A. W. Taylor Dead—Anthony Warren Taylor, 34 years old, died at the home of his mother, Mrs. Martha M. Taylor, 234 East Tenth street, at 9 o'clock yesterday morning. His death was the result of an attack of pneumonia, which he suffered six years ago. Early yesterday morning he complained of being troubled with cold chills, which kept up during the day. Mr. Taylor was born in this city, June 25, 1875. He attended grammar school and was a graduate of the Portland High school. After completing his school career he entered the United States mail service as a mail carrier. This position he held until two years ago, when he had to resign on account of his failing health. His father, who died 20 years ago, was one of Oregon's early settlers. Besides a mother, he leaves four sisters. They are: Nora and Ada Taylor, Mrs. J. S. Bruce and Mrs. F. C. Dunlap. Funeral services will be held at the house at 3 o'clock tomorrow afternoon. Rev. C. T. McPherson of the Trinity Methodist Episcopal church will conduct the services. The body will be interred in the Lone Fir cemetery.

Wakefield Sues City—A suit to collect \$408,875 from the city has been started in the circuit court by Robert Wakefield & Co. for the construction of the two new reservoirs at Mount Baker. This amount is alleged to be due on the contract. It is set forth in the complaint that the city changed the plans so many times that the contractors were required to add extras, over which the city and contractors cannot agree. The contractors allege they should have \$385,296, of which amount \$458,421 has been paid, leaving an unpaid balance for the amount named in the suit. The city claims the lower reservoir is defective, in that it leaks. The contract to build the reservoirs was awarded in 1909.

H. A. Williams Files Declaration—H. A. Williams, 527 Forty-fifth street, this morning filed his declaration of intention to be a candidate for the Republican nomination as representative in the legislature. In his platform he declares for "Statement No. 1, to work for good roads for the entire state, for closed bridge draws during the rush hours of traffic, for remedial legislation, and for an honest and progressive representation of the people of Multnomah county."

Chorus to Rehearse—The fourth rehearsal of the Rose Festival chorus of 1000 voices is to be held in the People's hall at East Seventh and Ankeny streets Monday evening at 7:30 sharp. The director, Albert Ehrigott, said this morning that there is room for additional enrollments, and that members of the Sunday schools of the city had been invited to furnish representatives to participate in the chorus organization.

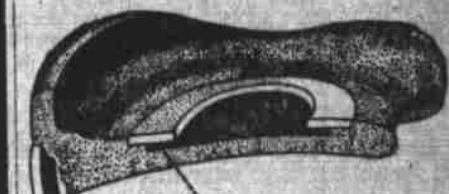
