SUES TO COLLECT HUGE FEE FOR 2 YEARS' WORK

San Francisco, April 2.—A suit for one of the largest attorney fees on record was begun before Judge Hunt when a jury was secured to hear evidence in efforts of Alfred A. Von Hovenberg, a San Francisco lawyer, to collect a balance of \$445,000 on a fee of \$250,000 which he charged for two years' work for the Contra Ranch company of Tehama county. Von Hovenberg asserts he earned the amount in connection with litigation in which the ranch, valued at \$480,000, was involved.

Goat, Hunting Bock Beer Sign, Noses Way Into Fruitstand, and Has Feast



Why anyone should worry because somebody gets one's goat is clear beyond the shopkeepers along Burnside and Seventh streets. The shopkeepers insist that if they did own a goat each they would tie it out where whoever is looking for their goats could pick it off with never a cry for the police. All of which was caused by the advent of a man on Seventh street, near Ankeny, yesterday or the day before—exact dates in goat tales are never used—followed by a nondescript goat that seemed to have a morbid desire to devour everything that came in his way—not tin cans, mark you, but the more delectable articles of diet such as oranges, bananas and apples at 5 cents a bite. Came they to a fruit stand. The goat stopped, sniffed and cantered lightly toward the orange box. Nor did he hesitate there. He dived into those oranges and began masticating them like a chit man at a Barber's union No. 41,144 picnic. The fruit stand clerk raised his hands in horror and fright and alarm and anger all at one and the same time. He screamed in accents wild and foreign. The goat's owner rushed back and endeavored to shoo the animal away, but the goat wouldn't shoo. It was not that kind of a goat. The goat-eat pulled and hauled and swore, but the goat was remaining with a good thing. Finally, in desperation, he pulled his pocketbook from his pocket, handed it to the clerk and, by hiding the box of oranges in the safe, or the basement, or some place, the goat was induced to follow the man down the street. The shopkeepers watched the animal following its master—a derisive term down the street. They saw the man pass a saloon, and they saw the goat poke its nose inside. "Looking for a bock beer sign," they said. And on and on they went—the man and the goat—the animal peering into

homes and places of business and basements and front yards and alleys. "He's sure some butter-in, all right," remarked one of the shopkeepers. And it was unanimously conceded that such was, indeed, the case.

RIVAL TOWNS CONFER ON COUNTY DIVISION

Oregon City, April 2.—The Oregon City Commercial club will tonight endeavor to convince the members of the Estacada Commercial club that the proposed division of Clackamas county into two counties would be unwise. A delegation of 40 members of the Estacada organization will come to this city in a special car, and a conference will be held immediately after the luncheon of the Live Wires. The conference was arranged at the request of the Estacada club, which is desirous of knowing how the residents of this part of the county view the proposed division. Several residents of the Estacada section declare that their part of the county has not been given a square deal in the division of the road money, and the alleged discrimination is the reason they assign for a division. The plan is to make Estacada the county seat of the new county in case the proposition to divide wins. The county officials deny emphatically that the Estacada section has been discriminated against, and on the other hand say that more money has been spent in that part of the county than has been paid by the taxpayers there for road purposes.
