital. Little hope is entertained for her recovery, but the physicians state that she may linger for weeks.

Mrs. A. Clark Buried Today.—The funeral services of Mrs. Allen Clark, daughter of W. J. Murky, ex-state senator, who died at the Good Samaritan hospital Tuesday night, will be held at her home at Monmouth, Or., today. Mrs. Clark, who was a well known local singer, was 24 years old. Both her parents, a husband and a 5 year old daughter, survive her. She also leaves a sister, Mrs. Frank Lucas of this city.

Voters Register Slowly.—The record of Deputy County Clerk Herman Schneider shows that 3480 voters have registered for the primary election. The books have been open since January 2. All voters who expect to use their franchise in the coming election are required to have their names placed on the precinct register, which is now open on the fourth floor of the new courthouse.

Would Add to Parks.—The Peninsular Improvement association met last night at Peninsular hall and adopted a resolution recommending the purchase by the park board of the John Mock 35 acre farm as an addition to Columbia park. This is part of the Bennett Greater Portland plan. A joint meeting of the push clubs of Peninsular and University parks is being arranged for.

Kline Saloon Held Up.—Two highwaymen at 8 o'clock last night held up four men in the Carl Kline saloon, 401 Twentieth street, and succeeded in getting \$10 from the cash till and a valuable watch from Superintendent Baldwin of the Northern Pacific mills. The police were given a good description of the men and are searching for them.

Loachard to Penitentiary.—Leon Loachard, who was arrested for stealing chickens and later held as a suspect in the Barbara Holtzman case, was sent to state prison yesterday on the larceny charge. A plea of guilty was entered by Loachard, who was given an indeterminate sentence. He has served one term in prison.

Home Telephone at City Hall.—The Home Telephone company has completed the installation of its exchange in the city hall. An operator employed by the city, took charge of the exchange today. Henceforth all calls over the automatic phone will be connected by the operator to the various offices in the hall.

Poultry Lecture Postponed.—The lecture that was to have been given tonight at the Young Men's Christian association by H. F. Rau, a poultry expert, has been postponed as Mr. Rau is ill. The Poultry club of the Y. M. C. A. expects to arrange for the lecture on a later date.

MRS. TOZIER, PIONEER, VERY LOW AT HOSPITAL

Stricken with paralysis at her home, Euclid and Hawthorn avenues, five days ago, Mrs. Zilzida P. Tozier, widow of Judge Charles T. Tozier who died 12 years ago, is in a very precarious condition at St. Vincent's hospital. Little hope is entertained for her recovery, but the physicians state that she may linger for weeks.

Mrs. Tozier is one of the pioneers who crossed the plains with ox-teams, arriving in Oregon in 1863. She came from Bloomington, Ind., and was one of the organizers of the Indiana society, of which she is a prominent member. She is 70 years old.

Mr. Tozier was the mother of Albert Tozier of Portland and Dee, Or., a former newspaper man; Leroy Tozier, one of the most prominent attorneys of Fairbanks, Alaska, who is at present in New York in connection with the case of Banker Barnett of Fairbanks, charged with embezzlement; Mrs. Edith Tozier Weathered, editor of "Western Tours," a Tacoma magazine published in the interest of the west, and a prominent figure in women's affairs in the state of Washington, and Mrs. E. E. Cox of Hartford City, Ind., wife of the editor of the Daily News of Hartford, and well known in Portland as Nellie Tozier.

CONVICTS LIKE WORK AT WESTVILLE; 6 MORE SENT

Medford, Or., Jan. 18.—Warden Curtiss of the state penitentiary arrived in Medford last night with six additional convicts to place on the Crater Lake highway. They take the places of six men whose time has expired. Warden Curtiss says many of the prisoners at the state penitentiary see transfer to "Westville," and that the lot of the honor men at work on the highway is greatly envied.

BAPTIST CHURCH MEN
HEAR MISSIONARY PLAN

Two hundred and fifty Baptist churchmen from Portland and the towns of the Willamette valley gathered at a dinner in the White Temple last night to hear the plea of Secretary W. T. Stackhouse of the Laymen's Missionary movement, and F. W. Padelford of Massachusetts for a larger investment in missionary enterprise. Rev. Mr. Padelford pointed to the revolutionary movements in China and Turkey and said they were due to the breaking away from ancient customs and forms and a following of the Christian missionary leadership in the new thought of liberty and truth. Dr. Stackhouse declared that with 2500 missionaries and an annual contribution of \$6,500,000 the rest of the world's people who have not heard the gospel message can be reached.
