

CANDIDATES STIR AT KLAMATH FALLS

Mayorality Contest Likely to Be Center of Political Activity.

(Special to The Journal.) Klamath Falls, Or., Jan. 19.—Although the convention for nominating candidates for city offices does not take place until April and the election not until the first Monday in May the campaign is already on. F. T. Sanderson, mayor, has not said that he will seek a third term, but his friends are urging him to stand for reelection. The wisecracks have not been able to say whether he will seek the mayorality or become a candidate for the Democratic nomination for sheriff.

The last year has been a strenuous one for Klamath Falls. It has been a record breaker for municipal improvements. The mayor has had the brunt of the many obstacles that had to be overcome. He has shown himself fully competent to cope with the intricate problems that must be faced by a growing city. Should Mayor Sanderson be a candidate to succeed himself it will take a strong man to wrest the mayorality from him.

Those opposed to Sanderson have selected A. J. Maddox as the man in the city strong enough to beat Sanderson. Mr. Maddox is a heavy taxpayer and a progressive citizen. He admits that he would like to be mayor, but has been reticent about announcing himself as a candidate. He has gone to Honolulu to be absent four weeks.

In the various wards of the city there will be a lively scramble for the nomination for councilmen. County politics is also becoming active. Practically every man holding a county job has expressed a desire to succeed himself. Sheriff W. B. Barnes is the only official who has said that he does not want a third term. There are already several candidates for both the Republican and Democratic nominations.

The friends of W. S. Worden, county judge, are to present his name as a candidate for the Republican nomination for congress. Judge Worden has not announced himself, but he is not adverse to going to congress.

CHIEF BARS DANCE HALL CONTORTIONS

Los Angeles, Jan. 19.—As a result of Chief of Police Sebastian's disfavor, several dances bearing alliterative titles, one of them the "Grizzly Bear," are under the ban in every public dance hall in Los Angeles today. Sebastian issued strict orders concerning the dances and ordered the proprietor of an offending place to appear before the police commissioners. The dances in question have not been barred from the local stage.

AIR-GIRL UNAFRAID; WOULD TACKLE MEN

Harriet Quimby Says She's Not Circus Performer, but Won't Fly Against Other.

(United Press Leased Wire.) New York, Jan. 19.—Replying to Aviator Blanche Scott's statement from Los Angeles that Harriet Quimby and Matilde Moisant are afraid to compete with her in an airplane contest, Miss Quimby in an interview here today declared that she is not only unafraid of any bird girl, but wouldn't hesitate to challenge even Grahame-White if she had a high power machine.

"I am not afraid of Miss Scott," she said, "and were she a licensed aviator, I would not hesitate to accept her challenge. But she was never awarded a license, and besides she can't do the right hand turn, the hardest feat in aeronautics. But as for fearing her, why, I don't fear either her or anyone else, men included. If I had the same power aeroplane as Grahame-White, I would challenge him to an aerial contest. I don't believe in circus flying, but I certainly do not fear Miss Scott."

CROOK COUNTY SCHOOLS SHOW RAPID GROWTH

(Special to The Journal.) Bend, Or., Jan. 19.—An increase of 691 children in Crook county is shown by the school census taken November 25, the result of which has been announced by the county superintendent. The Bend district has overtaken Prineville and now heads the list as the largest in the county, with 383 pupils. A gain of 177 was made last year. Prineville has 268. Redmond stands third, having gained 60 pupils. The total number of children of school age in the county is 3015, there being 1547 boys and 1468 girls. In 1909 the number was 2120. There are 85 school districts, 14 new ones having been created last year.

Shingle Mill at Bend.

WIFE STANDING BY ACCUSED PASTOR

Mrs. McFarland Says Charges Placed Against Mission Preacher Not True.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Greenville, Tenn., Jan. 19.—Absolute confidence of the innocence of her husband was expressed here by Mrs. McFarland, wife of the Rev. W. F. McFarland, pastor of the United Presbyterian mission here, indicted in Pittsburgh, Pa., on charges of performing two illegal operations on Miss Elsie Coe, his private secretary who subsequently died.

"It seems terrible," said Mrs. McFarland, "that the wild and malicious statements of a dying girl should be used to smirch the character of my noble and good husband. Why, you cannot find a person in either Cedar Creek or Greenville who believes him guilty. Every one has expressed confidence in his innocence."

McFarland announced that he was eager to face his accusers. He said: "I know nothing of the charge except what the constable making the arrest told me. I am innocent."

"My life has always been an open book and I demand, now that these charges have been given wide publicity, a speedy and most searching investigation."

Officer's Slayer Must Hang.

San Francisco, Jan. 19.—Paulos Prantikos, the Greek who murdered Policemen Gaster and Kenally at the Ferry building here has been convicted of first degree murder without recommendation from the jury. This means that he must hang.

"SQUAWK LIST" NOT UNUSUAL

Nat Goodwin's Former Associates, Now on Trial, Say Operations Legitimate.

New York, Jan. 19.—Great interest is displayed here today in the progress of the case against George Graham Rice, G. B. Scheffels and others for alleged misuse of the United States mails in an alleged get-rich-quick scheme. Rice, who was prominent with Nat C. Goodwin, the actor, in mining ventures in Goldfield, Nev., displayed no little ability as an orator in conducting his own defense. He challenged the government to produce any false entries in the books of his concern, declaring that if the Scheffels concern was guilty of crooked dealings, all firms doing a brokerage business in Wall street were equally guilty.

In explaining the list of names found in the office, known as the "squawk" list, Rice stated that the list contained nothing more than the names of dissatisfied customers, and that it was customary for all brokerage firms to keep a list of their customers who were unusually hard to please.

Sheridan "Vets" in Combat.

Sheridan, Or., Jan. 19.—A three cornered fight took place at the Red Front stables Monday morning in which the

three veterinary surgeons of Sheridan took part. Dr. Davis and Dr. Armstrong, once partners, opened the bout. Dr. Davis striking at his adversary but missing his mark. He was promptly knocked down by Dr. Armstrong. Davis called his present partner, Dr. Hagerstrom, who rushed to his assistance, but Armstrong took something from his pocket which caused Dr. Hagerstrom to hurry to cover. Armstrong claims it was one of his surgical tools, while others say it looked like a gun. Hagerstrom evidently took the latter view.

ASKS CORRIGAN TO PROVE "DIRTY MONEY" CHARGES

New York, Jan. 19.—Charles F. Murphy, big chief of Tammany hall, today is peeved at Magistrate Corrigan's assertion that "some one high up in the Tiger organization is accepting dirty money." He challenges the magistrate to make good his charge in these words: "Why does Corrigan not expose this man if he knows what he is talking about? I hope District Attorney Whitman will investigate the truth of the statement. I promise to give him all the assistance possible, because if any man in the organization is accepting 'dirty money' I would like to know about it."

Runaway Girl Suffers Hardships.

San Bernardino, Cal., Jan. 19.—Faint and willing to return to her home, 15-year-old Adela Kretschmer is waiting here today in the detention home the arrival of her father from San Francisco. The child is recovering from a frightful experience in the Mojave desert which resulted from her attempt to walk to San Bernardino from Hesperia, 80 miles away. Near Oro Grande yesterday the child became exhausted and swooned near a Santa Fe switching sta-

tion. She was found by a railroad crew. Her feet were swollen and blistered and she bore many marks of her terrible tramp through the sands.

Physicians in Labeled Fight. San Francisco, Jan. 19.—Among \$100,000 for alleged libelous charges. Dr. Arthur H. White, warden of the city and county hospital, has today entered suit against Dr. Philip King Brown, visiting physician at the same institution and one of the most prominent practitioners on the coast.

FIRE RAGES IN LINER'S HOLD; DAMAGE HEAVY

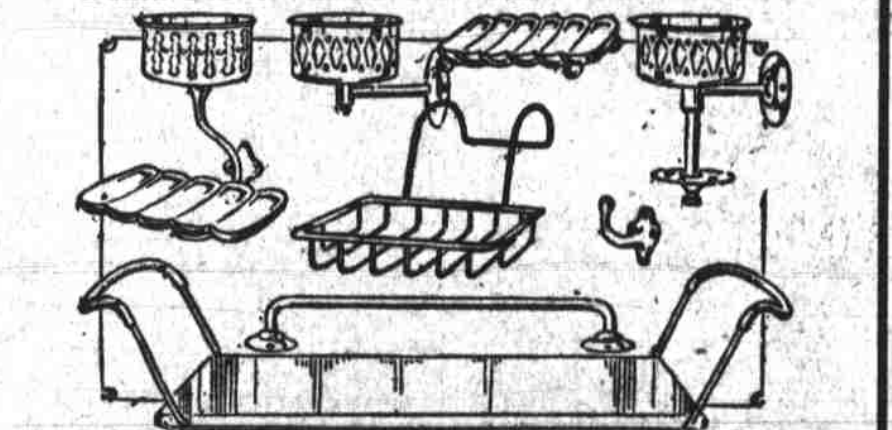
