Then, in Mechanical Hall, the departments in civil engineering, the physics laboratory, expertmental engineering and electrical laboratories, the power house, the foundry, the forge shop, the machine shop, the woodworking shop and the dairy building, the farm mechanics building, the stock judging pavillon, the poultry yards, and all concluding with the banquet served by the students of the domestic science department in Waldo hall at 6 o'clock The trip is expected to emphasize the great variety of work for fitting all who wish to learn for practical success which is carried on at Corvallis and from the college throughout the state.

PREDICTS SHORTAGE

That lumber shippers will be con-fronted with a car shortage is the opinion of Edward L. Fairbanks, traf-fic manager of the Pacific Coast Shipbers' association, who was here from Seattle yesterday. Mr. Fairbanks pre-dicts a material improvement in the demand for lumber, but believes it will difficult to make prompt deliveries because of the shortage of rolling stock.
"The railroads are hard pressed for

cars. said A.r. Fairbanks, "and the situation will not improve although thousands of freight cars are being built. The Canadian Pacific is particucrowded, lumber manufacturers at points between Seattle and Sumas having 200 cars of material ready for skipment and no cars in sight. All of s material is booked for points in anda, to Manitoba, Saskatchewan and naipeg, and the company has in vain attempted to borrow from other north-

"Rail shipments have not been as heavy this winter as they should have been under normal conditions, and this means that lumber stocks in the middle states and throughout the lumber buying districts, for that matter, are low. With comparatively few cars available it will probably mean a serious lumber hortage in places, and this will have the effect of advancing values.

"I believe that the coming summer is going to be the best the Pacific northwest lumber manufacturers have had in four years, and they are entitled to it, for certainly they have not had opportunity to count profits for a long time. Many have done well to continue opera-
