

CONVICTS RAISE FUND FOR REWARD

Texas Prisoners Offer \$291 for Recapture of Two Escaped Honor Men.

Houston, Texas, Jan. 23.—Because the honor of the prison system was aspersed when two convicts escaped after the governor of the state has proposed putting all convicts on their honor not to escape if allowed to work on roads, convicts at the state penitentiary have subscribed a sum of \$291 as a reward for the apprehension of the escaped men.

Recently Governor Colquitt proposed a plan whereby convicts would be placed upon their honor not to escape and put to work building roads. No guards would be provided and the prisoners virtually would be free, with the exception that they would be compelled to work where directed by the state and during their sentence. The plan was accepted by the convicts, all eager to pledge their honor not to escape.

The recent escape of two convicts has aroused indignation among the other convicts and 30 of them raised \$291 in amounts of from \$1 to \$10 and forwarded it to the governor as a reward for the apprehension and return of the fugitives who violated their own honor and aspersed that of the convict body.

HUNTINGTON MAY GET ELECTRIC LIGHT PLANT

COMMITTEE NOT TO SEE TRUST'S "COST SHEET"

Washington, Jan. 23.—Chairman Stanley of the house committee investigating the Steel trust yesterday announced that corporations' cost sheet need not be produced before the committee but that the latter's accountant would examine the trust's books and report confidentially on the matter.

This course was decided upon after James Farrell, president of the Steel corporation, had protested against producing the cost sheet declaring that if such a plan were carried out that the trust's foreign competitors could ascertain the corporation's business secrets and be in a position to destroy the trust's foreign business.

CLERGYMEN IN UNION BAR SUNDAY FUNERALS

London, Jan. 23.—Clergymen, Anglicans and Nonconformists, are on strike at Rotherham against Sunday funerals. They have formed themselves into a union and delivered to the town council an ultimatum that they will not officiate at Sunday funerals except in urgent cases, where for sanitary reasons interment cannot be delayed. And they insist that then Sunday funerals must take place before 9:30 o'clock in the morning.

WRECKED BY STUDY, YOUTH KILLS HIMSELF

Ashland, Or., Jan. 23.—Frederick Joseph Roche, son of J. F. Roche of this city, committed suicide yesterday, the result of despondency over a nervous breakdown from overstudy in the engineering department of the University of Colorado about four years ago, from which he was unable to recover. He arose yesterday about 11 o'clock and had breakfast without dressing. His mother said he seemed weaker than usual and while he talked intelligently about various things, was sleepy and listless. She asked if he felt tired and he replied that he did and she went from the room to leave him in quiet. He watched her closely while she was in the room and soon after she had gone upstairs, she heard a noise but did not immediately come down, as it sounded like the closing of a door. When she did return to the lower floor, she did not see him and upon investigation found him in his father's den, a place he seldom entered, lying upon the floor with a wound in his head. He had taken his father's .30.30 rifle and shot himself, the bullet entering above the ear and coming out on the other side.

PORT OF TILLAMOOK IS DECLARED LEGAL

Tillamook, Or., Jan. 23.—The Port of Tillamook is a legal organization, according to the ruling of Circuit Judge Benson, the decision having been received in a letter to Attorney H. T. Botts, president of the port commission. The validity of the port was attacked by farmers just as the commission was about to issue \$450,000 in bonds for harbor improvements. The main point of contention was based on the fact that a Port of Tillamook was in existence when the present port was organized.

Great jubilation exists among the adherents of the port. It has been reported here that the secretary of war has recommended an immediate appropriation of \$200,000 to commence the improvement of Tillamook bay. The plan recommended by government engineers involves the expenditure of \$514,000, one half of which is to be raised locally.

DR. STAPP OF ABERDEEN MUST SERVE 9 MONTHS

Aberdeen, Wash., Jan. 23.—Dr. M. Rob Stapp must serve nine months in the county jail for complicity in a criminal operation which resulted in the death of Miss Emily Bauer, several months ago. The supreme court has denied Stapp the right of new trial and affirmed the sentence of the lower court. Stapp's arrest followed his issuing a certificate stating that Miss Bauer had died of pneumonia. His trial last September was most sensational. Miss Bauer was a sister of John and Will Bauer, who are alleged to have been killed by their half-witted uncle, John Tornow, in the woods near Satsop September 13 last.

SOCIALISTS HOLD REICHSTAG POWER

Indications Now Are That "Progressives" Will Control German Assembly.

Berlin, Jan. 23.—A call for the Reichstag to convene February 7 was issued today, and from all indications the Socialists will be in control with at least 110 members.

The exact personnel of the body cannot be determined until next Thursday, when there will be rebelling in 23 districts, in which none of the contestants at the general election January 13 received a plurality of the votes cast. The conservatives today admit that they fear that the Socialists, Liberals and Leftists will combine in an effort to control all legislation. In the general election the Socialists came within seven votes of capturing Emperor William's home district.

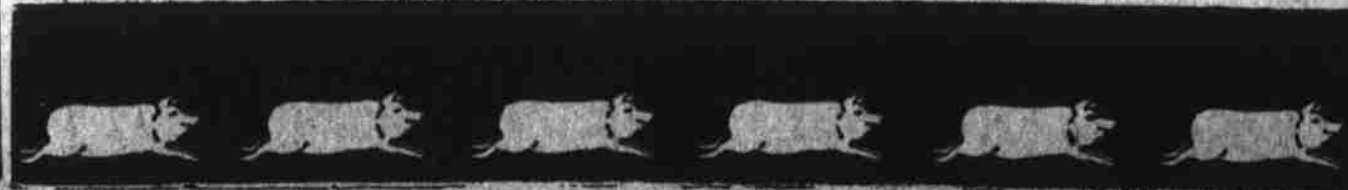
