NEW FISHING CO. SOON BEGIN WORK

Oregon Coast Fishing Co., In--corporated, May Add Other Boats to Fleet Shortly-Capt. Nelson in Charge.

Embarking on a new enterprise, a Portland firm known as the Oregon Coast Fishing company, which was incorporated here three months ago, has purchased the fishing schooner Vida from King & Wing of the West Coast Fishing company, Seattle, and will embark in the fishing business off the Oregon coast within about two weeks.

Captain George Nelson, who will have mmand of the fishing craft, is now at Seattle and will leave for Portland with her within two or three days. She will come to Portland, where she will outfit for her fishing cruise off Tillamook bay, making the Port of Tillamook the base of her operations.

The Vida was built in Seattle in 1891 for the fishing business and operated for a long time in the waters of southeastern Alaska. She is 28 tons net with a length of 50 feet, 17.2 feet beam and has a depth of hold of 6.4 feet. She was formerly the sailing schooner Em-mett Felitz, but was renamed when she had gasoline power installed.

It is expected that she will make the run down here from the sound in about 20 hours and she will remain here for several days, taking on supplies for her fishing operations. She will carry about six men, including the fishermen. A member of the Oregon Coast Fish-

TO TAKE BIG CARGO

Lowrie to Load 49,000 Barrels of Flour; 791,000 Feet of Lumber.

An unusually large cargo of flour and lumber will be taken out from here on the Bank Line steamer Luceric, Captain Mathie, which arrived at the North Bank dock last night from Manila and other oriental ports via Puget sound. After discharging her inward cargo, consisting of hemp, sulphur, peanuts and general freight, the Luceric will ed to one of the four mills, where she will begin loading her cargo for the other side of the Pacific. She will take out a total of 49,000 barrels of flour 100,000 feet to Hongkong, 180,000 feet to Kobe and 420,000 feet to Yokohama, Newport. 1000 barrels for Manils, 28,000 barrels for Hongkong, 10,000 barrels for Moji and 10,000 barrels for Kobe. She is scheduled to sail for the orient via Puget sound ports, where she will complete her cargo on April 5.

IKALIS TO TAKE LUMBER

She is under charter to the American Trading company.

HIGH CHARTER RATE

German Bark Schiffbek Taken for Lumber at 78s 9d.

Advices received today state that the German bark Schiffbek, 2527 tons net. been chartered at the highest rate paid to a salling vessel for a similar voyage in a number of years, the yessel having been fixed to load a cargo of lumber at a north Pacific port for the United Kingdom. The Schiffbek receives 78s 9d, that being an advance of 5 shillings over the next highest figure, that being the Kinrossshire. The Schiffbek is now due at Santa Rosalia from Hamburg. She is expected to arrive on , north Pacific for loading during July or August.

These figures show that the company has a capital stock of \$25,000,000, of which 65 per cent, or \$16,250,000, is now paid in. Stockholders are liable at any time for the balance of 35 per cent, which may be called as needed. The stock is at present paying 4 per cent dividends.

Outstanding in underlying bonds that will not be distributed is indebtedness of \$18,000,000, and of the bond issue recently authorized, \$16,000,000 in bonds has been sold. Proceeds of these \$16,000,000 bonds will be used in part to retire \$11,673,000 existing funded debt and all floating debt, and in part to pay and all floating debt, and in part to pay for additions and improvements,

The company will also be reimbursed from them for heavy expenditures that have not been bonded. Among such expenditures may be mentioned that in-curred in building the new Cazadero This makes a total of \$34,000,000 in

bonded indebtedness outstanding against the company February 16, 1912. As the directors authorized a mortgage of \$25,-000,000 on the properties of the com-pany to secure bonds, this leaves \$41,-

000,000 not yet taken out.

"This merger is of vital importance to the people of Portland at this time, as it shows the tendency of large corporations to contralize their interests in one large scheme to eliminate competition. In granting franchises to public service corporations the rights of the public may be protected in a measure by conditions preventing a sale to a competitor without the consent of the granting body, but there are so many ways to dircumvent these provisions ways to circumvent these provisions that the greatest degree of care and prophetic wisdom must be exercised to

meet contingencies.
"In addition to the exercise of great or care in granting franchises, I would commend the enactment of anti-trust laws, the violation of which would land nate cares nothing for a fine, but he cringes at the thought of a prison sentence. I fear this absorption is the forerunner of another much greater merger right here in Oregon, and we must prepare to meet it, or be swallowed entirely."

INDEPENDENCE AGAIN LOSES BUSINESS PLACES


(Special to The Journal.)
