

### MAINE'S LOWER HOUSE UNANIMOUSLY TAKES FLING AT ROOSEVELT

#### Votes Not to Invite Colonel to Address Legislature While on Tour.

Augusta, Maine, March 21.—Determined opposition to former President Roosevelt was shown in the state legislature at today's session, when the lower house voted unanimously not to invite Roosevelt to address the legislature.

### SAYS ITS NOTHING BUT TAFT, SELLING

### MYRTLE CREEK MAKES J. N. MARTIN MAYOR

Myrtle Creek, Or., March 21.—The initial election Monday brought out most of the voters, 89 votes being polled. The voting was conducted in a tent in the middle of Main street at the intersection of Second street, this being the point where the three voting wards of the town join, one voting booth accommodating all in this novel way. For mayor, J. N. Martin defeated B. A. Hunaker, the incumbent, by 51 to 38. For recorder, C. A. Nelson polled 80 votes, E. Bond one and Mrs. McNabb's Newfoundland dog one. E. J. Fairbanks was elected treasurer over O. A. Kirby, by 50 to 35. For councilman-at-large, William Davis defeated C. A. Strong, receiving 52 votes to 23 for his opponent.

In ward One, J. P. Hoover received 21 votes to 1 for W. Berdine, the latter's name having been written on the ticket.

In ward Two, C. A. Steizer received 17 votes, E. Benton 12, B. Tate 16 and A. Piper 7 votes. Benton will serve for two years and Steizer for one year.

In ward Three, P. F. Fanher won over Will Gallup by 18 to 12.

He enlisted in company K, Twenty-sixth Iowa volunteer infantry, August 18, 1862, being honorably discharged June 27, 1865. He moved to Oregon in January, 1891, coming to Cottage Grove in 1895, following a residence at Crawfordville and Springfield. He moved to Portland in 1897.
