

ARMY OF STRIKERS SLEEPING IN OPEN ALONG RAILROAD

4000 Men Quit Work on Canadian Northern and Are Awaiting Developments; I. W. W. Are In Charge.

Yale, B. C., April 3.—Camped on the hills, some in tents, others in shacks, and still others lying prone on the ground wrapped in their blankets with naught but the sky for a roof, or huddled in the shelter of trees, or rocks, an army of 4000 strikers, including members of the I. W. W., who, since last Friday, refused to continue work for contractors engaged in construction on the Canadian Northern railroad are lying upon their "arms," awaiting developments.

All along the line from Hope to Lytton, headquarters are being established with a central headquarters at Yale. Work of perfecting organization is going on rapidly. It is stated among I. W. W. leaders here that as soon as formal demands upon the contractors can be drawn up, they will be submitted. The men want \$3 for a nine hour day. At present the scale averages \$2.75 for a 10 hour day.

Practically the entire time of the strikers during the last two days has been consumed in organizing, in building kitchens and making provisions for a siege.

The influx of strikers to Vancouver has practically ended, only a few leaving today for the city. The majority will remain until formal demands have been made upon the contractors.

Yale is filled with strikers, but the men are quiet and orderly. In the respective headquarters the I. W. W. have established a police force of their own, comprising about 12 men to each encampment. This force is being maintained to prevent drunkenness and chances of serious quarrels.

The strikers declare they can exist for several weeks with the money on hand.

Police and I. W. W. Clash.

San Diego, Cal., April 3.—There are a number of sore heads in San Diego today as the result of a fierce clash between the police, citizens and I. W. W. on a prominent street last night.

According to the authorities, the trouble was started by the I. W. W. who saw Policeman Langford passing in citizen's clothes. They are alleged to have attacked Langford, who backed up against a wall and defended himself with his fists, having no club. Four marines from the cruiser Maryland came to his rescue and were fighting side by side with the policeman when the police reserves arrived. Jumping into the mob, they used clubs right and left, driving the I. W. W. back for a block. Chief Wilson declared today that his men had been too lenient with the I. W. W.

"If they are looking for trouble they will get it," Wilson declared.

Closing arguments in the case of Jack White, Stanley Gue and Robert Gooden, I. W. W., charged with conspiracy, will be made late today.

The reality board of San Diego has adopted resolutions pledging support to the police in "ridging" the city of the lawless element."

WOODROW WILSON WINS IN WISCONSIN; SOCIALISTS BEATEN

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nonpartisan candidates for treasurer and comptroller were elected.

Complete returns from the Fourth and Fifth congressional districts show that Wilson elected four delegates there while Senator La Follette polled two votes to President Taft's one.

The counting of the ballots for the presidential delegates is delayed because of the Socialist tickets in many of the important counties of the state.

La Follette Second in Race.

"This makes me second in the race," is what Senator La Follette is quoted as saying in a message from Washington when the result of the election, became known there. "I have received a message from my law partner saying that I carried the state by about four votes to one, and that a certain candidate was not in the race at all. The vote did not surprise me, but the ratio did. The victory is all the more gratifying because I have not made a speech in Wisconsin for four years.

The Wisconsin delegation will give me a total of 35. Watch things from now on."

Senator La Follette will leave Washington for the west this afternoon. He is due in Chicago tomorrow, and will go from there to Nebraska for a five days' tour of that state.

The name of Colonel Roosevelt was not on the Wisconsin ballot. A few voters wrote in his name.

Wilson Given 22 Delegates.

Incomplete returns at noon indicated that Wilson had secured 22 of the Democratic delegates, including four delegates-at-large. Returns from the Second and Ninth congressional districts show that two delegates from each of those districts are pledged to Speaker Clark.

Returns from the rural districts are coming in slowly, and it is doubtful if the entire vote will be counted before tomorrow.

State Senator Blaine, leader of the La Follette forces here, said today:

that Senator La Follette has carried the state by a larger plurality than ever before. Some of the districts voted four to one in his favor. Considering the fact that there was no active speaking in Wisconsin in his behalf, and that the entire campaign cost was about \$1000, the results are certainly significant."

Clark Movement in Los Angeles.

Los Angeles, April 3.—Champion Clark supporters will meet here Friday night to launch formally the Missouriian's active campaign in southern California. Headquarters for both men's and women's Clark clubs are open here today. Both organizations will participate in Friday's meeting.

Members of the Los Angeles Bryan club today abandoned their intention of placing the name of the Nebraska upon the California presidential preference primary ballot. Their action followed the receipt of a telegram from Bryan refusing to permit the use of his name, as follows:

"I cannot consent to such use of my name. I am not a candidate and am not willing to be put on the ballot. Every progressive should choose between the progressives who are candidates, and should not vote for his choice, but should see that progressives are sent as delegates."

Two Candidates in Illinois.

Chicago, April 3.—Colonel Theodore Roosevelt, candidate for the Republican presidential nomination, and Woodrow Wilson of New Jersey and candidate for the Democratic presidential nomination, will be in Illinois Saturday next in the interest of their respective candidacies, according to announcement made here today. Roosevelt, who is now on a three days' speaking tour of Ohio, Kentucky, Maryland and West Virginia, will arrive in Chicago Saturday and board a special train from this city for a tour of Illinois. He will speak at seven cities in the state that day. Monday Roosevelt will deliver at least a dozen speeches.

At Wilson headquarters it was announced today that Governor Wilson will spend Friday and Saturday in Illinois, on a speaking tour of the state. He will make an address in Chicago Saturday night.

La Follette in Second Place.

Washington, April 3.—Statements from the political bureau of President Taft here today declare that the president has 274 delegates pledged for the national Republican convention in Chicago, against 20 for Roosevelt and 10 for La Follette.

With the delegates from Wisconsin pledged to La Follette, as a result of the primaries yesterday, the Wisconsin senator justly placed Roosevelt and jumps into second place in the race. The Roosevelt bureau is claiming 62 delegates for the colonel to date and states that he will control 112 other delegates already chosen.

Militia Ordered to Cairo.

Springfield, Ill., April 3.—Cairo is being guarded today by a company of state National Guard ordered from here by Governor Deneen in response to a request from the Cairo municipal authorities. The governor ordered the militia to the flood stricken city last night.

After the breaking of the levees on the Mississippi river the residents of Cairo clamored for the troops, fearing that in the general confusion the local police would be inadequate to cope with any violence or vandalism which might result.

Blockade Finally Lifted.

Omaha, Neb., April 3.—After a delay of more than two days caused by the floods in the Mississippi river, the blockade of transcontinental traffic, due to washouts along the Platte and Elkhorn rivers, in eastern Nebraska, is lifted today.

As a result, 45 freight and passenger trains are today passing over a single track between this city and Fremont, Neb.

Situation Is Acute.

Jacksonville Workman Killed.

Medford, Ore., April 3.—While washing down a bank some 30 feet high in the construction of the Jacksonville city reservoir, Ole Erickson, age 33 years, but two weeks a resident of the United States, was buried beneath at least 100 tons of earth, receiving injuries from which he died two hours later. The accident occurred but two hours after work had begun in the morning. Erickson made an endeavor to escape, but was caught before he had made many steps. E. A. Swanson, who was working with Erickson, escaped injury by throwing himself into a hole in the side of the bank.

Suffrage Bill for Arizona.

Phoenix, Ariz., April 3.—That the house bill to submit woman suffrage to the voters of Arizona as a constitutional amendment is assured of passage was indicated by members of the committee which must report on the measure. The amendment probably will be submitted simultaneously with the recall proposal eliminated from the constitution at the request of President Taft.

WORKERS AIDED BY COMPENSATION ACT

New Washington Statute Covering Industrial Accidents Simplifies Procedure.

(Special to The Journal.)

Olympia, Wash., April 3.—The Workmen's compensation law has passed beyond the experimental stage and has become fairly grounded. April 1 saw the law in effect for six months, and the commissioners consider the success of the plan of having the state instead of the employing firm compensate the workman in the event of death or disability by accident to have amply justified the action of the legislature. There is a general compliance with the assessments by employers throughout the state, the only company employing any considerable number of men which has refused to comply with the law being the Dupont Powder company with a plant between Olympia and Tacoma. This company is listed in the extra dangerous class. The managers so far have refused to meet the demands of the commissioners. Suit has already been instituted through the attorney general's department and the company will undoubtedly be made to pay the assessments before the fund for powder works and explosives becomes entirely exhausted.

The claim agent for the compensation commission, J. F. Gillis, reports that for the six months ending March 30 the total number of accidents reported to the commission since the law became effective was 4529, of which 3672 have been disposed of. Of the completed claims there were 1819 final settlements, 85 fatal cases, 1 permanent disability deserving a pension and 110 rejected claims.

TACOMA NOMINATES PRESENT COMMISSION

Tacoma, Wash., April 3.—With less than 16,000 votes cast out of a registration of over 22,000, the figures in yesterday's election show one Socialist, A. H. Barth, and all the present commissioners nominated. The final election will be held April 15.

For long term commissioners the unofficial count stands: Commissioner Pettit, 6367; A. U. Miller, 7059; Commissioner Woods, 7740; A. H. Barth, 4416. For short term commissioner: Commissioner Gronen, 5846; Nicholas Lawson (recalled one year ago), 5664.

Controller Meads was reelected by a two to one vote over August Einhaus, Socialist. Einhaus got 5360 votes, the largest number ever received by a Socialist here.
