WELLS FARGO PAYS LONG FOUGHT TAX

State Receives \$13,161 and 2
Years' Interest on Gross
Earnings Basis.

Portland, Ore., April 1.—The Wells-Fargo Express company, through Attorney Wallace McCamant, today paid over to the state \$13,161.77, with accrued interest of 6 per cent since January 1, 1916, due for gross earnings tax. The payment was made in the circuit court of Marion county. Attorney General Clifford representing the state. This payment is one of three that tested the gross earnings tax law in the United States telephone company case, which was decided against the company by the United States supreme court.

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MADERO TO SEND BROTHER TO TAKE ARMY COMMAND

Mexico's President Announces
He Will Have Gustavo Con-
duct Decisive Battle With
Rebels at Torreón.

Mexico City, April 1.—Addressing a joint session of congress here today, President Francisco I. Madero announced his determination to send his brother, Gustavo, to Torreón to take command of the federal forces concentrating there. Government officials believe that Mexico's fate will figure largely in the outcome of the battle at Torreón, as a rebel victory will mean an attack on the capital.

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BOURNE ASKS MORE FUNDS FOR CELILO CUT

Washington, April 1.—When the subcommittee takes up the rivers and harbors bill tomorrow, Senator Bourne will endeavor to get an increase of \$300,000 for Celilo canal. Next year he hopes to get \$1,200,000 to complete the project two years earlier than was originally intended, whereby the government will be saved fully \$200,000.

They claimed that they had been married under the California civil code and had come into the state as man and wife.

SIX HUNTERS WITH DOGS GET SEVERE SENTENCES

For the first time in the history of the game warden's office it has been found possible to convict men of running deer with dogs, and seven convictions were secured last week, six in Polk county and one in Columbia county. Henry Waters, of St. Helens, was fined \$100 and given a jail sentence of 60 days. He has long been suspected of running the deer for parties of Portland hunters, and the game officials are looking for some of the would-be sportsmen of Portland who have been out with him. At the time of his arrest his companions managed to escape the officers.

The \$50,000 fines imposed on each company also were affirmed.

His Conscience Too Much for
Safe-Cracker and Army De-
serter: Reading of Bible
Sets Him on Right Road.

San Francisco, April 1.—Struck by a lively conscience, Harvey S. Sprague, safe cracker and army deserter, cannot rest until he has answered to the law for all his misdeeds. Having already served a term in the federal military prison as a deserter, Sprague today gave himself up to the police and asked that he be sent back to Salmon City, Idaho, to be punished for cracking a safe three years ago.

FISHERMEN RUSH TO GET ANGLERS' LICENSES

Although the salmon fishing season in District No. 1, comprising the Columbia river and its tributaries does not begin until May 1, many licenses were issued this morning. For the new fishing year which begins today, sixty applications were filed for set-net licenses, 59 gill-net licenses, five traps, 11 seines, 13 fish wheels, one scow, one salmon cannery and 132 fish dealers. For District No. 2, taking in the coast section below the Columbia river, there were 27 gill-net licenses, 211 set-nets, and 30 fish dealers.

MINISTERS REFUSE TO "BACK" TICKET

Pastors Turn Deaf Ear to the
Plea for Indorsement of
Any One Ticket.

The effort to have the Portland Ministerial association indorse a ticket for forthcoming primaries was renewed at today's meeting of the association, but it fell on deaf ears. In an impromptu 15 minutes' talk, W. E. Critchlow, who was introduced as the wheelhorse of the Prohibition party, urged the association to select a ticket of good men and then get the ministers to collectively back it. He said the most powerful agent for good government in the city and that unless they made their influence felt in the coming primary a number of undesirable men would be nominated for the most important offices. He particularly urged the association to indorse candidates for sheriff and district attorney. He declared that if Seneca Fouts is nominated for district attorney, law enforcement would come to a standstill in Multnomah county, and every man in Portland would be justified in carrying a pistol for his own self protection.

CHICAGO CARPENTERS STRIKE; POLICE GUARD
