

"DOCTOR" HAZZARD FORCED TO GO TO GIVE CERTIFICATE OF ALASKA LINE

Woman Appealed to Courts
for Right to Practice "Fast
Cure," Without Passing the
Examination.

(United Press Leased Wire.)
Port Orchard, Wash., Jan. 27.—Five witnesses were called for the defense this morning in the murder trial of Dr. Linda B. Hazzard, the fast cure specialist, charged with slaying the death of Claire Williamson. The fifth witness, Miss Nellie Shuman, who was employed as a nurse by Dr. Hazzard, is still on the stand.

Dr. E. Weldon Young, who was president of the state board of health in 1911, testified that a certificate was issued that year to Dr. Hazzard to practice osteopathy and fasting. On cross-examination it was shown that the board issued the certificate only upon an order of the court compelling it to do so. He also testified that Dr. Hazzard never submitted her diploma as a physician to the board, or that she had never passed a medical examination in this state.

Body of Claire Identified.
William Borthwick, deputy coroner, identified the body that he brought to Seattle as the same which was shown by Miss Margaret Conway, the Williamson family nurse to be that of Claire Williamson. Borthwick's testimony revealed that the purported body of Claire had been removed from Olalla to Finney Creek one and one-half miles away, when he viewed it.

W. H. Onstead, owner of the launch which carried the body from the creek to Seattle, explained that it was removed from Olalla by him, and that it would not interfere with his schedule.

J. T. Haglund, whose boy was a patient of Dr. Hazzard, at the time the Williamson sisters were taking their treatment in Seattle, testified that they did not appear to be in good health when they first began visiting her offices.

Instructed Verdict Refused.
There will be no night sessions for the present, the ill health of Dr. Hazzard being assigned as an excuse by her attorneys when the court suggested them. At the conclusion of the state's case yesterday afternoon, Attorney G. W. Gregory for the defense asked for an instructed verdict of acquittal on the ground that the state had failed to prove first degree murder. The jury was withdrawn during his argument, which was to the effect that it had not been shown that Mrs. Hazzard withheld food from Miss Williamson sufficient to sustain life, and that further, she did not withhold any food against Claire's will.

Judge Yakey denied the motion without hearing any argument from the state. Attorney E. D. Karr then made the opening statement for the defense.

Proposed Line of Defense.
"We will show," said Karr, "that Claire Williamson was suffering from intestinal ailment since childhood, that for the last eight or nine years she has been constantly failing, and that she came to Dr. Hazzard after other physicians had despaired of curing her. We will show that Claire died of cirrhosis of the liver, and that Dr. Hazzard did all that was possible for her, except to remove the heart which would have hastened her death."

"It will be proved that Mrs. Hazzard has been for 15 years a licensed osteopathic and fasting practitioner. We believe that she cared for the Williamson sisters with the loving tenderness of a mother, realizing that they were orphans, and that she went out of her way to do them favors, thus possibly placing herself in a compromising position."

As witnesses are being excluded from the court room before they are called to the stand, Judge Yakey warned the spectators not to reveal the testimony to them on penalty of being confined in jail during the trial.

600 a year through immigration alone. Half of this large number, I understand come from the United States, the other half is attracted from Europe.

"The Canadian climate is not severe. I love the Canadian winters because the cold weather is invigorating. Of course the sunny south is very pleasant for a short while, but it gets monotonous. The blizzards of the north are, of course, severe, but blizzards are not the order of the day. The extension of our road across the continent will throw open very large areas of land, 45 per cent of which is not now tapped by the spurs of the fact that central Canada is pretty well occupied by bands of steel."

"The question of operating steamers across the Pacific in connection with our line is a matter yet to be determined."

SENTENCE IS AFFIRMED**

MERCHANTS CAN MEET DEMANDS OF ALASKA LINE

Enough Freight Shipments to
Insure 200 for Each Trip,
Said to Be in Sight—Let-
ters Received From Dealers.

No Portland merchant opposes direct steamship connection with Alaska. A good many of them do their business through branch houses at Seattle. But enough can back their approval of the steamship line with actual freight shipments to meet the first guarantee asked of 100 tons for each of three trips between Portland and the Bering sea ports of Alaska.

These are facts established by replies of local business men to circular letters sent from the chamber of commerce by W. S. Smallwood, manager of the transportation committee. Fred Parr, manager of the E. J. Dodge company, will come to Portland next week to close the contract that will establish direct, regular steamship service between Portland and Alaska beginning June 8, 1912.

The letters received by Mr. Smallwood show a surprisingly large number of Alaska towns that local merchants now have business relations with.

One Firm Heavy Shipper.
One well known ship and coffee firm acknowledges shipments to Cordova, Douglas, Fish-Egg Island, Iditarod, Fairbanks, Juneau, Ketchikan, Manse Point, Nome, Salschek, Seward, Skagway, St. Michaels, Tanana, Teller and Valdez, most of these being points concerned in the plan for steamship service. This firm says that money would be saved on coffee and extract shipments, also time and money would be saved by avoiding transshipments at this firm's read.

"Alaska merchants all express desire to trade with Portland jobs. San Francisco and Seattle have been alive on the job and have worked the trade regularly and hard and Portland seems to be satisfied to take any remainder of the trade. We go after Alaska trade and get a good share of it. What we get is very profitable and we think with direct connection we can get more."

Many Winter in Seattle.
One of Portland's largest wholesale goods houses answer by saying: "We ship to all Alaska ports," and as to the advantages of trade, adds: "With a sufficient service direct, Portland would be in a position to attract Alaska people to visit here, whereas at present there are very few who ever come. Many of the Alaska spend the winter in Seattle, San Francisco and other points. They make investments, buy goods and establish closer business relations as a natural consequence."

A local drug company acknowledges shipments to Cordova, Douglas, Iditarod, Juneau, Ketchikan, Klaskan, Nome, Petersburg, Sitka and Wrangell. As to advantages of steamship connection this company says: "Our business largely in southeast Alaska would welcome a direct steamer line to these ports. It is probable that with a direct line to Nome we may secure increased business in that territory."

To Solicit Business.
"Direct sailings from Portland would bring us into closer touch with our trade. Certainty as to sailing dates would permit the soliciting of business with the assurance that time in transit could be figured on and that delays at Seattle would be eliminated. All details of shipment, such as customs, clearance, marine insurance and so forth could be attended to direct. Direct sailings would indicate to possible customers in Alaska that we were in position to form business relations with them which would give us the opportunity of demonstrating that these relations might be to their advantage."

"Direct sailings from a grocery house of the city writes that as soon as steamship service is established it will put a man into the field to solicit business. A wholesale stove and hardware firm sums the advantages of direct Alaska trade in these words: 'Cheaper freight, no delay in transfer at Seattle, also definite time of shipment and arrival at destination,' and adds, with a promise to put a solicitor into the territory: 'As the trade into that section is increasing with the population we think Portland should make every effort to handle as much of it as possible with a view to a greater future and a steamer line direct from here is the only method by which we can be assured of our share of the trade.'

Ships 150 Tons a Season.
A wholesale rubber firm states: "We ship to all of the principal points on the Alaska coast from Ketchikan to Solomon and Yukon river points. Our total tonnage to various points aggregates approximately 150 tons during the season."

"One of the principal advantages we derive from direct sailings would disembark at Portland and would in all probability place their orders with local jobbers."

"We have also found that in shipping via Seattle consignments from Portland jobbers are often detracted in favor of those from Seattle."

"It is the writer's opinion that the reason Portland has not had a larger share of Alaska business is due to the fact that jobbers have not gone after it."

"With the exception of our own company there have been during the past few years only one or two other concerns who sent representatives into that territory."

**JAPANESE DIET IN
UPROAR AT CHANCE
OF RUSSIAN ALLIANCE**

(United Press Leased Wire.)
Tokio, Jan. 27.—Evasion of open charges that Russia and Japan are prepared to act in concert in China, should the occasion arise, was the feature of one of the hottest debates which the Japanese diet has seen for months.

Uchida, foreign minister, was warmly accused by the nationalist leader, Inukai, of having an unsteady foreign policy, and lacking faith in the ability of the Chinese to settle their own questions. Uchida and the government were accused of first supporting the plan for a constitutional monarchy in China, and later of exhibiting an indifference to the disorders prevalent there.

Both the foreign minister and the minister of war denied reports that the twelfth division of the army was to be dispatched to Manchuria. If necessary arises, they stated, they admitted that troops will be sent to Manchuria.

At the point in the debate Mr. Inukai demanded to know whether the Japanese troops, if any were sent, would cooperate with Russian soldiers in Manchuria, and his question was greeted by a violent demonstration among the followers of the opposition. Amid great excitement the government refused to give any straightforward answer as to the present status of Russo-Japanese understanding or as to whether any agreement existed for a possible partition of Manchuria.

Reward for Yuan's Head.
(United Press Leased Wire.)
Shanghai, Jan. 27.—Pursuant to a learning that Yuan Shi Kai had agreed to permit Sun Yat Sen to act as president of China until the throne was abdicated and peace restored, the Manchurian diet is reported to have offered a reward of \$5000 for Yuan's assassination.

Dr. Sun in pursuance of his alleged bargain with Yuan, today announced his support of Yuan's candidacy for the presidency in the national convention.

Empress Urged to Abdicate.
(United Press Leased Wire.)
Tientsin, Jan. 27.—Declaring it folly to longer continue the struggle against the revolutionists, leading imperial general here today indicated in the petition to the dowager empress to abdicate.

The soldiers of the Imperial garrison are becoming restless because they have received no pay, many of them desiring to be rebel rangers.

**GOOD ROADS WEEK
PROCLAMATION IS
ISSUED BY WEST**

nature has fully performed her part. The federal government, too, has treated us fairly in the way of appropriations for development of our waterways, and even the railroads have been generous to the realization of our needs and opportunities, and are checker-boarding the state with bands of steel.

Need Is Urgent.
"In view of these things we are prompted to ask ourselves what should we do in the way of cooperation with these several agencies for the development of the state? It is true that we have good laws, good government and good schools and many other desirable things to those who have come within our borders, but much of this good has been nullified by some of the things we have failed to do and chief among these is our neglect in the matter of the construction of good roads."

"Without good roads there can be no great development and no great progress. What we need most is more people—more people in the rural district. And in order to attract people to the rural districts we must make rural life pleasant and attractive. You cannot maroon a new settler and his family on a farm in an ocean of mud, no matter how beautiful the spot, and expect to find him happy and content. He demands good roads leading to the church and the schools and good roads leading to the markets, and he is going to locate in that section where these advantages are to be found."

Money Well Spent.
"It is not only our duty but it is in keeping with good business to build good roads. Money spent for good roads is money well spent. When we speak of spending several millions of dollars during the next few years in road construction many are staggered by the proposal and the figures. They apparently are not aware that the several counties in this state spent over \$10,000,000 during the past six years for roads, much of which was lost through lack of system and knowledge as to scientific road building."

"The question of good roads has been fairly well discussed of late, and we have learned more about road building during that past few years than we ever knew before, but we still have much to learn and still have much to do before we undertake on a large scale the construction of a system of highways in this state."

"We need—first—the passage of model good roads laws. Second—a competent man at the head of the highway department. Third—funds sufficient to carry on the work."

"These things will come only through united effort, and united effort will come only through a clear understanding of the whole question by the whole people of this state. This understanding will come only through the study by, and the education of, the whole people."

Bills Presented.
"Numerous bills are about to be introduced or presented to the legislature by the friends of good roads in different parts of the state, and."

"Whereas, it is important that the people of Oregon should give deep and thoughtful attention to the consideration, study and discussion of these measures."

"Now, therefore, I, Oswald West, governor of the state of Oregon, by virtue of the power and authority in me vested, do hereby proclaim the week beginning the fourth day of February, and ending the tenth day of February as good roads week, and I do hereby earnestly recommend to the people of this state that during this period the question of good roads legislation be given careful thought and study through public and private discussion and through the columns of the press, in order that the knowledge pertaining thereto may be increased, public sentiment crystallized and effective legislation secured."

"In testimony hereof, I have hereunto set my hand and caused the great seal of the state to be affixed, on the twenty-sixth day of January, 1912."

TELLS OREGON CITY TO DELAY THE FIGHT FOR LOWER RATES

Lounsbury, of S. P., Says
Long and Short Haul Case
Must First Be Settled; Boat
Line to Be Sold.

(Special to The Journal.)
Oregon City, Jan. 27.—That the Oregon City Terminal Rate association must wait until the supreme court of the United States has rendered a decision in the "long and short haul" case, before the railroads will act upon its request that the city be made a terminal, was the declaration of H. E. Lounsbury, general freight agent of the Southern Pacific railroad, who was a guest of the association at dinner last night. The association wants this city made a terminal in order to obtain the same freight rates as those obtaining in Portland. If the decision is favorable it is believed the population will quadruple in 10 years, and that scores of factories will be located here.

Mr. Lounsbury declared freight rates in all parts of the country were being reduced as a result of adverse decisions and the railroads were having a difficult time meeting conditions by curtailing in various ways. He said the railroads had about reached the limit, and that profits were entirely too small. He suggested the association save its money and time until the decision in the long and short haul case. After that the railroads might look with more favor upon the plan.

It was announced at the conference that the O. W. R. & N. planned to withdraw its boats between Oregon City and Portland. The company has offered to sell its boats to the mills on the west side, which have been its principal customers, and it is probable the sales will be made. There is a probability that a new river transportation company will be organized. The Willamette Pulp & Paper company owns the Steamer N. R. Lang, and the company probably will purchase another to take care of its freight between this city and Portland.

Prize Cups on Display.
Ontario, Or., Jan. 27.—The two silver cups awarded this locally at the St. Paul land show, for the best exhibit of alfalfa, which was awarded to Malheur county, and the cup for the best agricultural exhibit made by a commercial club or a community exhibit, which was won by the Ontario Commercial club, are on display at the Commercial club rooms.

Newspapers here today bitterly denounced Italy, declaring that the Tavignano was seized while in French waters. Premier Poincaré wired Rome, demanding an immediate explanation.

The small passenger steamer Tavignano carries mail from Tunis to Sfax, Suez, Zor and Bham.
