

ANGORA GROWERS PROMISE GREAT OREGON INDUSTRY

State Association Officer Asks
Senator Chamberlain to
Work for Retention of Mo-
hair Tariff.

(Washington Bureau of The Journal.)

Washington, Jan. 27.—A remark made by Senator Chamberlain to the effect that Angora goats had been used largely for clearing land in Oregon, led to a rather illuminating correspondence on this subject with representatives of the industry in Oregon, and it is shown by them that with the climate so well adapted to producing the mohair, the hair desired by the trade, Oregon could support 1,000,000 goats provided the tariff of 12 cents per pound could be kept on the article so as to protect the grower from ruinous competition with the mohair from South Africa.

Alva L. McDonald of Portland, secretary of the Northwest Angora Goat association, wrote to the senator explaining much about the industry that was interesting, and showing that the 325 active members of the association who had been enrolled during the two years just past had actually lost money on the 300 full blooded, registered bucks they sold last year at from \$15 to \$30 each, because it cost \$25 each to raise them and to allow a reasonable profit. Normally these bucks would have brought from \$30 to \$75 each, the price being injuriously affected by the threat that the tariff would be reduced. The bucks sold have gone to all parts of the country. In Oregon alone there are 1500 growers of Angora goats, which shear from 2 1/2 to five pounds each, while in South Africa the fleeces run from five to nine pounds each, and the land on which the goats are raised is worth but a small part as much as the Oregon lands.

Senator Asked to Help.
The senator is appealed to for aid in keeping a reasonable tariff on mohair, in view of the prominence the industry could attain with proper protection.

The comments on Senator Chamberlain's remarks regarding the mohair industry have resulted in the writing of a letter by his assistant secretary, the following being a copy, and explaining what his attitude really was: "B. B. Quinn, Esq., Portland, Ore.—Dear Sir: In the temporary absence of Senator Chamberlain in Florida with a congressional committee, permit me to own receipt of your favor of the 15th instant and to say that before leaving the city the senator wrote Alva L. McDonald, aid, secretary of the Northwest Angora Goat association at Portland, on the same subject as that covered by your letter, and I quote to you from same as follows:

"In reply to your letter permit me to say that I have only had a conference with one gentleman on the subject covered by your letter, and that was the representative of the Angora goat and mohair industry from the south, Texas, if I mistake not.

Past Conditions Considered.
"Aside from him I have not conversed with anyone upon the subject, and the information given you must have come from him. He misapprehended entirely the conversation I had with him. I talked with him incidentally about the Angora goat industry in Oregon, and had more particular reference to the past than the present condition of the industry. I said to him that the goat had been used very largely for the clearing of ground in the mountainous districts and at the foot of mountains in the various parts of the state.

"I am frank to say that I did advise him that I was not informed as to the condition of the industry in Oregon, though I thought it had not yet attained the proportions which it might in future. I note what you say upon the subject, and it is the first authentic information I have had upon the subject except your own journal published in Oregon.

"I assure you that the subject matter of your letter will receive my earnest consideration in connection with the subject when it comes up in the senate in the tariff measure.

"The national directory you sent has been received and will be filed for future reference."

ance of 15 tons all told, this being a minimum car load.

Most of the large wholesale business houses of Portland are yet to be heard from. It is from them that the bulk of freight shipment promises are hoped for.

No one of the communications from the merchants expresses hostility to direct steamship connection between Portland and Alaska. Fourteen of them, as was noted, gave expression to the indifference. This will be the status found by Fred Parr, manager of the E. J. Dodge Steamship company, when he comes to Portland in the way of this week to see if the city is ready to send 600 tons of freight to Nome and other ports of the Alaska coast on Bering sea during next summer.

Get Direct Line.
"Get a direct line" is the brief injunction contained in one of the replies to the circular of questions. "This line is ready to send a solicitor into the territory when direct steamship connections are established. A wholesale machinery supply house wrote as follows:

"We have made no shipments for Alaska except to cannery establishments who operate their own boat from here. We would like to see direct steamship line here."

This firm adds that it now ships to Alaska points from a Seattle steamer, but that if direct steamship service was established between Portland and Alaska, shipments would be made from here and a larger local stock installed. The

Snead Murder Trial Begins Monday Attitude of Woman in Case Not Known

Wealthy Texas Banker Must Account for Shooting of A. G. Boyce Sr.

Fort Worth, Tex., Jan. 27.—Whether she will sacrifice the love of the man for whom she has professed undying affection to save the life of her husband, whose trial for the murder of her affiant's father is scheduled to begin Monday morning, is the difficult problem which Mrs. J. B. Snead will have to decide before going on the witness stand to tell the story of her elopement with A. G. Boyce, Jr., which was the beginning of the romance which ended so tragically.

The probable decision of the woman in the case is causing considerable anxiety to the parties vitally interested, as well as to a number of the most prominent business men and social leaders in Texas, who have taken sides in the matter.

One of the serious disruptions caused by the tragedy was the breaking of the engagement between Snead's sister and one of Boyce's sons.

Ever since the night that J. B. Snead, one of the wealthiest bankers in the southwest, stepped on the veranda of the Metropolitan hotel and after a short exchange of angry words, drew a revolver and shot to death his friend and neighbor of years, A. G. Boyce, there has been a continual forming, breaking and reforming of factions among the wealthiest people of the Lone Star state.

A great many of them have taken the part of the dead man and have brought powerful influences to bear in an effort to induce the young woman to renounce her husband and stick to her lover, who with his three brothers has sworn to sacrifice every penny of the Boyce millions if it would result in sending Snead to the gallows.

Snead's Friends Come to His Aid.
Snead's father, who is a Baptist minister, is being aided in his fight to secure his son's freedom by a number of equally wealthy people and the coming trial is expected to be the greatest criminal case battle in the history of the state, both sides having retained the most able lawyers in the southwest.

It is taken for granted that counsel for the defendant will make a plea of temporary or emotional insanity, basing their plea on the claim that the prisoner's mind must certainly have been affected by the events leading up to the tragedy.

Snead and his beautiful young wife lived directly opposite the Boyce residence, the families occupying the two handsomest mansions in the town of Amarillo. Boyce owned the famous Capital ranch, which is known as one of the largest in the world. The bank and the ranch owner had been friends for years and never had a disagreement of any kind until last November when Snead's young wife ran away.

AD CLUB TO PRESENT "G-R-Q WALLINGFORD"
