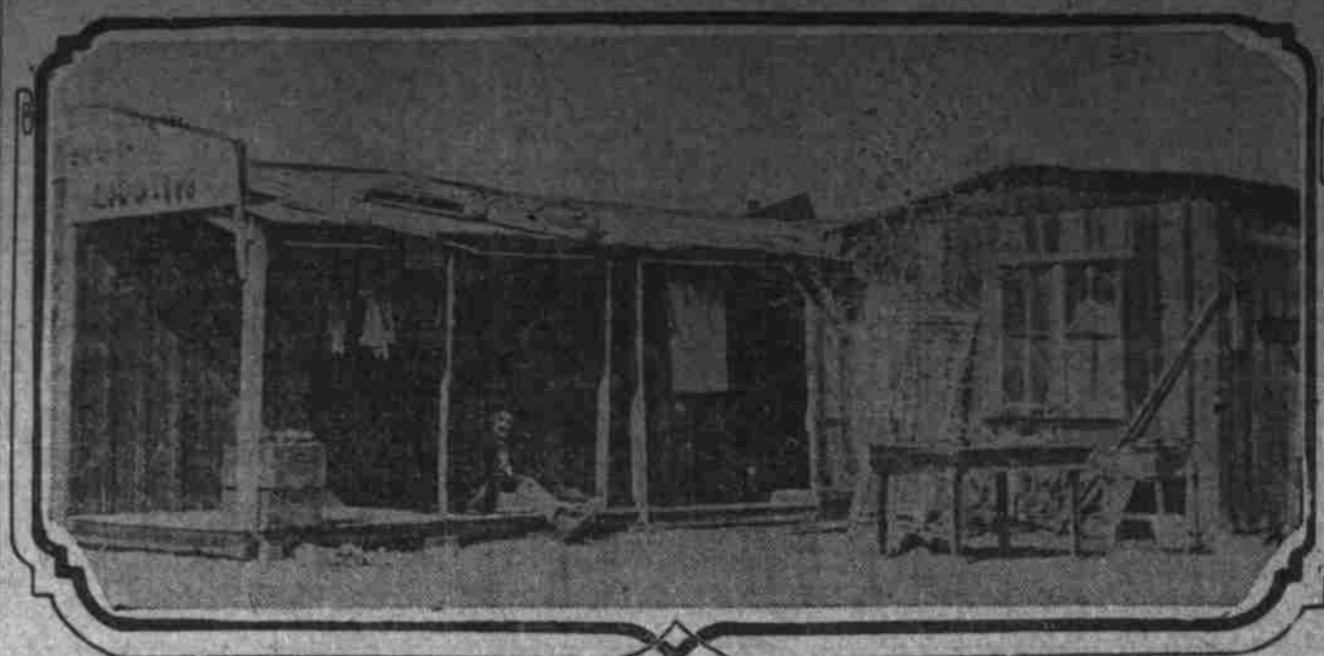

TRIO LEFT PORTLAND JANUARY 3: PLANNED GOLD SEARCH IN SOUTH
Mrs. Harriet Guyot, the widow of Leopold Guyot, M. D., of Brussels, Belgium, was 59 years old. For a year she

had been living with her son, A. H. Guyot and his wife at Eighty-eighth street and East 42nd. For a year or so, Frank Baurvaerts, also a native of Brussels, was a partner of A. H. Guyot. He is about 38 years of age and is a miner. He has a wife living in Brussels with her aged mother. Before returning to Brussels to live with her two daughters, who are physicians, the widow Guyot desired to see more of the United States. Baurvaerts, who for four or five years had prospected in Ontario and Quebec, inflamed by the story of two Belgians who recently returned from Alaska with a fortune of \$2,000,000, planned a prospecting trip in southern California. This plan appealed to the widow Guyot, who was in excellent health and sturdy and strong. Mrs. Guyot taking Julia Francois, the pretty 18-year-old girl of The Dalles, with her as a companion, the trio started for the south January 3 on the steamer Beaver. Arriving in San Francisco, they went by the most direct route to Paso Verde, striking out into the hills. During the last few weeks prospects, letters and photographs have been received from all three of the gold hunters. They said they had good prospects. They were 45 miles from the nearest postoffice and not far from the Mexican border. Young Guyot told The Journal that Baurvaerts had said that he "knew" Julia Francois, but Guyot thought nothing of his remark, as he knew the man was married. Guyot, however, warned his mother before the party left. She declared that she trusted the miner. The party had common purse, young Guyot having furnished them \$500 before their departure. Baurvaerts carried the money. Young Guyot and Francois, the father of the girl, have wired to the California authorities, asking them to hold the bodies until further instructions. Both men probably will go to California to take charge of the remains. Guyot and Francois were informed of

the murders by The Journal. Francois was reached by long distance telephone and Guyot was told, with the help of Andrew McMillan, Arthur Basmussen, a mail carrier and Patrolman Bigelow.

AVIATOR AND HIS PLANE TAKE MUDBATH TOGETHER
San Rafael, Cal., March 21.—Dieder Masson, the French aviator, is repairing a wrecked biplane here today as the result of an unexpected mud bath which he received when a broken skid precipitated him headlong into a marsh. The yielding mud probably saved the aviator from serious injury. Masson recently made successful flights from San Francisco to Oakland. The wrecked machine was a new military biplane, the first ever built in San Rafael.
