# FOR AID SOUNDED

New China Beset With Grim Calamity: Local Chamber of Commerce to Take Up Appeal Tomorrow.

Thousands are starving in China and money is badly needed for their relief. This is the tenor of a letter received by The Journal from E. C. Lobenstein, secretary of the Central China Relief committee with offices in Shanghai. A letter has also been addressed to the Portland Chamber of Commerce.

The Chamber of Commerce may arrange to receive and forward subscriptions as was done some months ago when a call for assistance came from

In the letter to the Chamber of Com merce, Secretary Lobenstine states:
"We are asking 300 American cities to take part in a great demonstration of good will to the new China. Tremendous Calamity.

"China is facing a tremendous cal-amity. Two and a half millions of her people are in dire need of help, most of them in the same district where the famine raged last year. The Chinese are in the midst of a struggle for free-dom and unable to do much for their own people, indeed one great reason for the revolution is the recurrence of famine conditions. Throughout a large portion of two populous provinces schools are closed, business is at a standstill, the weak are becoming beg-gars, families are being broken up by the sale of wives and daughters, often into lives of vice, and the people are lapsing into apathy and moral chaos.

"In previous famines people all over the country have given as individuals, but it is now proposed that throughout the nation each city act as a unit, cable at once its willingness to help, raise a fund to be sent on as fast as it comes in, and on May 10 cable a statement of the total sent to date, with message of good will in the name of the shall transmit these messages to the Chinese press and publish them in a booklet to be presented to officiprovincial assemblies, and thus not only help to avert a great calamity but make the alleviation of suffering the oppor-tunity of strengthening the friendship between Chins and the United States.

Time Is Opportune. "The time is opportune. America has long been looked to by China as a dis-interested friend. The return of a large part of the Boxer indemnity made a deep impression. The insistance of the revolutionary party upon a republic shows how great is the influence of the United States. Fuel Question Vital.
