

## ALL MEALS ARE JUST THE SAME

Monotony in Meals Will Characterize Expedition to Mt. McKinley.

(United Press Leased Wire.)

Tacoma, Wash., Jan. 22.—Belmore Brown, Tacoma mountaineer and explorer, and party will leave Tacoma Thursday or Friday in another attempt to reach the top of the continent, the crest of Mount McKinley. The party will consist of Professor Parker of Columbia university, Mell Lavo, expert photographer, and Arthur M. Allen and Belmore Brown.

The trip will be made with the aid of dogs, sleds and snowshoes and the ascent will be begun from the northeast base of the mountain. The early spring was chosen because the air is clearer and the snow firmer. The party expects to reach the mountain by the end of March, and to reach the peak within two weeks after.

"The menu during the attempt will be as follows," said Belmore Brown.

"Breakfast—One hardtack, two cups of tea, one third pound pemmican.

"Dinner—One hardtack; two cups of tea, one third pound pemmican.

"Supper—One hardtack, two cups of tea, one third pound pemmican.

"Monotony? Perhaps it will be, but nobody considers that a disadvantage compared with the magnitude of the ascent if we succeed."

## OREGON ELECTRIC TRAIN KILLS AGED MAIDEN LADY

Forest Grove, Or., Jan. 22.—Miss Mary James, age 71, failed either to see or hear a Portland bound Oregon Electric car when she was crossing Second street Sunday until she reached the middle of the track. She was struck and knocked nearly 20 feet. She died in 20 minutes. Eye witnesses said the motorman shut off the power, reversed the brakes, blew the whistle and rang the bell, and the jury brought in a verdict of accidental death.

Miss James was born in Iowa and came to Forest Grove from Nebraska 15 years ago. A brother, Edwin James, lives at Laidlaw, Or.

## PORT OF UMPQUA TO AID RAILROADS

Douglas County to Lead in Movement to Improve Harbor.

(Special to The Journal.)

Roseburg, Or., Jan. 22.—Petitions will be presented to the county court of Douglas county within a short time asking for the incorporation of the Port of Umpqua, as the result of a movement which has been on foot for several months and has for its object the commercial development of all that portion of northern Douglas county, from Drain westward to the coast, with Gardiner as the place of entry.

It is said that territory within the boundaries of the proposed port contains about \$10,000,000 worth of taxable property and has approximately 1200 voters. Once the port is established the voters may authorize a bond issue with which to improve the harbor at the mouth of the Umpqua river, and by this inducement to increased navigation it is hoped to bring about the building of a railroad, with Drain as the gateway.

## "PHONE REPAIRMAN" PROVES TO BE ROBBER

Chicago, Ill., Jan. 22.—A robber who obtained entrance to the home of H. B. Swensnik, 334 West Sixteenth street, by representing that he was sent there to "change the wires on the telephone," robbed Mrs. Swensnik of a pair of earrings, a locket and a bracelet at the point of a revolver.

The valuables are worth \$1000, according to the valuation placed on them by the victim when the police made an investigation. She told the police that a man telephoned that he would be over to her house in a few minutes to change the wires on her telephone. She said she told him that it was working all right and did not need to be changed. He insisted that he had orders to change the wiring and would have to do it.

When he arrived he disconnected the wires so that the telephone was out of service. Then he drew a revolver and threatened Mrs. Swensnik. "Take those diamond earrings off, and be quick about it," the robber demanded. He then demanded a diamond set locket which his victim was wearing, together with a bracelet, and they were handed over.

Mrs. Swensnik said that the robber then dragged her into a room, but her pleading and the sight of her baby, which commenced crying, resulted in the man's leaving after he had threatened to come back and kill her if she screamed before five minutes.

## I. W. W. DESCEND ON SAN FRANCISCO

Members Flooding to Bay City to Demand Right of Free Speech.

San Francisco, Jan. 22.—War that threatens serious consequences is on in San Francisco between members of the Industrial Workers of the World flocking here from all parts of the Pacific coast, and the city administration.

Immediately after difficulties at Aberdeen, Wash., and Fresno, Cal., were settled, the advocates of free speech began a campaign here. Clashes between the police and I. W. W. sympathizers resulted in a number of persons being injured and the arrest of several leaders of the organization. The officers of the order have sent appeals up, and down the coast and every train brings additions to their ranks.

Chief of Police White has taken extraordinary precautions to avert serious disorders. All street speakers inciting trouble are arrested. Tonight the police have word that a conspiracy is on foot for a big demonstration and more trouble is feared.

Labor leaders here have lined up against the I. W. W.'s and President Keene of the Pacific division of the International Longshoremen's association has sent a letter to 60 locals of the union which is affiliated with the American Federation of Labor, denouncing the Industrial Workers as a "menace to organized labor." He says they are against every man who wants to have a home and terms them the "irresponsible wholesale wreckers."

Pacific University, Forest Grove, Or., Jan. 22.—As an end to a long continued agitation for the adoption of dancing at Pacific, it was announced at chapel. It had been decided that the present attitude of the faculty and students did not justify the permission. Some time ago a petition representing 58 per cent of the entire student body was presented to the faculty recommending dancing under proper supervision, but at the same time a counter petition was sent in against the adoption of so radical a change in the social life of the institution, which was signed by 28 per cent of the student body. Because of the latter petition and because the faculty was about evenly divided, it was decided it would not be wise to permit the pastime.

## YOUNGEST AVIATOR FALLS THRO' 'HOLE'

Provident Air Bank Saves Life of Boy Airman; Other Sensations.

Dominique Field, Jan. 22.—To his presence of mind and a provident air bank, encountered in the nick of time, Farnum Fish, the youngest licensed aviator in the world, today owes his life. Fish furnished the 20,000 spectators at yesterday's aviation events with a thrill that satiated their sensation loving appetites when he plunged earthward from a height of 1000 feet, his biplane righting itself when less than 500 feet from the ground, and sailing to a safe landing in a far corner of the field. The young flyer, who is but 17 years of age, stated that his machine dropped through a "hole" in the air, and that he managed by desperate clinging to keep his seat until he encountered another current that bore him up.

Albert Elton produced the second shiver of horror of the day, when he dropped from a height of 100 feet, smashing his planes but escaping without injury.

Charles Stevens, pilot of a gas bag, floated into a fog bank and pulled his rip cord at a height of 200 feet, believing the balloon to be close to earth. Stevens and a passenger sustained painful bruises.

The feature of today's program was to be a true "celestial marriage," with Neil Cochran and Leona Cowan the contracting parties, Glenn Martin driving their nuptial biplane. The usual complement of races and exhibitions were scheduled to complete the program.

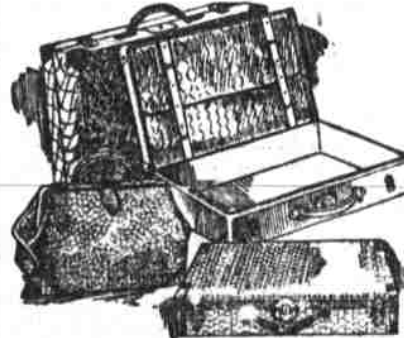
