

**BIDDING KEELER
DRESSING CAREER
SHOWS SUCCESS**

Livestock Exhibition Ended Yesterday With an Attendance Estimated at 5500—Stock Brings High Prices.

Closing yesterday afternoon with an estimated attendance of over 5500 people, the Second Annual Pacific Northwest Livestock show passed into history as the most successful event of its kind ever held in Portland. This morning all of the successful exhibitors were ready to return to their ranches. Everyone attending was surprised at the large number of prize stock that was placed on exhibition and at the numbers of persons who came to visit the show.

The event of the last day was the sales of the breeding cattle from the combined farms of W. O. Minor of Clatsop, Frank Brown of Carlton and A. D. Dunn of Wapato, Wash., and the principal sale was that of Mr. Brown's pure white 5-year-old bull "Wapato" to Miss Lillian M. Julian of Yreka, Cal., a rancher who was present at the ring-side and attracted a great deal of attention by her spirited bidding for the animal in competition with breeders of Oregon, Washington and Idaho.

The sales of the stock was about evenly divided among the breeders of the three northwest states and as the competition was very keen all of the stock offered brought excellent prices. A list of the stock sold and the price paid and the names of the buyers follows, most of the sales made to Mr. Plummer being for dealers in the vicinity of Portland or for the purpose of later sales.

Judges Make Selections.
Monday, the first day of the show, was taken up by the judges in making their selections, and by some of the later exhibitors in getting their stock placed, and late in the afternoon the judges announced some of the awards. Every class was filled with plenty of contestants.

Tuesday was the most interesting day of the show and the crowd of business men from the Inland Empire that came on their "Boosters' special," were the guests of the various commercial organizations of the city, and enlivened the show by their picturesque stunts. Tuesday afternoon was the fat-cattle sales and it was then that the grand champion steer of the show brought the top-notch price of \$120 per pound, the highest price paid for beef on the Pacific coast and the second highest ever obtained in the United States. All of the sales in this day were for large money, there being one sale for \$50 per pound and several for from 10c to 20c, and the grand total of sales was far ahead of expectations of the growers.

HE WILL EXPLAIN DANISH PLAN TO SOUTHERNERS

(Special to The Journal.)
Copenhagen, March 21.—Dr. Maurice Egan, United States minister to Denmark, left today for America for the purpose of giving a series of lectures in the southern states. Dr. Egan's trip is in response to a special invitation from the Southern Commercial Society to speak before the commercial bodies in a number of the leading cities of the south on the subject of "Danish Agricultural Cooperation and Conservation."
The position of Denmark as a school for the study of scientific agriculture is becoming more important every year and Dr. Egan has made a close study of the methods which have made Denmark a leader in cooperative agriculture, especially in the effect of the plan on the cost of living. It is his belief that the remedy for the present shortage in the food supply and the consequent high cost of living is to be found only in peasant cooperation among the farmers, aided by the hearty support of the national and state governments.
