Dr. White talked plainly. His list of counties with full and reliable statistics: Multnomah, Clatsop, Douglas, Wasco, Jackson, Josephine, Marion, Tillamook, Umatilla and Union.

Statistics fairly accurate: Baker, Benton, Coos, Hood River, Lane, Washington and Yamhill.

Statistics totally inaccurate: Clackamas, Columbia, Grant, Lincoln, Polk, Sherman and Wallowa.

Statistics utterly worthless and simply a farce: Crook, Gilliam, Lake, Malheur and Wheeler.
