


The balloting resulted in the election of Ng Ping Yet as president; Liang Yat Dong, vice-president; Gung Hing Yui. treasurer, and Jong Chow Kwun, secretary. The former president of the organization was Wong Won Sue, now member of the cabinet of Dr. Sun Tat Sen, provisional president of the new Chinese republic.

Wong Won Sue was in Portland last September with Dr. Sun for a secret conference with Lee Quin, president of the Portland Young China Association, From Portland the party went east as far as Boston, conferring with and trengthening the branches in all of the principal cities. association. About 50 or 60 have formed a Chinese boys' brigade, called the "New Republic Cadets." Such of the boys as can drill in the afternoon for two hours daily and those who work put in their two hours each night. No compulsion is necessary to get the boys to drill, and it is harder to get them to stop than it is to get them to begin. The drill is carried on under the 1911 United States manual, and is up to date and thorough. At first it was carried on in the hall of the Chinese Benevolent association, but at present the boys are drilling in the Chinese Free Mason hall on Fourth street near Flanders. Dr. J. this work approximates \$1,600,000. This money has been set aside in the present budget for that purpose, and a large amount of material is now on hand warehoused, ready for the commencement of construction. The rolling stock will consist of steel passenger cars of the very best modern pattern. Franchises have been secured at Forest Grove, Hillsboro and Newberg, under which the electrified lines will enter the heart of each of these cities. At other points the present right of way will be operated, and such additional depot and station ground facilities acquired as may be necessary. When installed it is the purpose of the company to put in a schedule by which passenger trains will leave McMinnville for Portland, by way of Forest Grove, every two hours, returning on the same schedule, and by which other trains will leave McMinnville for Port-

Can't Accept Common User.

"This obligation upon the part of the company as to the United States is perpetual, and cannot be limited by the company, if it would desire to do so.

It is, therefore, impossible for the company to accept either a common user clause or to accept a time limit, because its obligation under the act of congress, and under the state law under which the road was located and built, requires a continuous exercise of its duties in that respect. Furthermore, there is no public demand or need for a time restriction or for a comment. restriction, or for a common user on Fourth street.
