UNDERWOOD STEEL REVISION MEASURE PASSED BY HOUSE

Tariff Cut Bill Goes Through This Afternoon by Vote of 210 to 109; Bitter Feeling Marks Debate.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Washington, Jan. 29.—By a vote of 210 to 109 the house this afternoon passed the Underwood bill for a revision of the iron and steel tariff...

Washington, Jan. 29.—With many Republican progressives supporting the Democrats, consideration of the bill introduced by Congressman Oscar Underwood of Alabama for revision of the iron and steel tariff was resumed in the house this afternoon.

Underwood's motion to close debate on the measure had passed, 193 to 116, and the bill was passed by a vote of 210 to 109.

A motion presented by Congressman Payne to recommit the bill to the ways and means committee was lost by a vote of 108 to 205, the progressive Republicans again voting with the Democrats.

BRANDEIS TEARS AGAIN AT HEART OF BIG CORPORATION

Attorney Declares Judge Gary Far From Truth When He Says Corporation Is Model Employer.

Washington, Jan. 29.—Testifying before the Stanley house committee, which is investigating the steel trust, Louis D. Brandeis of Boston today took exception to the statement of Judge Gary, chairman of the board of directors, that the steel corporation is a model employer.

"The report of the commissioner of corporations showing during May, 1910, that 50,000 men, or 20 per cent of all the corporation's employees, worked 54 hours or more weekly. This means 12 hours work every day, including Sunday."

Brandeis further asserted that periodically the day and night shifts were reversed, and some of the men were compelled to remain on duty from 18 to 24 hours.

"I understand that some of the men," added Brandeis "are over 40. I am surprised that they are not incapacitated for work under the conditions they are compelled to endure at 30."

Witness Testifies Mrs. Thurston Was No Respector of Seasons, in Raiment.

San Diego, Cal., Jan. 29.—Mrs. Harriet Patterson-Thurston wore "arctic overhaos and wrapped up her head in the summer," according to the deposition of Mrs. Sarah Dana, a professional nurse, which was read during the trial of the Thurston will contest suit today as evidence that the decedent was not of disposing mind.

Mrs. Dana was employed to look after Julia Quinn's children. She testified that Mrs. Thurston told her of communications with the spirits.

"I talked with father last night and he said, 'Harriet, how feeble you look,'" is the statement Mrs. Dana attributes to Mrs. Thurston on one occasion.

"How did you know it was your dead father?" Mrs. Dana declares she asked. "Because no one else could say Harriet the way he did," Mrs. Thurston is alleged to have replied.

The deposition of Charles Woodward, brother of Mrs. Thurston, who was left the bulk of Mrs. Thurston's fortune, was also read today.

REALTY EXCHANGE IS FORMALLY ORGANIZED

The announcement was made at today's meeting of the realty board that a real estate exchange had been formally organized within the board having a membership of 50. F. L. Purse was appointed secretary of the new institution.

PRIZE WINNING SCULPTOR FOUND WITH THROAT CUT

MABEL WARNER IS ON 3RD TRIAL FOR ALLEGED FORGERY

Famous Episode of 5 Wills to James Young Estate Being Threshed Over Again; Jury Is Hard to Get.

Pendleton, Or., Jan. 29.—Smiling, and with a battle light in her eye, Mrs. Mabel Warner this morning entered upon her third trial for the forgery of the will to the estate of her uncle and stepfather, James Young.

Examination of jurors began this morning, and the opposing attorneys are making a hard fight to secure a favorable jury. Until noon only five men had been passed for cause, and it is evident that two of these will be dismissed by peremptory challenge.

The work of securing an unbiased jury is especially difficult because of the prominence which the long fight for the estate has had in the news columns during the past eight years.

Most of the men examined admit having formed an opinion, and the defense immediately enters a challenge. Mrs. Warner sits between her attorneys, and during examination of the veniremen frequently advises them on the nature of questions to be propounded, and these questions indicate her remarkable knowledge of human nature and her acquaintance with the history and connections of each individual jurymen.

The case is being heard before Judge Bradshaw of The Dalles, acting for Judge Feltus, who is disqualified because of his connection with previous trials in the capacity of prosecuting attorney.

GWINN RESIGNS ROUND-UP WORK

His Connection With New Wild West Show Makes It Accepted Quickly.

Pendleton, Or., Jan. 29.—James H. Gwinn, secretary of the Roundup association since its inception, has resigned because of his connection with the association recently organized for the purpose of putting on a wild west show at Los Angeles. A telegram received today from him severed his official connection with the local show, and the resignation was promptly accepted. George A. Hartman Jr., treasurer of the association, is now acting as secretary.

CONGRESSMAN TO PUSH COOS JETTY RESOLUTION

Washington, Jan. 29.—Congressman Davidson, member of the rivers and harbors committee, promises Congressman Hawley that he will introduce a resolution calling for estimates on the restoration of the north jetty at Coos Bay. The engineers recently reported the jetty submerged and a menace to shipping. A delay in restoring the jetty will increase the cost but they have no authority to make estimates.
