

PINS HIS HOPE ON CHAMP CLARK

Campaign Manager Thinks
Missourian Will Carry
State.

James T. Barbee, manager of the Champ Clark campaign in Oregon, says "the boys are coming out of the trenches" to the support of the Missouriian and he is satisfied when the votes are counted the Clark vote will largely overbalance the vote for Woodrow Wilson.

"Clark is gaining every day," he said. "I believe Clark will carry Oregon, for the reports coming in from other counties are most encouraging, and Clark will carry Multnomah by a big vote. A few counties report for Wilson, but they are only a few."

"Clark is strong with the great mass of the voters, for his sympathies are with the people. He has always been a progressive and he has shown his ability when placed in a position of responsibility. If Clark is nominated, he will get Oregon's vote in November, and Wilson cannot."

"We have to face the situation as it is. There is no use denying the effect of Wilson's speeches and interviews. He should be the nominee. The Republicans will dig up an interview in which Wilson spoke of Bryan as 'foolish and dangerous' in his theories of government, and while Bryan is broad enough to overlook that, many Democrats will go fishing on election day if he is the nominee. Then we will have thrown in our face, the page in Wilson's history where he tells of the theft of the Chinese and the duller minds of those who have been displaced by Chinese cheap labor."

"These are the things we cannot get away from. I will cheerfully support Wilson if he is the nominee, but I do not believe he will be. We need a great leader like Clark, who has always been a progressive and has the confidence of the plain people of the land."

P. R. L. & P. RATE BENEFITS USERS

People Would Be Saved \$110-
000 on Basis of 1911 Busi-
ness; Effective July 1.

By the cutting of its rates for electric light and power as announced today the Portland Railway, Light & Power company saves the people of Portland \$110,000, if the same rates were applied to the receipts of 1911 for electric light and power. The reduction is the result of the practice of economies in the management and the acquisition of additional facilities. The new schedule for lighting consists of 9, 7 and 4 cents per kilowatt hour instead of 15 and 5 cents. The new rate goes into effect in July. Bills on this reduced schedule will be mailed to the customers who have signed up for the new rate beginning with July 1. It has been the intention of the company since last June to put in new rates.

"The present rates in Portland," said Mr. Josselyn, "have been developed over a period of years with the growth of the city and its requirements for light and power, and up to the present time there has not been a thoroughly scientific standardization of the schedules. The efforts of our experts have, therefore, been directed toward a standardization of rates for similar service so that as far as possible customers should pay exactly the same rate under like conditions."

Decrease Revenues \$110,000.

"The new schedule of lighting rates, which is announced in the advertising columns, will effect a material reduction in the bills of practically all residence customers and most of our commercial customers, and are more favorable than was contemplated in the announcement made last June. This reduction applied to 1911 business would decrease our revenue from lighting customers more than \$110,000."

"We have also decided to offer our patrons who do not care to sign up for periods of a year or more, an application form of service for lighting or power, which may be terminated on three days' notice. Such service would, of course, necessitate somewhat higher charges than the yearly contract service."

"Among the new schedules is included a wholesale power rate which, for the average user within practical working limits, is lower than any other electric power rate on the Pacific coast. This should add materially to Portland's advantages as a manufacturing center and be a great inducement for factories to locate here."

With a view of inspecting the proposed extensions and improvements to be made during the coming year by the Portland Railway, Light & Power company, C. M. Clark of Philadelphia, chairman of the executive committee of the company, is in the city and is at present devoting a large share of his time to going over the property. He is accompanied by Mrs. Clark and their son, E. W. Clark. In speaking in regard to the difficulty of securing money to develop public utility properties C. M. Clark said:

"Profits Not Exorbitant.

"There is a general impression, which I think is erroneous, that the profits from the public utility business are exorbitant, and that if it is necessary for the people to reduce these profits either by taxation or reduction of rates and fares. This may have been true 10 or 15 years ago, but conditions have changed through increasing expenses and lower rates. I doubt if any of the business men of Portland would consider that they were making a fair living if their business yielded no greater return than is common among public utility companies."

"Another important feature of this question is the problem as presented to the financiers who have the responsibility of raising the money required for the constant additions and improvements upon the public utilities, due to the rapid growth of our American cities. For reasons stated above it is more difficult than it was some years ago to sell bonds on public utility companies. They must be made more attractive and the price is lower. Bankers who handle such bonds demand many conditions of security for the bondholder which were not usual some years ago."

RECOMMEND NEW MEAT INSPECTION MEASURE

Passage of the new meat inspection ordinance drafted by City Health Officer C. H. Wheeler was recommended by the meeting of the health and police committee of the city council. The measure carries with it a clause providing for the appropriation of money to pay the salaries of two inspectors at \$100 a month. The ordinance repeals an existing law which has never been enforced. This law provided that all carcasses offered for sale in the city must have passed through an official abattoir in South Portland.

The establishment of a municipal inspection of meat was urged last winter by the state health authorities, but an ordinance submitted by State Health Officer Calvin S. White met with a storm of protest all over the state. The White ordinance contained a section which would have compelled out of town shippers to leave the viscera in every animal carcass shipped to the city. The viscera, which includes the heart, liver and lungs, decomposes rapidly and causes the carcass in which it is left to spoil. Farmers living at some distance from the city believed that this limitation would have eliminated their product from the local market.

The Wheeler ordinance permits shippers to ship the carcasses clean. A petition signed by 21 commission merchants of the city was submitted to the committee today asking that the Wheeler ordinance be passed. The measure will go before the city council next week.

The committee took no action on the proposed electrical inspection ordinance, deciding to postpone consideration of the measure until the next meeting in order to give all affected interests an opportunity to be heard.

SUITOR STABS WIDOW WHILE TOTS STAND BY

San Francisco, March 22.—While her three little children stood by paralyzed with fear, Francesco Troche, a Porto Rican ship scaler, plunged a stiletto five times into the breast of Mrs. Tomaso Diaz in the kitchen of her home here today, and then fell upon the woman's body, after twice burying the knife in his own breast.

Little hope is held out for the woman's life, but Troche will recover. Mr. Diaz had repulsed her countryman's advances. She is a widow.

500 PEOPLE ATTEND FAREWELL RECEPTION

The farewell reception given last night to James J. Regan, president of the Ancient Order of Hibernians, was attended by almost all of the representative Catholics of the community. Masonic Temple was crowded with an audience of fully 500 people who were held spellbound by the oratory of Mr. Regan, while he told of the things that the order stood for and explained the ideals and the method of endeavoring to accomplish them. Mr. Regan thinks that the chapters of the order in Portland are among the strongest in the United States, and complimented them very highly on the good work accomplished here.

After several songs at the beginning

of the program, the speaker of the evening was introduced to the audience with a short talk by E. H. Deery, the state president, during which he read several telegrams from representative men regretting that they found it impossible to attend. Governor West said that as he had just returned from the "Oregon First" trip to California and found a great deal of business that required his immediate attention he could not be present, and P. H. Darcy of Salem telegraphed that sickness prevented his coming.

Archbishop Christie made a short speech extolling Mr. Regan and the order he represents on account of the splendid aid it is to the young men in helping them with higher ideals.

"As our guest of honor has said," said the archbishop, "the order needs more members, and with the splendid organization that they have here it should not be a very difficult thing to accomplish. We of the church are always ready to assist them in every way possible."

Mr. Regan enjoyed his brief stay very much. He left at 1:30 this morn-

ing for Sacramento, after promising the members of the order another visit in the near future.

fer with A. F. Berg of the Ad club who has the affair in charge. The giving of the show is made possible by the management of the Peoples theatre, which has donated the house for the evening.

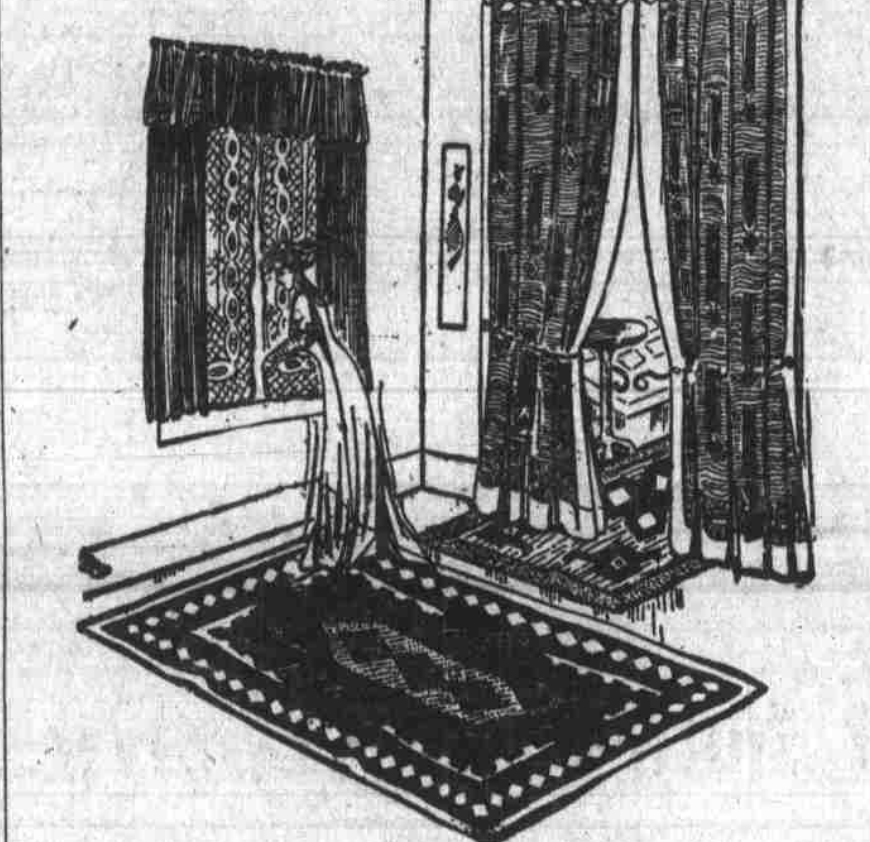
Emperor Out on Jaunt.

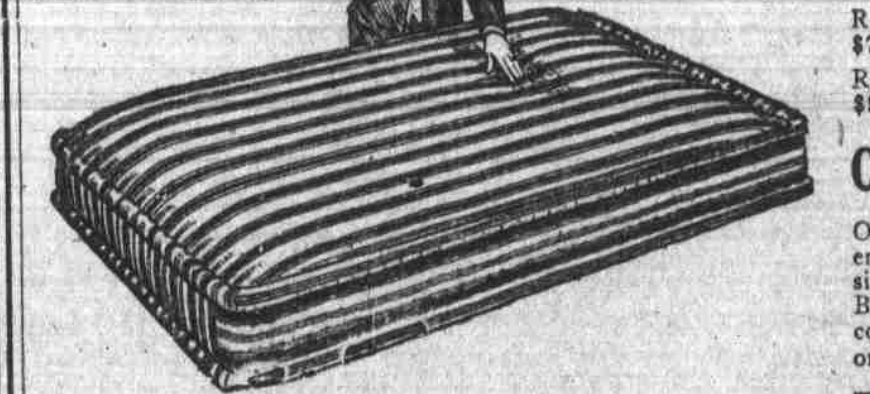

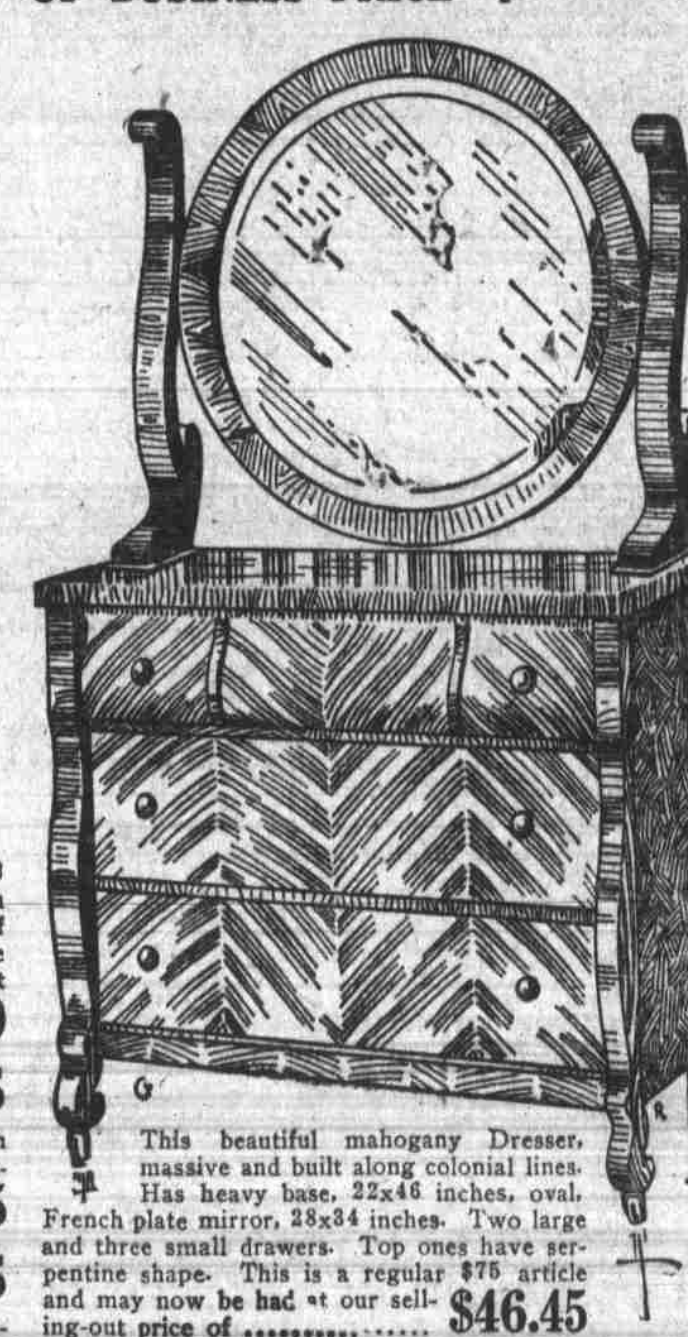
