PRICE OF SALMON

Closing of Clackamas to Net Fishermen and New Dead Line in Willamette, Question -Anglers Take Issue.

The high cost of living has bobbed up in a peculiar way as a factor in a threecornered quarrel between the Oregon state fish commission, prominent followers of the ancient sport-of angling, and wholesale fish dealers of Portland. in which the time, places and conditions under which salmon may be netted for commercial purposes are the basis of

The high cost of living, the fish dealers assert with confidence, soon will get in its deadly work on those who would dine on the toothsome red flesh of the royal chinook. This by reason of recent rulings of the fish commission, aided and abetted by the enthusiastic support of the anglers, closing the Clackamas river altogether to not fishermen and extending the deadline in the Willamette river within which no gill nets may be used to a point about 1500 feet below the fish ladder at the Oregon City falls.

Will Boost Prices. All this, they say, will have the effect of depleting the early season supply of fresh salmon in the Portland markets by just about half, with a corresponding soar in prices. Adding much to the unhappiness of the dealers is still another ruling of the commission which has lopped 16 days off the beginning of

the spring season. Thus no salmon may be caught this year before May 1, where last year the seasah opened April 15. The special ness of this ruling, from viewpoint of the fish dealers, lies in the fact that these lost 15 days represent about the best period of the whole year for hig catches in the Willamette. The run of salmon there generally falls off to very small proportions after the third week in May.

Now comes the part played in the controversy by the anglers. Representative fish dealers charge with some bitterness that the rulings are discriminatory against them, and through them against the consumer, and that they have been inspired by the cannerymen and anglers, each of these classes having a representative on the commission, while the fish dealers alone have none.

Anglers to Rescue. They have even gone so far as to pre-pare an initiative measure to abolish the present appointive fish commission and substitute for it an elective fish commissioner, which they will submit to the voters at the coming general elec-

The cannerymen have not been heard from, but the anglers have taken up the mor industry. The anglers deny the claims of the dealers, commend the




