

VESSEL READY TO SAIL LACKS ENOUGH SAILORS

Schurbek Takes Big Cargo of Fir for Antofagasta; 15 Seamen Needed to Complete the Crew.

Finishing her cargo of lumber for Antofagasta at the North Pacific mills yesterday afternoon, the German ship Schurbek, Captain Christensen, went to the stream immediately and will be ready to sail for the west coast as soon as she can complete her crew. She has aboard approximately 2,140,000 feet of fir. She is under charter to the American trading company.

The Schurbek lacks 15 men of having a full crew and it is feared by the captain that there will be some delay in getting all the berths full, as there seems to be a scarcity of men willing to ship for a deep sea voyage at this time of the year. The near approach of the fishing season makes the work of securing seamen difficult as they prefer fishing to voyages even in the west coast of South America. With the coming of spring and the opening up of other work, it makes it doubly difficult to get men, say the masters.

The German ship Kilo, which is now in the stream ready to go down with a cargo of wheat for the United Kingdom tomorrow morning, was more fortunate in not having but three men to get and they were placed aboard as soon as she went to stream. It is said, however, that two of them were "sailors," only one being an able seaman. Another lumber ship which is about ready to begin taking on cargo is the German ship Reinbek, Captain Simon, which will finish discharging her shingle ballast at the Clark & Wilson mills at Linnton today and start working lumber Saturday. Contrary to the custom of most of the sailers coming into port, she did not discharge at the ballast dock, but put the entire amount off at the mill dock, where it is being used as ballast for a railroad that is being built by the Clark & Wilson Lumber company. The ballast was discharged on the dock and hauled to the railroad grade by teams belonging to the company.

LIGHT NOT VISIBLE

Lucerie Officer Also Sights Floating Spar and Roots of Tree.

In a report to the local branch hydrographic office, S. C. Gardner, second officer of the British steamship Lucerie, states that the Viti Rocks light, in Puget sound, was not visible at 4 o'clock on the morning of March 18, although the rocks were plainly visible. He also reports that on March 9, while the steamer was on her way from Japan, they sighted a spar 30 feet long and one foot in diameter covered with marine growth, in latitude 50 north, longitude 171 west, and on the same day in latitude 50 north, longitude 171 west, the roots of a large tree, also covered with marine growth, were sighted.

NEW FREIGHT AGENT

Steamship Company Establishes New Office; H. F. Ruger Appointed.

In order to take care of the freight business of the San Francisco & Portland Steamship company in this part of the country, H. F. Ruger has been appointed traveling freight agent for the northwest, according to a circular received from the San Francisco office this morning by the local officials. Ruger has worked for the company a number of years on the Alinworth dock and his headquarters will be in Portland, although he will work on the great part of the time through Oregon, Washington and Idaho. The new appointment becomes effective on April 1.

STR. YELLOWSTONE SOLD

Charles R. McCormick Lumber Co. to Carry Passengers Only.

Following out an idea of having nothing but steamers which will carry passengers and also of having larger carriers in their fleet, the Charles R. McCormick Lumber company has disposed of the steamer Yellowstone and she will be due to arrive here tonight on her last voyage under that name. She was bought by W. E. Scammell, who recently purchased the steamer Homer. The only steamer remaining in the McCormick fleet which does not carry passengers is the steamer Shoshone.

ALONG THE WATERFRONT

In tow of the Port of Portland towboat Ocklahoma, the British ship Kirkcubrightshire, Captain Roberts, left up at 3 this morning from Astoria and will be moored at the Pacific Coast bunkers, where she will discharge coal from Newcastle, Australia.

To complete her cargo of wheat for the United Kingdom, the German ship Thielbek shifted this morning from Montgomery dock No. 1, to the Irving dock, where she is expected to finish her cargo tomorrow afternoon or Saturday morning.

Carrying a large list of 140 passengers and 1600 tons of general freight the North Pacific steamer Roanoke, Captain Parkinson, sailed last night for San Francisco, San Pedro and San Diego.

To consider the proposition of the dredge Columbia making a fill for the new gas plant of the Portland Gas & Coke company south of the Government moorings, the Port of Portland commission will hold a special meeting this afternoon.

As Chief Engineer Barker of the oil tank steamer Catania has gone to Willapa, Del., to superintend the construction of the new steamer being built there for Sudden & Christensen, he has been succeeded by Chief Engineer Hogan.

SHERWOOD, DR., LOSES FOUNDER AND MAYOR

Sherwood, Or., March 21.—James C. Smock, pioneer, died at his home here on Friday, March 15, and was buried Sunday afternoon under the direction of Sherwood Lodge I. O. O. F. of which order he had been a member for 48 years. He was born in Nodaway county, Missouri, August 13, 1848, and crossed the plains in 1852 and settled with his parents near Rex in the southwest corner of Washington county. When 21 years of age he married Mary Ellen Sebastian and moved into what is now the townsite of Sherwood. He founded the town of Sherwood and then engaged in the mercantile business from which he retired about six years ago. He was a man of the greatest prominence in his home community, having served his town in many capacities, being several years postmaster, mayor, councilman, justice of the peace and notary public, and at the time of his death was mayor of the town. He was the guide, counselor and friend of his community.

He leaves a widow and five children, namely, Mrs. Nettie M. Fitch, Mrs. Rosa B. Morlock, Mrs. Dora E. Saltus, Ira T. Smock and Ray Smock, all of this place, 10 grandchildren and many other relatives.

WEIRS ARE DEMANDED BY C. O. I. C. WATER USERS

(Salem Bureau of The Journal.) Salem, Or., March 21.—E. W. Richardson, of Bend, chairman of the board of directors of the Central Oregon Irrigation company Water Users' association, files a complaint with the desert land board against the Central Oregon Irrigation company to compel the company to install weirs at the point of delivery of water for each settler under the company's irrigation system. The complaint alleges that many of the settlers have not received water as stipulated in their contracts, but at the same time are compelled by the company to pay the yearly maintenance fee, while other settlers higher up on the canal may be taking more than their share of water without knowing how much they are using.

The water users also petition the desert land board for a rule for the rotation of water by the company that will be practical, and not to cover more than four least legal subdivision in any one set of rotators.

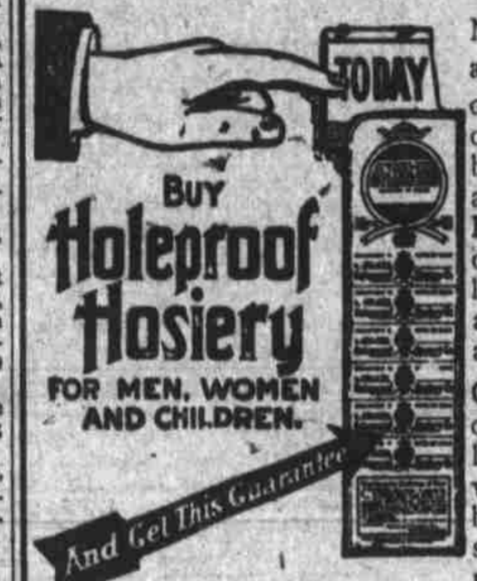
