

MAN OF PEOPLE SEEKS PLACE IN THE U. S. SENATE

State Senator Milton A. Miller
Points to His 14 Years'
Service in the Oregon Legis-
lature.

With a record of 14 years' service in the Oregon legislature, being elected as a Democrat in a Republican county term after term, Senator Milton A. Miller of Lebanon has announced his candidacy for the United States senate to succeed Jonathan Bourne Jr., Mr. Miller is state committeeman for Oregon in the Democratic national committee, which gives him standing in the councils of the party, and is the son of one of the pioneer families of Oregon, a family which crossed the plains in 1847.

Senator Miller is a native Oregonian, having been born in Linn county, where his whole life has been spent. His father was R. C. Miller, well known to every pioneer of Linn county. Milton Miller was educated in the common schools and in the state university. He, early in life, showed a disposition to enter politics, and soon became prominent in his county, always on the minority side. On his record as a man of the people, as a legislator with the interests of the common people uppermost in his mind, Mr. Miller will make his candidacy for the senate of the United States.

Economy, Efficiency.
"Economy and efficiency in the public service, with a firm determination to safeguard as far as possible the rights of the common people, have been the things for which I have labored in my public work," said Senator Miller, "being of the common people, it was but natural that I should direct my efforts in their behalf. And in return I have had the honor of receiving the confidence of the people, so fully that I have never been defeated for public office, despite the fact that as a Democrat I made every race in a Republican county."

"I have always and ever supported the Oregon system and made every effort to bring the government close to the people, who support it and are really the government as well as the governed. I supported in the legislature the bill requiring that state funds be deposited in several banks, interest and security being demanded. This bill was intended to give to the state the profits formerly taken by the state treasurer, and after bitter opposition, it was passed."

"The legislative session of 1909 is known as the salary raising session, when the will of the people was overruled. The records show that I voted consistently with the interests of the people. Whenever opportunity presented I have voted for flat salaries for public officials, in an effort to put every office on a fair basis."

Helped Defeat Fee System.
"At the last session of the legislature I introduced and helped to pass the bill which will do away with the last relic of the fee system, the bill placing the state printer on a flat salary."
"It was I who introduced the resolution providing that the state ratify the adoption of the income tax law, and I reported the resolution because I thought it was in the interest of all the people. I supported the fellow servant bill, the employers' liability act, the corporation tax bills and other measures that brought hundreds of thousands of dollars to the public treasury."
"Ever since the adoption of the direct primary law in 1904, attempts have

New York, Jan. 25.—Dr. Frederick A. Lucas, director of the American Museum of Natural History, is of the opinion that great men resemble birds or beasts. "I fully agree with the Rev. Dr. P. S. been made to annul or destroy it, giving the people no chance to try the law out as should be done. I have supported the law by voice and vote at every opportunity. Senate bill 112, introduced in 1907, had for its purpose to destroy Statement No. 1. The bill was defeated in the senate. House bill No. 244, introduced in 1909, providing for a return to the convention system, was defeated in the senate by a vote of 12 to 17. I spoke against the bill and predicted that if it should pass the people would apply the referendum to it and defeat it by a vote of 6 to 1.

Progressive Candidate.
"In the session of 1909, house bill No. 269 was introduced. This bill provided that before voting at a primary the voter must swear that at the last election he voted for the candidate of his party for the office of president, vice president, congressman and governor, an apparent effort to make the primary law a joke. I am glad to say that I helped to defeat that bill, too. Another bill having for its object the restraint of the circulation of petitions was defeated in the senate. Most of the time during my legislative experience I have been on the committee on elections, a post that added me in working for the interests of the direct primary."

"My friends have every reason to consider me a progressive Democrat. The tendency throughout the United States is to bring the government closer to the people, to do away with the mystery which has befooled some of the governmental functions. I believe thoroughly in the people and in the government, feeling that the people will finally triumph in all matters for the common good. It is impossible for the masses to be wrong very much of the time."

Mr. Miller's family consists of a daughter, Mrs. S. M. Miles of Salem, and a grandson 20 months old. Mrs. Miller died a few years ago.

OIL TANK ORDINANCE VETOED BY THE MAYOR

In accordance with an announcement made by Mayor Rushlight several days ago to a delegation from South Portland, he yesterday afternoon vetoed the oil tank ordinance. The reasons for the veto were the same as those given the South Portlanders and published in The Journal heretofore.

"The trend of the times," concludes the veto message, "is to cheapen the necessities of life and to facilitate the transaction of business in every way possible. If we are to help reduce the cost of living we should try to encourage and not to hamper the industries that are established in our midst. I have been reliably informed that the dealers and manufacturers who do business in the vicinity of the present distributing tank location of the oil companies are almost unanimously in favor of having them remain in that locality and as the oil companies have expressed their willingness to construct such storage buildings and tanks as are required by the city, I am satisfied that the ordinance is unnecessary."

The mayor was yesterday presented with a petition signed by many large business establishments asking that the oil companies be permitted to continue in business at the present site on East Water street.

Governor Dix Ill.

ASSERTS ELLIS PAVING AMENDMENT FAILURE

That the so called competitive paving amendment drafted by former Councilman Ellis has failed in its purported mission was the opinion freely expressed by City Attorney Grant at a meeting of the street committee of the city executive board yesterday afternoon.

"It has turned out just as I predicted it would," remarked the city attorney. "Far from being a benefit to property owners, it is favorable only toward well I will not say whom. The city executive board has, as I have said before, but perfunctory power. The council directs the board to enter into a contract and the board must do it unless it can be shown that there has been collusion or fraud in the bids."

"The only way this paving problem can be solved or will ever be settled is to adopt a charter amendment giving a majority of the property owners the right to select street improvements. Such an amendment has already been proposed by me."

The street committee was yesterday unanimous in refusing to award a bid for the improvement of East Tenth street from East Ankeny to East Burnside. The bid was for asphalt and was tendered by the Barber Asphalt Paving company. One of the items was for excavation at 90 cents a yard when the engineer's estimate for this item called for but 60 cents. The committee will hold a joint meeting with the street committee of the council to decide on what action to take with regard to the bid.

If property owners in general heed the announcement recently made by Chairman George L. Baker of the council street committee it would seem that the Ellis amendment, even though it has been pronounced unsuccessful, can be made to work. Councilman Baker said the committee had adopted the policy of recommending the award of contracts in accordance with the wishes of a majority of the property owners affected by any hard surface improvement, for which bids may be tendered. If this policy is carried out, the property owners need only to sign petitions signifying the class of improvement which they desire and City Attorney Grant's proposed amendment will be practically in effect.

BAILEY CHARGES TO BE HEARD ON FEB. 7

The police committee of the city executive board yesterday set next Wednesday as the date for hearing the charges filed by Chief Slover against Police Captain George H. Bailey. This official is already under indictment and his case will come before the circuit court. In order that the trial may not be prejudiced by action of the committee Bailey will be granted a continuance of the hearing until after the circuit court case is concluded.

A number of applications for the position of police sergeant were filed by the committee. Action will be taken on these later. There are eight vacancies to be filled. Fifty additional patrolmen are to be appointed also in the near future.

The committee granted Secretary J. G. Schroeder of the free employment bureau a special star.

GILLIAM DIVORCE TRIAL REQUIRES A BAILIFF

Condon, Or., Jan. 26.—Testimony in the divorce case of Charles H. Williams vs. Julia Williams, which was commenced here on January 16, ended Wednesday afternoon. Both principals are very well known here and more interest has been aroused by this case than by any for several years. Over 260 full pages of typewritten testimony were taken; 18 witnesses, nine for the plaintiff and seven for defendant, were examined and a period of eight years and a scope of country ranging from

here to Michigan were pretty well covered by the testimony. It has been a most stubbornly contested case and was at times exceedingly exciting, the referee having to appoint a bailiff to preserve order because of remarks addressed to the plaintiff while on the witness stand by Wilson, senior counsel for defendant. The plaintiff was on

the witness stand over two days. T. A. Weinke of this city, was counsel for plaintiff and W. H. Wilson of The Dalles and G. W. Farman of this city appeared for defendant. District Judge Parker will pass upon the testimony.
