General Buckner's 89th Birthday. (Special to The Journal.) Munfordville, Ky., April 1.—At his quaint old log house at Glen Lily on the Green river, eight miles above this city, General Simon Bolivar Buckner, formerly governor of Kentucky and now the only remaining corps commander of the Confederate army, received today many of his friends who called to congratulate him on his eighty-ninth birthday. Still hale and strong for his years, General Buckner entertained his visitors with old time hospitality and responded to the toasts in his usual happy style.

A Damaging Report of Foreign Missions
New York, March 31.—The International Bible Students association secured the Hippodrome in which to hear the report of its committee on foreign missions investigation. The spacious auditorium was crowded. Professor F. H. Robinson, as secretary of the committee, announced that the report as a whole had been submitted to the association and was in the printer's hands, to appear in pamphlet form, illustrated. It will shortly be procurable at the small price of 5 cents per copy, postpaid to any address free to the post. The conclusion of the report is in the nature of a summary, which he read. Some of its more salient points are as follows:
Christianity endeavors seem pretty generally to have ceased. Present missionary endeavors are almost exclusively along the line of secular education and medical aid.
There is less need of academic and collegiate education, such as the missionaries forward, than for common schooling. The general common school education could best be furnished by the government and along national lines, after the method followed under United States supervision in the Philippine Islands.
The orientals are remarkably tolerant of all religions, and are perplexed at the missionary competition, and opposition between Christian denominations. They would accept Christianity if it could demonstrate its superiority. Their educated classes include splendid specimens of noble manhood, the moral and intellectual peers of Europeans and Americans. Drunkenness and outward immorality are almost unknown.
The very suggestion of the world's conversion is ridiculous to the peoples of the east—including the missionaries.
The interest on \$50,000,000, or the principal multiplied a thousand times, would accomplish little except along the lines of secular education—nothing as respects the world's conversion. Nothing short of "the kingdom of God's dear Son" can meet the issue.

A PLAN FOR NEW YORK "LONELIES"

THE members of the Y. M. C. A. wish to marry. And they do not know how to go about it. Not that they are not perfectly aware that a girl, a minister, a ring, and a license are all necessary adjuncts to the proceeding. But here is the point: Although the Y. M. C. A. members may know where the minister, the ring and the license are to be found, they do not know where to get the girl. This is not heresy. They have admitted their predicament. In fact, in their distress they have turned to Mr. Walter T. Diack, secretary of the West Side branch, who explains the situation something after this fashion:

"The average young man who comes to New York to earn his living has absolutely no opportunity to meet really nice girls of his own class. This is partly the fault of the conditions which exist in the city and partly the fault of the young men themselves. But either case results in bitter loneliness. When I say it is the fault of the young man himself if he does not possess his own little circle of friends, I mean this: If a young man really wishes to become acquainted with nice people in this city he has only to seek the church of his own denomination and attend it regularly. After his first two or three visits either the minister or some member of the congregation will surely notice and speak to him, and then introductions and developments of friendships follow naturally."

"But no matter how regular the religious habits of a young man have been at home he drifts away from the church once he arrives in New York. To begin with, competition is so keen in this city that it takes every particle of any man's strength to make his way here when he once arrives. When Sunday comes he is too tired to attend church. As a matter of fact, if he does form any friendships at all in his business life he is too worn out even to keep up with them evenings. And so months and finally years slip by and the young man finds himself lonely and utterly friendless, partly because they have made no effort to make friends and partly because when the opportunity to meet people came they thought themselves too busy to seize it."

"We have had receptions in the Y. M. C. A.," continued Mr. Diack, "and at these receptions we have had women to help us receive or to pour tea. Once after such a reception a young man came to me and confided that he had just shaken hands with a woman for the first time in a year and a half, or the length of time in which he had been working in New York."

"Now we have not the slightest desire to run a matrimonial agency for the members of the Y. M. C. A. We simply wish to make it possible for them to meet the right kind of girls. The exact means we shall employ to this end have not as yet been decided upon. But probably the scheme will be worked out something after this fashion. The members of the Y. W. C. A. will be asked to form themselves into clubs. We, for our part, will also form clubs. And the two clubs composed of young men and of young women, will give entertainments and parties, thus giving the young the proper opportunity to meet each other and enjoy each other's society."

"Aside from this we have only one other function which might class us as a matrimonial agency. We shall be, as we always have been, glad to look into the record of any young person at the request of any other young person who has a personal reason for the investigation. I mean, if some young lady should become interested in and contemplate marriage with some one of our members we would always be very glad to investigate this member's moral life and to give the young lady a report upon it."

"The proposed series of entertainments, during which we intend to see that the young people have ample opportunity to become acquainted with each other, are a badly needed institution in this city," concluded Mr. Diack. "In no other city are the individuals who live in it so completely engrossed with themselves to the exclusion of all interest in anybody else. A young man might live in New York for years and never meet one person socially. In Chicago, New Orleans or Paris, or any other big city any place else in the world a young man man could scarcely hope, for example, to board in one house for years and yet not know personally one of the other boarders in the house. Such a thing is not only possible in New York, but it happens every day. To be compelled to live with yourself and only with yourself for days, months, years, is not a mellowing experience. We realize it. Our members realize it. And so we intend to supply the social atmosphere our young men so badly. If the young people after they have met each other, take it into their heads to marry we are scarcely responsible for that, though we shall admit we shall feel a certain amount of pardonable pride if a few happy marriages result from our invitation."
