

ROOSEVELT LEADS TAFT BY 15 TO 1 IN MISSOURI FIGHT

Fifth Congressional District Gives Ex-President Loyal Support; Conventions Will Name Delegates Tomorrow.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Kansas City, March 8.—Leading other candidates about 15 to 1 votes, Theodore Roosevelt, judging from the preferential primaries held in the fifth congressional district, is the popular choice of the section of the state for the Republican presidential nomination. A complete count of yesterday's vote follows: Roosevelt, 5565; Taft, 399; La Follette, 85; Cummins, 6.

The Roosevelt delegates selected at the primaries will convene next Tuesday and select delegates to the national convention. Taft supporters here assert that the president's following was instructed to take no part in yesterday's primaries.

Supporters of President Taft will hold their convention here tomorrow and select Taft delegates to the Chicago convention. Contesting delegations are expected from every district in Missouri.

A Busy Day in Chicago.

(Special to The Journal.) Chicago, Ill., March 8.—From the moment President Taft steps from the train at 9 o'clock tomorrow morning, into the arms of a reception committee, until nearly midnight, when the day's program will be concluded, every minute will be turned to account. During the forenoon he is to visit the Armour Institute of Technology; at 1 o'clock he is to have luncheon with the Union League club; at 4 o'clock he is to make a short visit to the Press club and also at the Taft headquarters in the Hotel La Salle. In the evening he will speak at the banquet of the Illinois Swedish-American Republican league and afterward will speak briefly at a banquet of the Traffic club. The principal speech will be at the Swedish-American banquet, which is to be held in celebration of the semi-centennial anniversary of the naval battle between John Ericsson's Monitor and the Merrimack. Besides President Taft other speakers at the banquet will be Governor Deneen of Illinois, Representative George B. Foss, according to the present plans the president will depart for Washington early Sunday morning.

Bryan in Minnesota. (Special to The Journal.) Minneapolis, Minn., March 8.—In response to an invitation extended by the Hennepin County Democratic club, William J. Bryan came to the Twin Cities today to speak at a luncheon given by the club at the Hotel Radisson here today and at an evening meeting under the same auspices in the St. Paul auditorium.

Fight in North Carolina. (Special to The Journal.) Greensboro, N. C., March 8.—A campaign to capture the North Carolina del-

egation to the Chicago convention for Roosevelt was launched here today at a state convention of anti-Taft Republicans. The leading spirit in the movement is Richard Pearson of Asheville, who was in the diplomatic service during the Roosevelt administration. The Roosevelt supporters declare they can muster sufficient strength in the Eighth, Ninth and Tenth congressional districts to offset any support which may be brought by State Chairman Morehead to Taft from the Republican voters in the eastern districts.

Taft En Route to Toledo.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Pittsburgh, Pa., March 8.—President Taft arrived here at 9:05 this morning en route to Toledo, Ohio, where tonight he will reply to the speech delivered before the Ohio constitutional convention by Colonel Theodore Roosevelt. It is expected that the president will devote a large part of his address to attacking Colonel Roosevelt's policy that the recall of a decision is preferable to the recall of the judge handing down the decision. President Taft is unalterably opposed to the recall of judges.

Lenroot for La Follette.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Washington, March 8.—Asked here today as to a rumor that he had deserted Senator La Follette, Congressman Lenroot of Wisconsin said: "The story is absolutely false. I am for La Follette, as I always have been, and shall continue to sincerely urge his nomination. I have never thought of lessening my activity in his behalf. I will be with him until and during the convention."

verse on his route to the South Pole has already been explored by himself and by Shackleton. From a practical point of view, however, this is not in Amundsen's favor.

"Everything considered, I think there is good reason to believe that both expeditions will reach the South Pole. "Whatever the news may be, the task of Polar explorers will be far from ended. It will only have entered on a new stage. Much remains to be discovered geographically in the Polar regions, especially in the south. No, the conquest of the Pole does not mark the end of Polar exploration. We are only on the fringe of the work which has to be accomplished."

GALLANT LITTLE FRAM HAS SEEN HARD SERVICE IN FROZEN WATERS

The Fram, which carried Amundsen and his men to the South Pole, was built for Nansen in 1893. Commanded by Nansen that year the vessel entered the ice off the northern coast of Asia and for the next three years drifted northward, one of the objects of the expedition having been to demonstrate the theory of the drift from east to west. On March 12, 1896, Nansen and Lieutenant Johansen left the Fram in latitude 84 degrees and sailed on. Left with her crew the Fram drifted farther north, attaining less than 18 miles of Nansen's highest, and by almost superhuman exertion was broken out of the ice later in the season.

Again in 1898, the Fram was taken to the Arctic, this time by Captain Sverdrup of the Nansen party. After being ice-bound during the winter of 1898-99 in the Arctic straits, in the autumn of the latter year entered Jones' sound, where she remained for the next two years.

Pearl Not Surprised.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Washington, March 8.—Robert E. Peary, when shown United Press dispatches indicating that Captain Scott had reached the South Pole, said he would not be surprised to learn that the British explorer had triumphed. "Confirmation of the report that Scott reached the South Pole is not unlikely," said the North Pole discoverer. "Scott has been a pioneer in Antarctic exploration, and I know he started on his dash under most favorable conditions. It will soon be heard definitely if he has succeeded."

is a Danish nobleman of splendid education. On his arrival at Nome he had his three years' growth of beard shaved off. He was a striking looking fellow and quite captivated the attention of the young women he met while at Nome. The 'Gjos' arrived at Nome at about 10:00 o'clock on the night of August 31, 1896.

North Pole His Goal.

"Captain Amundsen stayed in Nome about three weeks, having in the meantime sent his ship down to San Francisco. The captain later went to Minneapolis, where he was entertained by relatives and friends and he then went direct to Norway. While in Nome the captain and members of his crew met many old acquaintances—men who had yielded to the lure of the gold fields and gone to Alaska to try their fortune."

Mrs. Swanton says that Captain Amundsen told her before leaving Nome that he had made up his mind to make a trip in search of the north pole. He was very much pleased with his reception and entertainment at Nome, and wrote a letter of thanks to Mrs. Swanton, as did Lieutenant Hansen, after their departure.

Open California Campaign.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Los Angeles, March 8.—Governor Elram Johnson will open the California campaign for Colonel Roosevelt here Saturday evening. Progressive Republican leaders announced today that plans already are under way to hold one of the largest political meetings in the history of Los Angeles. It is believed that the governor will make several speeches in southern California before returning to Sacramento.

McManigal May Testify.

(United Press Leased Wire.) San Francisco, March 8.—Orin McManigal may be brought to this city to testify at the extradition proceedings next Monday when Olaf Tveitmo and Eugene Clancy will resist being taken to Indianapolis for arraignment on alleged dynamite conspiracy indictments.

DOCK COMMISSION WITH 2 MEMBERS DOES NO BUSINESS

Public Dock Bonds Cannot Be Issued or Sold Until Mayor Appoints Member to Succeed H. L. Corbett.

The work of the public dock commission is held up awaiting the filling of a vacancy in its membership by Mayor Rushlight. Henry L. Corbett's one year term on the board has expired and he is not acting with the board. There are in the city but two members of the commission, Chairman Frederick W. Mulkey and Charles B. Moore, and they cannot legally transact the business of the commission.

Meanwhile the harbor plan of the board of the New York harbor engineers is expected within 10 days. This plan will deal not only with the localizing and construction of the \$2,500,000 public docks system, but will provide for the reforming of the entire harbor and waterfront and the dock commission has given a pledge that the recommendations of the engineers will be accepted.

There is to be issued, too, an additional \$500,000 of public dock bonds to meet the first expense of developing the important public docks system. This amount, it is believed, will be enough to meet the expense of constructing the first unit of the dock system when additional bonds can be issued and the docks, so far as possible now, may be completed. But the bonds cannot be issued or sold until there is a quorum of the dock commission to attend to it.

The regular monthly meeting of the commission was scheduled for yesterday afternoon. Mr. Mulkey and Mr. Moore were present, and being unable to attend to the pressing business of the commission, spent the time commenting on the necessity of the mayor's taking action in filling the vacancy on the board left by Mr. Corbett.

Both were agreed that with the Panama canal nearly completed and the increased business brought about by the opening of the canal already moving toward Portland, there should be no unnecessary delay in equipping Portland with water terminal facilities necessary in meeting the competition of other Pacific coast ports.

"I expect to make the appointment very soon," said Mayor Rushlight this morning. "I have been giving very serious attention to this appointment and fully appreciate its importance."

leum motor, capable of 30 horsepower. Through the heroism of the engineer, who lost his life, the fire was extinguished before it reached the petroleum tank, containing 7000 gallons of the in-

flammable fluid. Had the Gjos been burned, Amundsen and all of his men undoubtedly would have lost their lives.

Reaches Magnetic Pole.

September 2 the vessel reached Peterson bay, in King William land. This haven was christened Gjos harbor and here in the neighborhood of the north magnetic pole Amundsen and his party devoted 19 months to continuous magnetic observations. While here Amundsen observed the Aurora Borealis.

On August 21 of the next year the Gjos passed through Dolphin and Union straits, and a third Arctic winter was prepared for. These quarters Amundsen left July 11, 1906, and on August 29 entered Behring strait, calling at Nome, Alaska.

It is curious that both the northwest passage and the northeast passage have been negotiated by Scandinavians. Baron Nils Nordenskiold having passed through the latter. While here Amundsen observed the Aurora Borealis.

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ARRAIGN LABOR CHIEFS TUESDAY

Forty-six Men Indicted by Indianapolis Grand Jury Called for Hearing.

Indianapolis, March 8.—Forty-six men indicted by the Indianapolis grand jury on charges of complicity in the nation wide dynamite conspiracy, among whom are many prominent labor men, will be arraigned in the United States district court here next Tuesday. The defendants involved in the California court proceedings will not be arraigned here.

It is reported that P. H. O'Donnell of Chicago will be chief counsel for the defendants. The indicted men will hold a conference Monday to complete plans for their defense.

The only defendant not yet arraigned is John McCray. John Carroll and Edward Phillips are making a hard fight at Syracuse, N. Y., to prevent extradition to Indiana.
