

POOR UNCLE TOM WILL BE "GOAT"

Theatrical Managers to Act
Leading Parts in Annual
Follies.

Preparations for the First Annual Follies to be given at the Heilig theatre Thursday night are progressing most satisfactorily, according to a bulletin issued at noon today by Charles N. Ryan of the Empress, Cal S. Heilig of the Heilig, and Larry Keating of the Lyric.

The managers who are responsible for the Follies still insist that they will be allowed to live in this community after perpetrating "Uncle Tom's Cabin" with themselves in the principal parts, and after feeling of the public pulse they declare the playgoing populace to be hungry for real art as it will be demonstrated.

The version of the famous old play which has been selected for histrionic massacre is that of a well known Portland newspaper man, and was intended by him as a stepping stone to fame.

Victim of Hook Worm.

For some reason he has never before been able to secure a cast of sufficient strength to carry the piece.

It is well known that "Uncle Tom" died a victim to the hook worm instead of being assassinated by Simon Legree, and it is contended that had Pure Food Wiley lived at that day he would have insisted on Mrs. Stowe purifying her boobies to that extent. Manager Heilig declares that the play given by the managers shall conform to truth, regardless of the story as the famous woman writer told it.

For the same reason there is trouble between Manager Baker and Manager Cordray as to the use of a burro for Marks to ride in making his entrance. Cordray wants the mule and Baker says the animal that was really used was a Spanish mule. There being none of the latter in Portland it is thought probable that a compromise will be made by using an automobile.

Must Wear Tights.

"Bill" Pangle, who is in charge of costume and properties for the big production, announces that he is ready with everything except a pair of tights for George Baker. As "Little Eva" it is necessary that Mr. Baker's lower limbs be covered with fleshings. Mr. Pangle declares that he will meet the emergency even if he is compelled to splice several pairs of churros girls' wardrobe.

The noonday bulletin states that "Un-

cle Tom" will be only one of a number of features, ridiculous and beautiful, that have been devised by the managers for the entertainment of their friends at the Follies. Those attending will be greeted at the entrance to the theatre and will be furnished several hours of splendid amusement.

Tickets may be exchanged for reserved seats on and after Tuesday morning. Those holding exchange tickets will be given first choice of seats at the Heilig box office.

"HOLLY" CLUB TO BOOST FOR HOLLINGSWORTH

The "Holly" club, the first political organization this year, formed by the friends of W. B. Hollingsworth, candidate for nomination for sheriff on the Republican ticket, was launched Friday night at Draw hall on Second street. Hollingsworth is chief deputy in the office of Sheriff Stevens.

Penumbra Kelly, head of the Kelly clan, was selected chairman of the "Holly" club, with Charles Herwig as secretary. A committee on permanent organization and campaign work was selected, which consists of Harry G. Allen, W. J. McGinn and W. A. Mercer. The chairman called for volunteer representatives from the various wards and precincts in the county. Each ward representative will be expected to organize a "Holly" club in his ward.

Among the friends of the candidate who spoke Friday night were Rufus Holman, J. N. Barde, Frank Tillman, Edward Duffy and T. H. Rudey. Mr. Holman was especially enthusiastic and Barde spoke of him as a person who had worked his way from the lower run.

One of the principles of the Hollingsworth platform will be continuation of the policies maintained by Sheriff Stevens. Another meeting of the "Holly" club will be held in two weeks.

Hollingsworth filed his declaration of intention yesterday afternoon. In this declaration he says: "If I am nominated and elected I will work for the best interests of all the people, my employers, conduct the business of the office honestly and economically, and enforce all laws impartially." He wishes the following words printed after his name on the ballot: "Honest, economical, business administration; impartial enforcement of law."

Iowa Witnesses Appear.

THIRD CONCERT PROVES SUCCESS

Symphony Orchestra Delights
Large Audience at Heilig
Theatre.

The third concert of the Portland Symphony Orchestra at the Heilig theatre yesterday afternoon was a success in every way. The beautiful spring-like weather favored a large crowd and it was there, the attendance being the largest since the opening of the season. John Bayley, veteran bandmaster and orchestra director, was the conductor yesterday afternoon, and the symphony was Mozart's "G Minor," No. 40. This symphony is not extremely heavy, but is pleasing, with possibilities for charming tone pictures. Mr. Bayley is a calm conductor and confident. A Wunderwald was concert master, and to the fullest satisfaction. In this connection the first violin section is entitled to compliments for the improved bowing yesterday, the eight bows working almost as one.

Other numbers on the program were the overture to "Rosamunde," by Schubert, which was the opening number; Saint-Saens' "Danse Macabre," a descriptive number; Elgar's "Salut D'Amour"; "Spring Morning," serenade by Lacombe; two numbers from "A Day in Venice," by Nivini; and "Polish National Dance," by Scharwenka. Conductor Bayley and the orchestra were enthusiastically applauded but no encores were given. Mr. Bayley evidently figuring that the applause was more in the nature of a sign of appreciation than a demand for more.

The fourth concert will be directed by Harold Bayley and the symphony will be Brahms No. 4 in E Minor. The overture will be "A Midsummer Night's Dream," by Mendelssohn. The date has not yet been definitely fixed.

Farmers Want Short Course.

Hermiston, Or., Jan. 22.—The Hermiston Commercial club has taken up with Dr. James Withycomb, director of the Oregon experiment station, the possibility of conducting a short course farmers' school in this city. Dr. Withycomb has expressed himself in favor of the plan and will do what he can to secure for Hermiston this course. If this plan succeeds it would be the same as the farmers' winter course given at Corvallis, only shorter. It is proposed to hold sessions of 10 days or two weeks and the subjects taken up would be such as are of interest to the farmers in this section.
