

USE OF LINCOLN'S NAME BY LORIMER CALLED OUTRAGE

Colonel Roosevelt Declares That Same Issues of Popular Rule Which Confronted Great Emancipator Prevail.

Colonel Roosevelt tonight declared that the use of the name of Abraham Lincoln by Senator Lorimer was an outrage upon the memory of the great emancipator.

Roosevelt declared that the issue which confronts the people today are the same as those which confronted Lincoln and that the fundamental principle of Lincoln's platform, the right of the people to rule themselves and not be ruled by a mere part of the people, is precisely the issue of today.

"It is of vital importance that the rule of the people should be exercised for social and industrial justice in a spirit of broad charity and kindness to all," he said, "but with stern insistence that privilege should be eliminated from our industrial life and should be shorn of its power in our political life."

"The individual who believed in privilege and those who distrusted the people were against Lincoln then, and they are against us now. If the people of Illinois let the bread and butter politicians and the federal officeholders and the men of the stamp of Senator Lorimer and his associates control you at the approaching primaries or master you in your government, you cannot expect to get social or industrial justice."

NONAGENARIAN IS EQUAL SUFFRAGIST

F. X. Matthieu Believer in Cause—Other Pioneers Attend Meeting.

Six men and women whose aggregate ages total more than one-half of Methuselah's 969 years, conducted the weekly forum held at the Olds, Workman & King auditorium yesterday afternoon under the auspices of the Women's Suffrage club campaign committee.

Dr. Mary Anna Thompson presided. When asked her age Mrs. Thompson modestly replied, "I am 87 years young, and growing younger all the time." At the right of the chairman sat F. X. Matthieu, who celebrated the ninety-fourth anniversary of his birth last Tuesday.

In opening the meeting Dr. Thompson told of her past experiences in the fight for equal suffrage and pointed out what she maintained is the unfairness of the circumstance which prevents her from voting in the city of Portland, though she has been a tax payer in the city for the past 50 years.

Dr. Thompson then introduced Mr. Matthieu, who asked to be excused from speaking. Dr. Esther C. Pohl expressed Mr. Matthieu's sentiments in favor of equal suffrage, as she had heard him express them at various times. The thoughts of Mr. Matthieu were summed up in the comparison that even as much as a bachelor's apartment needs a woman to give it a thorough cleaning, so does the nation need the help of the women to give the national government a good cleaning.

Mr. Myers, the next speaker, went more fully into the suffrage question and its growth, predicting the right of suffrage for Oregon women in the near future, even should they not carry their issue at the fall election. "Women have always had the right to vote," said Mr. Myers, "but an unfair social distinction has prevented them from exercising their right. I advocated equal suffrage 65 years ago, so it is not a new departure to me. Eventually the women of Oregon and all other states of the union will be given their right. In this respect, it is the history of real revolutions that there has been no turning back. It is so in this case. The women will win."

BOURNE'S CAMPAIGN COSTS HIM \$778.95

Senator Files Statement of Expenses With Secretary of Upper House.

The statement shows that in addition to \$100 for four pages in the publicity pamphlet published by the state of Oregon, Senator Bourne expended \$66 in printing and circulating petitions and having his name printed on the primary ballot, and \$778 for other purposes, making a total of \$778.95.

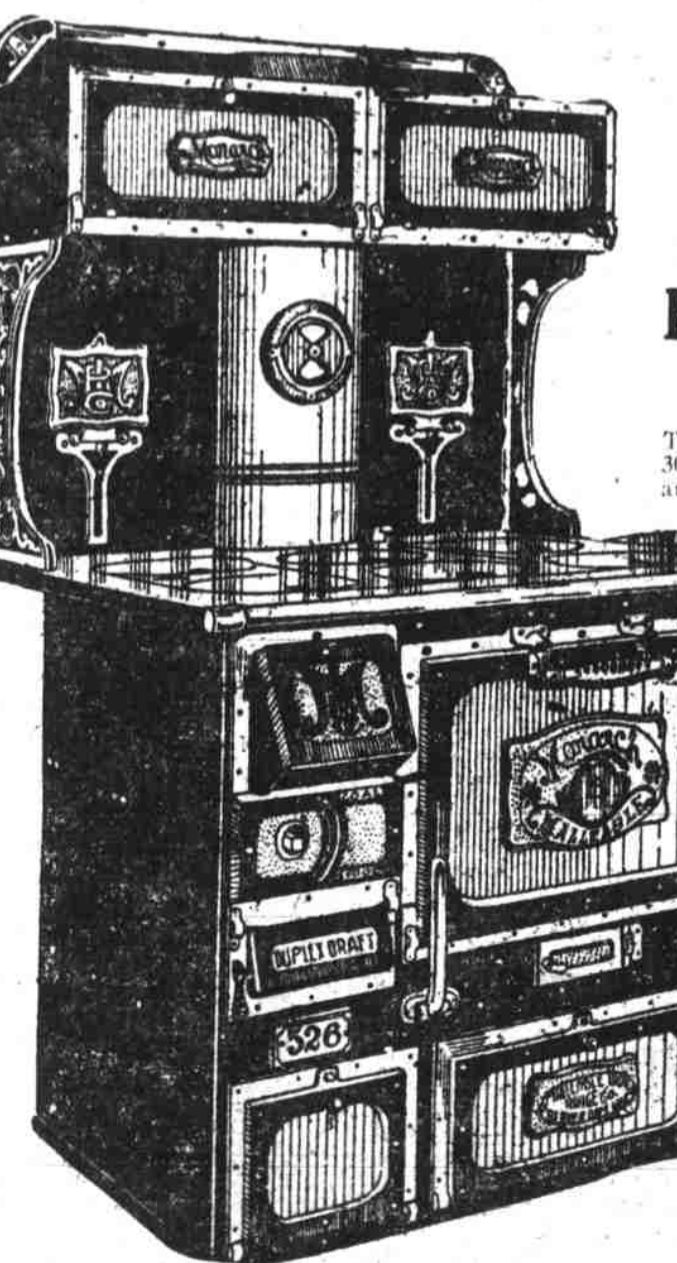
