

GILL, COTTERILL, WILL FIGHT IT OUT

Recalled Mayor of Seattle Is Able to Line Up a Nomination.

Seattle, Wash., Feb. 21.—With 233 precincts out of a total of 231 heard from this noon, results of the city primaries here remain practically unchanged. Former State Senator George F. Cotterill, progressive Democrat, and Hiram C. Gill, Republican, former mayor, who was recalled last year, are the nominees.

Thomas A. Farish, Republican, ran third, and M. A. Wells, Socialist, was a close fourth with nearly 8000 votes. The Socialists nominated E. J. Brown for corporation counsel, Frank Hillebrand for comptroller and B. F. Jacobs and John Burgess for councilmen.

It is estimated that the total vote was about 50,000 out of a total registration of over 74,000.

DUCHESS TAKES FEVER WHILE NURSING SOLDIERS

Naples, Feb. 21.—The duchess of Aosta has been taken to the Capodimonte palace suffering from bronchial catarrh and fever, which she contracted while nursing the sick and wounded soldiers on the hospital ship Mendel. Her condition today is not thought to be serious.

PALZER AND WELLS TO MEET IN FRISCO JULY 4

San Francisco, Feb. 21.—Al Palzer and Bomharder Wells, the British heavy-weight, will be seen in action here in a 20 round fight July 4, according to an announcement made today by Eddie Graney, promoter. The signature of Palzer, who recently flattened Al Kaufman, already has been secured, and all that remains to clinch the match now is Wells' signature. Graney says there will be no difficulty about this. Palzer is considered by good judges of fighters as the only white man who would have a chance against Jack Johnson.

Jack Welsh, Graney announced, will referee the bout.

He will coach the Beaver gridiron squad again this fall. His successor to the graduate management has not yet been named, but it is expected that the athletic council will announce the selection in the near future.
