

RECALL TO SHAKE "STICK-UP" SENATORS OFF THEIR PERCHES

Progressive Ideas Doing Much
to Cure Senatorial "Big
Head": Contempt for Mere
Voter Not So Great.

Washington, April 8.—To many the failure of the senate to decide that Stephen was not entitled to his seat, and the action of the committee in reporting to the senate that Stephen was safe because it was a case of "red adjunction," brings deep disappointment and a sense of the futility of asking that a man believed to have been elected to the senate by corrupt methods be tried by a "jury of his peers."

"They don't know who will be accused next," the disgruntled citizen is likely to exclaim.

It may be unjust, but it is a fact that the usurpation of power by the courts, the contempt for constituted authorities by the highest in power as well as some of the lowest, and the indifference to the demands of the people by the men who sit on the lofty eminence where the votes of these men are counted, all seem to foster the spread of discontent and to promote the adoption of the new progressive ideas regarding government by the people.

Contempt for Popular Verdict.
Entirely regardless of the question whether Stephen and Lorimer are fit to sit in the senate, or whether they were legally placed there, the people are confronted by the spectacle of a majority of the senators showing disregard and contempt of the popular verdict. "After all," say the people, "who are these men who sit in the upper house of congress? Are they our masters, or do they sit there because we selected them to do certain work for us?" Is the laborer greater than the master? Are we the master, or is the senator?

Certainly there is a great dignity, and a great dignity, in the United States senate. But, the people ask, whence comes this great dignity? Does it not come from the fact that these men have delegated to them temporary authority to represent their respective states? How then, can they pretend to think even for a moment that they are greater than the people who sent them here?

Lesson in Humility.
The seeming arrogance of legislators and other public servants naturally led to the adoption of "progressive" ideas, including the "recall." Oregon has been prominent in the display of advanced ideas in politics. Other states are rapidly following. This fall we shall see some of these ideas put to crucial test. Already the recall has resulted in re-electing some arrogant and perhaps corrupt officials who were unwilling to listen to the demands of the public. Perhaps the lesson has been salutary. On the other hand, trial for a few years may show that in this country the initiative, referendum and recall are not feasible in actual practice. There is no better way to ascertain than by actual test.

Are Republics Grateful?
Oregon is being asked to settle another question, namely, do the people recognize faithful, effective service and are they willing to reward it?

Senator Jonathan Bourne Jr., father of many of the ideas in progressive legislation, is a candidate for reelection. He is not going back to Oregon to make a campaign, and beyond taking space in the official pamphlet which the state issues to tell voters about the candidates and the issues, he is doing practically no campaigning. There is very active opposition for his seat, and those who are watching the game are wondering whether Senator Bourne will win, or whether he will be snowed under. The old politicians look on his routine as foolhardy and as certain to lead to his retirement to private life. Senator Bourne smiles and says he can afford to try the experiment.

Tells Bourne of "Plot."
A few days ago some admirer of the Oregon senator wrote to tell him that the postoffice officials in Oregon were discriminating against him. "I see great deal of literature about other candidates," wrote this friend, "but I have yet to see any about you. I am giving you this tip because I think someone is in a conspiracy against you and that part of it is to suppress your campaign documents."

"I shall have to write to our friend," said the senator's secretary, "that we are not putting out any campaign literature, but we are glad to hear a friendly voice, nevertheless."

PLATFORM ITSELF IS NOT ENOUGH, SAYS LA FOLLETTE

In Open Letter to "Progressives of Oregon" He Sets Forth His Views; Tells of Taft's Platform of 1908.

"A platform, however strong and progressive, is not enough," says Robert M. La Follette in an open letter to the progressives of Oregon, which has been extensively mailed over the state within the last few days. The Wisconsin senator, who will be in Oregon the last of the coming week to proclaim his principles in person, proceeds to illustrate what he means by the platform pledge of the Republican party to revise the tariff.

"The platform of 1908 was a plain declaration for a revision of the tariff on the basis of the difference in cost of production," he says. "Revision in compliance with that pledge would have enormously reduced the Dingley duties, but the president elected on that platform approved the Payne-Aldrich bill, increasing the Dingley duties."

La Follette in the open letter sets forth his views on the issue of the campaign as follows:

"I believe in the initiative, referendum and recall, not only as applied to states, but also in the extension of these principles to the nation as a whole."

"The equalization of the burdens of taxation upon a property basis, through the adoption of graduated income and inheritance taxes."

"Believes in Parcel Post."

"The universal parcels post operated at cost, eliminating waste by offering a cheap and direct means of communication between the producer and the consumer."

"Government ownership of express companies and government operation of express business at actual cost to the public."

"The reasonable valuation of the physical property of railroads, justly inventoried and determined upon a sound economic basis distinguishing actual values from monopoly values derived from violations of law, and making such discriminating values the base line for determining rates. And also providing for the extension of the powers and administrative control of the Interstate Commerce commission."

"I would have the nation know how much of the \$100,000,000 capitalization was contributed by those who own the railroads, and how much by the people themselves."

"I believe in the creation of a commission with power to investigate and ascertain the illegal acts of all trusts and combinations and with power to ascertain the reasonable valuation—not the monopoly valuation—of the physical properties of the great monopolies, beginning with the railroads, and extending to the coal, oil and iron; in the creation of a tariff commission of experts clothed with real power to determine the valuation of all elements of production, costs and profits, and in the reduction of tariff rates, the asserted difference between the labor in this country and abroad. Instead of each of these government commissions investigating the same facts independently, I believe it would be practical for a single board of expert accountants, statisticians, economists, and engineers, to be empowered to get the facts, not for the confidential use of the president of the departments, but for congress and the public."

Opposed to Ship Subsidies.

"I am opposed to ship subsidies, which, once entrenched, will become another corrupting influence in our politics."

"I am opposed to further extravagance, on the advice of interested persons only, in building battleships and political navy yards, and favor an unprejudiced commission to investigate and report what is required in the way of national defense."

"I am opposed to the dollar diplomacy which has reduced our state department from its high place as a kindly intermediary of defenseless nations, into a trading outpost for Wall street interests, aiming to exploit those who should be our friends."

"I am opposed to the Aldrich currency scheme, which, under the guise of providing elasticity to our currency system and relieving monetary conditions, is in reality a means of concentration of the currency and the credits of the United States under a fifty-year franchise, into those hands which have already secured control of the banking and insurance resources of the country."

"I favor a policy of government ownership and operation of Alaskan railroads and coal mines, and of an Alaskan steamship line by way of the Pacific ports through Panama to New York."

Keep Hands Off.

"Already the interests are organized to secure the exclusive benefits to flow

from the construction of the Panama canal. In order to preserve their present high railway rates they would make the water rate by the canal pay a heavy

tax. These interests must be made to keep their powerful hands off the canal and the steamship lines as well. The people have constructed this canal.
