DAYS RIGHT OF WAY

People of Florence Feel Assured That Road Will Be Built Soon.

(Special to The Journal.)
Florence, Or., March 13.—From all indications the building of the Eugene-Coos Bay railroad has at last become a fact to the people of this section of the country. W. Walker, the right-of-way agent of the Southern Pacific company, is taking 30-day options on all land through which his company's line will pass. In each case where buildings are in the way he has given instruction to have them removed by July 1. Final payments have been made on all options before becoming delinquent and Mr. Walker states that the company is ready to pay cash for all rights of way when clear titles by abstract can be shown, and the 30 day option is for the purpose of giving his company time to examine cloudy titles.

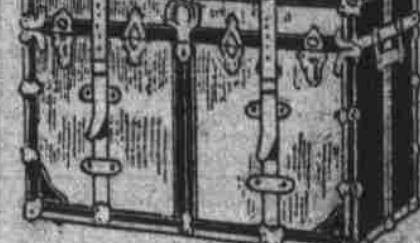
