

KAVANAUGH SEEKS REFUGE IN A LESS NOISY COURTROOM

Wide Trial Now Held in the County Court's Quarters—Real Estate Man Challenged by Defense.

Tedious questioning for the selection of a jury in the trial of Louis J. Wilde, who is charged with the embezzlement of \$99,000 from the Oregon Trust & Savings bank, resulted this morning in the elimination of one man by the empty challenge by the defense. It was a session devoid of excitement.

Because of the clutter of the steelworkers on the west wing of the new court house, Judge Kavanaugh was compelled to abandon his own courtroom on the fifth floor and seek refuge in the county court room on the second floor, where the ability to hear is much improved.

Two hours were spent this morning in the examination of Charles G. Paine, a real estate dealer of 1641 Olm street, ending in his being challenged by the defense as soon as he had been passed by both sides for cause. While Paine's answers failed to develop any ground upon which a challenge for cause could be based, his hesitancy and qualified responses apparently convinced the counsel for Wilde that they did not want him on the jury.

Cousin of R. M. La Follette.
C. B. La Follette, another real estate man, residing at 106 East Eighty-first street North, was called in Paine's place and his examination by Dan J. Maloney, of Wilde's counsel, had not been finished when the noon recess came. He has been for eight years in Montana, lived before that in Sheridan, Or., and formerly engaged in the grocery business.

La Follette stated that he is a second cousin of Robert M. La Follette, the presidential candidate, his father being a cousin of the senator. He is the second man on the jury related as a cousin to a man of national fame, L. A. La Jole being a cousin of the famous baseball outfielder and batter of the Cleveland nine of the same name.

La Follette seems likely to qualify as a juror, and unless something unexpected develops, is likely to be one of the 12 men finally chosen. He once had a deposit of \$200 in the Oregon Trust & Savings bank, he said, but it was there only a few months. He is acquainted with Walter H. Moore, former president of that institution, and with W. Cooper Morris, ex-cashier, who is now serving a six-year term for embezzlement.

Saw Bowerman's Picture.
During the examination of Paine the courtroom crowd enjoyed a laugh at the expense of Jay Bowerman, one of Wilde's attorneys. Incidentally, Bowerman's race for governor in 1910. Deputy District Attorney Fitzgerald asked Paine if he knew Bowerman, and the taleman responded:

"I think I had his picture on my wall."
Paine ventured the opinion that "where there is so much smoke there must be some fire," and doubt as to what he meant by this was apparently one of the reasons why the attorneys for Wilde decided he would not be a good man on the jury from their point of view.

Four possible peremptory challenges are now left, two for the state and two for the defense. The next man who qualifies, the state will be called upon to use its second peremptory, followed in order by the two remaining challenges for the defendant and the final one for the state.

Because of the slow progress made this morning, it seems unlikely that a jury will be secured before Wednesday, though by holding long sessions this and tomorrow afternoon the jury may be completed by tomorrow evening, ready for the production of testimony Wednesday morning.

mate friends of the Reid family, and later the entire party went on an automobile sightseeing tour over New York city. Tonight there will be an informal dinner at the Reid home, with Cardinal Barlow as one of the guests of honor.

Princess Patricia, who is declared to have rejected three thrones by refusing royal offers of marriage, is most enthusiastic over New York. She is the first princess of the royal house of England to set foot in the United States.

The Duke of Connaught many years ago visited the United States as Prince Arthur of Connaught.

Reid Master of Arrangements.
Ambassador Reid arranged the arrival of the royal party in order that the duke's party might avoid the mob that awaited them at the station. His communications with the railroad officials and the private cars, "Cornwall" and "York" were detached from the Canadian express out the station and coupled onto the rear of the Rutland express. When the train pulled into the station Ambassador Reid and Mrs. Reid were standing on the platform awaiting their arrival.

Princess Patricia alighted first and extended her hand. The Reids bowed and Mrs. Reid murmured as she took the girl's hand: "So good of you to come, your highness."

She repeated the same phrase to both the duke and duchess as they alighted. Then the party was quickly escorted to four new automobiles of foreign make and imported expressly for the occasion.

Clings to Handbag.
The duke carried a small handbag to which he clung, despite all efforts to relieve him.

The Duke of Connaught and Mrs. Reid entered an automobile first and it whizzed away immediately. A second later the rest of the party were in machines and were following the first car as it sped toward the Reid mansion.

The automobiles then returned to the depot for the servants and luggage, of which there are 67 trunks and 40 bags. In the royal party are also Lieutenant Colonel Lowther, military aide to the duke; Captain Rivers-Bulkeley, controller of the royal household; Miss Pelly, lady in waiting to the duchess, and numerous maids and valets.

Butler Is Gilded Creature.

When the party arrived at the Reid mansion the door was opened by a butler garbed in knee breeches and gold lace. A crowd of 500 persons, the majority being women and girls, had gathered before the house to see the party.

Numerous society people, the names of all of whom are closely guarded, went to the Reid home during the morning.

While the visit of the Duke of Connaught, the duchess and the princess is unofficial, the cognizance of the United States government of their presence was evinced in the number of secret service operatives who were at the station, along the route and about the Reid mansion.

Upon the duke's arrival at the Reid home the ambassador submitted to him the entire program of entertainment to be provided. This began with the noon luncheon. Fifty persons dined with the Reids today. The affair is strictly private and no names of those present were given out. A musical was to follow the dinner.

The big dinner dance in honor of the royal party will be given tomorrow night. And, as previously reported, the list of invitations has been cut to 300, who are "commanded" to appear.

Plans Laid for Visit.

Washington, Jan. 22.—Ambassador Bryce of England today held a consultation with President Taft regarding the Duke of Connaught's visit to the capital Thursday. Official confirmation of the contemplated visit is now given at the embassy here. The duke, the duchess and Princess Patricia will spend the day at the White House inognito.

San Francisco, Jan. 22.—Edward S. Fitzpatrick, a clerk, and Carlton Moss, watchman, are dead and Mrs. E. B. Shaver, deserted, is in a hospital here as the result of an epidemic of suicide mania. Fitzpatrick took his life because of an unhappy marriage, Moss because he was out of work and crippled. The woman drank iodine. Moss died of self-asphyxiation and Fitzpatrick shot himself.

RICHESON FACES OUTER COLLAPSE

Murderer of Avis Linnell in Terror of Death; Still Hopes for Commutation.

Boston, Jan. 22.—Wasted and only a shadow of his former athletic self, Rev. Clarence V. T. Richeson, brutal murderer of pretty little Avis Linnell, whom he betrayed under promise of marriage and afterward poisoned by giving her a drug he said would hide her shame, cowers today in the gloomy old Charles street jail on the verge of utter collapse.

The shadow of the electric chair fills his sleeping and waking hours. The curt, cold words of Judge Sanderson, delivered more than a week ago, "to be put to death by having a current of electricity sent through your body, and may God in his infinite goodness have mercy on your soul," still ring in his ears. And, were he to know the truth, that all hope of a commutation of his sentence has vanished, he would, according to Sheriff Quinn, who has him watched night and day, become a gibbering maniac within a few hours.

Quinn tonight is troubled. He declared that all of the self reliance that formerly marked the man, and even the desperation of despair which resulted in his taking the "gambler's chance," and admitting his guilt in the hope of saving his life, has departed.

He is now a cowering coward, so nervous that the light cannot be turned off in his cell at night, kept from insanity only by the faint hope that the governor's council will yet intervene and save him from ignominious death, even though the alternative is a life spent behind the prison walls.

HOMESTEAD-LEWISTON RAILWAY SURVEY DONE

(Special to The Journal.)

Lewiston, Idaho, Jan. 22.—The survey of the Homestead-Lewiston line was completed Thursday, and the last of the engineering parties, under Engineer Watkins, departed for Salt Lake the same evening. The completed survey shows the distance from Homestead to Lewiston to be 126 miles, and estimates compiled from the engineers' data show the cost of construction will average \$40,000 per mile or over \$10,000,000 for the entire line.

There are long stretches where productive bars are crossed where the cost will be light, but at other points where the mountains pinch in, the engineers' estimates show the cost will reach \$250,000 per mile, which will make a high average for the entire distance.

The cost of maintenance will be very light, however, after the road is once completed, and aside from materially reducing the operating expenses, the line will open a new empire now devoted to livestock.

It is generally believed that the inauguration of operations on the Snake river line will result in a simultaneous construction on the Gilmore & Pittsburg down the Salmon river, and that the one line from the mouth of the Salmon river to Lewiston, 50 miles, will serve the two companies. This view is entertained because of the same interests being involved in the joint operation of the line down the Snake river from Lewiston to Riparian, and extending into the greater part of the orange valley. This last stretch of 50 miles above Lewiston embraces a large portion of the most expensive construction to be encountered between Lewiston and Homestead, and by the joint operation plan, the cost would be materially reduced as to make the project inviting to the two companies.

HOOD RIVER IS FORCED TO CHARTER REVISION

Hood River, Or., Jan. 22.—Realizing the futility of endeavoring to sell municipal bonds under the provisions of the present city charter, Mayor J. M. Wright has recommended a revision, and it is expected that a committee of attorneys will shortly be appointed to take up the work. When completed, the new charter will be voted on at an early date. The old charter was adopted many years ago, when Hood River was a hamlet of 500 inhabitants, and limits the city's legal indebtedness to the small amount of \$5000. Its growing needs make it necessary to exceed this limit.

There is no provision in the old charter for reducing the indebtedness on the water bonds for the proposed municipal system by direct taxation. Liquidation of the bonds being provided for from the revenues from the water system. Attorneys for bond houses have objected to this feature, and it will now be remedied, as will also a number of other provisions in the charter that are considered obsolete.

Dock Proposal Finding Favor.

Hood River, Or., Jan. 22.—Of 335 replies received by the Hood River county commissioners in answer to the proposition to bond the county for a public dock, 230 are favorable and 105 against, showing a majority so far of more than two to one for the dock. County Judge George Culbertson said today that statements published to the effect that taxpayers of the county are against the proposition has not so far been indicated, and that he looks for a big majority in favor of building the dock. If a special election is called, the voters will be allowed the privilege of voting for bond houses exclusive of the public dock proposition, so that it will not conflict with the road question.

OREGON SHOULD GROW POTATOES

Waste Places Would Produce Crop Equal to That of Ireland.

(Washington Bureau of The Journal.)

Washington, Jan. 22.—Secretary Wilson held up his hands in horror when he heard that Ireland is exporting potatoes to this country. And well he might, for the United States could export more than all that Ireland produces did the farmers of the country turn their attention to raising potatoes and merely devote the waste places and fence corners to that staple. Still, we are reminded by recent reports to the state department that Ireland does grow some potatoes. Consul G. E. Chamberlain at Cork has a report in the late number of the consular reports that shows the total production of Ireland to be about 140,000,000 bushels of potatoes. It is quite true that Oregon could produce as many or more if the market open to it demanded such a production, but there is a market and proper energy in seeking it would doubtless open a rich field for Oregon "spuds."

It may be interesting to see what Ireland, long famed for its potatoes, is doing in this line. The consul's report says:

"The potato crop in Ireland for 1911 is estimated at 3,694,358 long tons, or 137,491,290 bushels, an increase of 10,730,336 bushels over the previous year. The acreage of the crop was 591,269, as against 592,995 in 1910. The largest results were obtained in the north and west of Ireland, where the ordinary yield was about 280 bushels to the acre. The average for the whole of Ireland for the 10 year period 1901 to 1910 was 174.46 bushels, so that the yield for

1911 was more than 20 per cent above the normal crop."

CLIMATE OF OREGON IDEAL FOR WINERIES

(Washington Bureau of The Journal.)
Washington, Jan. 22.—According to a report from Consul W. Bardel at Rheims, France, the production of wine in that republic amounted in 1911 to 870,754,000 gallons, an increase of nearly 50 per cent over the production for 1910.

The climate of France is probably no better than that of Oregon. The climate of the famous Rhine country in Germany is almost as severe as that of Minnesota, for the Rhine freezes solid in winter.

Oregon may not care to specialize in wine, although it goes in heavily for hops and barley; still, should it ever care to do so, the example of France would be inspiring. The production of 51 of the 86 French departments was of sufficient importance to give in detailed statistical tables, but one department alone, that of Herault, is credited this year with about 30 per cent of the production of the whole country, while six departments produce two thirds of the entire output.

CHAMBERS ARE URGED TO SEND DELEGATES

Washington, Jan. 22.—Chambers of Commerce will be invited to send delegates to the navy league convention to be held in Washington beginning February 23. The entire session of February 23 will be devoted to the question of Panama canal tolls and the delegates will be asked to speak for their organizations.

Among the chambers of commerce authorized to send delegates are: New York, Chicago, Boston, Detroit, Philadelphia, Seattle, Los Angeles and San Francisco.

2561 KILL SELVES WITH FIREARMS

Suicide Rate Higher in 1910 Than in 1909, While Death Rate Is Lower.

(By the International News Service.)

Washington, Jan. 22.—According to the census bureau, the number of deaths from suicide recorded in the bureau's death registration area, for 1910, 8590, as against 9409 for 1909, but the death rate per 100,000 of population was only 16 for 1910 as compared with 18.5 for 1909.

Of the various means employed for committing suicide the most important, with the number of deaths for each, were: Fire arms, 2561; poison, 2456; hanging or strangulation, 1265; asphyxiation, 94; drowning, 817; cutting or piercing instruments, 544; jumping from high places, 137; crushing, 85; other means, 81.

There were 3019 murders in the country during the year.

Violent deaths were met by 92.3 persons out of every 100,000 in 1910.

Railroads killed the greatest number, 7377. Accidental drownings took the next number, 4818 having met death in this manner.

Automobiles killed 989 persons, 1.8 to every 100,000 inhabitants.

A death list for cities follows: Los Angeles, 280; Oakland, 135; San Francisco, 29; Denver, 178; Washington, D. C., 261; Chicago, 2094; Kansas City, Mo., 209; St. Louis, 604; New York, 3758 in 1910 and 4430 in 1909; Portland, Or., 167; Philadelphia, 1299; Seattle, 227; Spokane, 119.

ITALIANS BEGIN WORK IN TRIPOLI

Invaders Start Work on Three Railway Lines; First in the Country.

(United Press Leased Wire.)

Tripoli, Jan. 22.—With the arrival today of the first material for the construction of the three railroads which Italy has ordered built in Tripoli, Italy started fulfilling its plea of justification for the seizure of Tripoli, namely, that it might develop the country materially and morally.

The three lines that will at once be constructed will extend from Tripoli to Ain Zar, from Tripoli to Zannar, and from Tripoli along the coast to Tadmira, all of which points are now in the possession of the Italian troops. Later the roads will be pushed further into the desert and will be used at first as a means of transporting the supplies necessary for the army to effect the conquest of the remainder of the country.

The material came both from Venice and Syracuse, and was accompanied by a full corps of construction experts under whose direction the lines will be built. They will be the first railroads in Tripoli.

Matches "Short-Counted."

Indianapolis, Jan. 22.—If Isidor Wulfsch, city inspector of weights and measures, can have his way, short count matches are going to cease in Indianapolis. All over the country, from San Diego, Cal., to Portland, Maine, says Wulfsch, consumers are paying 5 cents for boxes supposed to contain 500 matches, when, in reality, they only hold anywhere from 300 to 350.
