

RIEND OF YOUTHS HERE; TO DELIVER SPEECH TO PUPILS

Judge Willis Brown, Founder
of "Boy City," Doing Won-
derful Work in Redemption
of Erring Lads.

Judge Willis Brown, founder of the juvenile court system in Utah, originator of the Boy City idea being carried out at Charlevoix, Mich., and originator and administrator of the parental court of Gary, Ind., is to talk to the boys and girls and fathers and mothers of Portland on Tuesday, January 30. He is coming here under the auspices of the Congress of Mothers.

The fame of Judge Brown as the friend of the boy and of the wonderful work he is doing for boys is national. A great deal of attention has been directed to the "Boy City" established by Judge Brown, which is being conducted under the direction of the National Boy City association. It is a "place for boys to find themselves," is the definition given it by the judge.

Instead of sending boys to a reform school or prison, they are given an opportunity to work out their own redemption at Boy City. This is a complete city, with politics, mayor, city council, public utilities, bank, daily paper, mercantile establishments, church, postoffice, entertainments and athletics.

Learning to Work.

But it is not a city established just for fun. It is a place where boys learn to work and throw off the habits they have contracted through bad environment in the city. It is said in Boy City address becomes a hardship and work a pleasure. Each boy is measured not by what he has done or by what his parents are or have, but by what he is and does in there, by his conduct and by the manner in which he bears the share of Boy City responsibilities.

The work of the parental court as conducted by Judge Brown at Gary is unique and a step decidedly in advance of any other movement to aid the boy at the time of his greatest need. The court works in cooperation with the schools, in fact, is a department of the school system.

When a child has been before the principal and found to be truant, wilful or incorrigible to a degree which interferes with his mental development and with the discipline and care of other children, a petition is made by the principal to the parental court and the child is transferred to this department of the school.

Moral Education.

By law the school is given control of the boy. If it is determined that the boy needs a moral and religious education he is transferred to Boytown, the special farm school conducted by the Gary school system, similar to the one in Michigan.

The only record in the case is that of the removal of custody from parents and the assuming of custody by the school for an indeterminate time as provided by law. That when the child has received sufficient instruction and education in morals, he is transferred to a regular school where custody is confined to certain hours. He thus escapes the odium and taint of courts and court records.

Judge Brown receives many letters from worried mothers and fathers and he answers them with wholesome advice. Not long ago he received a letter from a worried mother, which said:

"My boy of 13 is a runaway. His running away began about a year ago. It first commenced by running away from school. Several times the truant officer found him and brought him home or to school. Then he ran out of the city. He just came back from a two weeks' trip. I worry myself sick. I told him if he ran away again I would send him to the reform school. What shall I do?"

Judge Brown replied as follows:

MOVING FEVER. MEN WILL HOLD EQUAL SUFFRAGE CONVENTION HERE

"moving fever" are two different boys, both physically and mentally. "You must know that sex development during early adolescence changes a boy's whole make up, some more than others. The boy himself cannot understand the change nor why he should feel and act differently."

"A year ago your boy was purely a child in every condition. He took everything for granted, and you and others who assumed control did most of the thinking for the boy. Told him what to do, what not to do. Then, unknown to you and himself, the boy entered his adolescent period and became uneasy and wary of the old situation. He desired immediately the association of other boys and even men. He wanted to see things. Wanted to do just what his desire prompted."

"Visions appeared. From what he read, heard and observed his mind gave definite form and these things called to him."

"The fact that instead of joining a gang of boys, at this age of 12, building a shack or congregating on some corner night after night, he desires to travel and roam about, makes him no different in this peculiar changing period from boyhood to manhood, a six-year process in many cases, than the other boys who may choose the more normal gang activities."

Send Him to Country.

"The fact that your boy comes home after his trips proves that he is not a runaway because of unpleasant conditions in the home. His returning voluntarily has proved his need of you."

"If you are able to do so, I would advise you to send your boy to the country, where he could live without the restraint incident to city life."

"Or, better, of course, assuming that his father is living, let father and son take week-end trips into the country. I have started out with my boy on a Saturday evening and returned containing grub and skillet. We have walked out some country road and visited some farmhouse, there secured some fresh eggs and milk. In some wooded places we have even had a meal and then tramped on until we discovered some great barn with a hayloft. Here we have secured permission to sleep for the night. Oh, we have discovered many things, chief of which was that we were just two boys. One somewhat younger than the other, that's all."

"This would be a sure remedy for the 'moving fever.' I have given this prescription many times, and it always works."

To Address Pupils.

"The boy himself will suggest the trips when the fever comes on, he will not recognize it as such, but if the father is always ready, and not too busy, to save his own son, the boy will meet almost any expectation."

"I wonder if your boy's father will think this worth while. Most fathers do not. That's why so many boys go it alone. To me the astonishment is not so much that boys get the 'moving fever,' but that so few have it when I was a younger boy, and I know that I did not desire to cause pain and worry to my mother. My greatest sorrow was that she could not understand, and that father was just a trifle too busy to attempt it."

Judge Brown will deliver an address to the pupils of the Jefferson high school Tuesday afternoon at 3 o'clock. Tuesday night he will deliver an address at the White Temple, Twelfth and Taylor streets. A small admission fee will be charged.

LOST UMPQUA INDIAN MAY GET TRIBAL LANDS

Cottage Grove, Ore., Jan. 25.—All the remaining tribal lands of the Umpqua and Calapooya Indian tribes have been petitioned for by Jake Pearn, who claims to be the only living member of the two tribes. The lands petitioned for were contained in allotments made to the tribes in 1888, and there are still 1480 acres, 480 acres situated seven miles northeast of Cottage Grove, in Lane county, and 1000 acres three miles east of Anlauf, in Douglas county.

The testimony was taken here before Special United States Government Agent E. M. Garber of the Roseburg land office,linger Hermann, who was in the land office at the time the allotments were made, appearing for the claimant.

**ROOSEVELT NOT MAKING
PUBLIC SPEECHES NOW**

(United Press Special Wire.)

New York, Jan. 25.—"Not making public speeches now," has been declined an invitation to address St. Louis "Million population club" on Washington's birthday, when the organization holds a big banquet.

Roosevelt also declined to make any comment on the Oklahoma convention's selection of Taft delegates.

County Clubs to Be Formed in State—Issues of Woman's Rights Will Be Discussed in Public Debate.

A state convention of men working for equal suffrage in Oregon will be held in Portland during July or August. This was the announcement made last evening by Attorney William Davis, president of the Oregon Equal Suffrage club. County clubs are to be formed throughout the state from which delegates will be selected to attend the state convention.

"It will be an old style convention," said Attorney Davis in speaking of the matter last evening. "but it will not be an assembly. We want cooperation with every club in the state. Plans for the statewide campaign will be discussed at the convention. The question will be on the ballot, and we are going to carry it this year."

The speaker reported of his success in having the State Federation of Labor endorse the suffrage amendment at the recent meeting in The Dalles.

Debate to be Held.

The amendment was taken up out of its regular order in the labor convention, where it was unanimously endorsed. "The large part of labor vote opposed the amendment last year on account of a property qualification attached," said Attorney Davis, "but this year the amendment extends the ballot to every woman. The president announced that a debate will be held at Eugene between C. N. McArthur of Portland, and a Mr. Whistler of Eugene within a few weeks. The Eugene man is to oppose woman suffrage. The local suffrage club has issued an invitation to any opponent of the movement to come forth in a debate."

"To such a degree have we eliminated the mother element from the body politics," said S. S. Gillespie, "that we are rapidly drifting to anarchy." He advocated woman suffrage as the best route to travel in order to get back to a safe and sane order of things.

Attorney Charles J. Schnabel prefaced his remarks by telling how he had been cautioned to not attend the meeting. He said that six persons had called him on the telephone, each one attempting to disguise his voice, and advised him not to attend the meeting.

"This question seems to be a live wire," said the speaker. "This is the first suffrage meeting I have ever attended, but from what I am able to learn, the movement has gained surprising grounds this year."

Says Day Will Come.

"Woman is coming into her own. The day will come when we will be mystified to account for the long delay in debarring woman from the right to vote. She pays taxes, and has to answer to our demands of government, so why deprive her of the right to vote? Why allow the hoards of unlettered men go to the polls, where they vote upon questions affecting woman, tax her property, and exercise other privileges governing her? I assume that we agree that she has a right to vote. The next question is to put it into practice."

Here the speaker urged the organization, and personal work to carry the amendment.

Mrs. Mary L. Stevens, of Tacoma, who has been an ardent worker for suffrage in Washington told of Tacoma's recall of Mayor Fawcett. She said the recall was a mistake because the voters were not educated. She urged the women to study their charters when they are given the ballot.

"The psychological moment is at hand, for the amendment to carry," said Frances Gottshall. She declared women are awakening to their right and will assert it. The speaker does not believe in the English style of fighting for the ballot, but urged education and personal persuasion.

Mrs. Abigail Scott Duniway presided.
