

UNCLE SAM TO TRY NEW ALLOTMENT

Government Takes Precautions to Prevent Speculators Getting Land.

Washington, April 10.—The belief that speculators have planned to get valuable homesteads which the government announced would be opened within a month in the third unit of the Tule Lake irrigation project in Washington state, has caused the officials to withhold the actual date of the opening. Funds have been coming on the project since December 21 last, awaiting the word to make their selection.

In order to defeat the speculators a new allotment system will be adopted. Each individual will be allowed to sign by which, farm land will be distributed. The names of those wishing to file will be placed in one box and one slip will be drawn. The lucky one will then be permitted to make a filing, and the process will be continued until the project has been filled.

Taft Carries Fifth District

The only district carried by President Taft was the fifth, Senator William E. Lutterman's stronghold.

Returned from the state primaries show that Edward F. Benson, former mayor of Chicago, leads the other Democratic gubernatorial candidates by 34,000. Governor Charles H. Deneen has been re-nominated by the Republicans by a majority of 11,000.

La Follette Polls Heavy Vote.
Senator La Follette of Wisconsin polled about 40,000 votes in the presidential primary. As he made no speech-making campaign, resorting merely to the distribution of circulars outlining his policies, La Follette's showing in the state is considered remarkable.

SAYS OREGON WILL ROLL UP A VICTORY FOR COL. ROOSEVELT

Oregon will follow in the footsteps of Illinois and cast a big vote for Theodore Roosevelt when primary day rolls around, according to the prediction of State Senator Dan Kellaker, one of the Roosevelt committee for Oregon and president of the East Side Roosevelt club.

"The result in Illinois was no surprise to the Roosevelt forces," he said, in commenting on the result this morning. "All our information, received daily by wire since the opening of our

headquarters, has indicated he would carry Illinois by a heavy vote as he did yesterday.

"From reports we have received of sentiment in Oregon, the Roosevelt majority in this state will be as heavy as in Illinois. We have made a poll from the registration list and 54 per cent of our register favor Roosevelt. The committee feels sanguine of a sweeping success in this state."

Fred W. Mulkey, head of the Roosevelt campaign in Oregon, was out of the city today, and no expression could be had from him, but at the Roosevelt headquarters there was much jubilation.

Chairman W. B. Ayer of the Taft committee gave out a brief statement, asserting the Illinois defeat to local conditions, and declaring it will not impair Taft's chances in this state. He said:

"While the result in Illinois is a disappointment, it was not unexpected, and in no way will it affect the result in other states. Local scraps and knifing were responsible for the conditions. So far as this state is concerned, it will simply have the effect of consolidating the Taft forces, and making every man of them work all the harder."

ROOSEVELT WORKERS JUBILANT OVER THE RESULT IN ILLINOIS

Word direct from the Illinois primaries came to Fred W. Mulkey, head of the Roosevelt organization in Oregon, in the form of telegrams telling of results as they were verified. A telegram from Washington, signed by Joseph M. Dixon, says:

"Illinois Republicans in state primary today utterly repudiated Taft's claim for renomination by giving Roosevelt over 100,000 majority. He will defeat Taft by about three to one in the state. Taft made no showing of strength except in the Larimer wards in the city of Chicago. Roosevelt's majority in the city of Chicago alone about 30,000. Today's repudiation of Taft by Illinois Republicans ends the Taft campaign for renomination. No sane Republican leader can longer doubt that to attempt to force his nomination means suicide for the Republican party. Roosevelt will be nominated at Chicago in June and triumphantly elected president in November."

From Chicago came a telegram signed by Edwin W. Sims, secretary, bearing this message: "Illinois primary a landslide for Roosevelt. Carried Chicago by upwards of 25,000. Illinois upwards 150,000. Has large majorities in every district, including Cannon's and McKinley's. Illinois Taft manager conceded Roosevelt victory in every district. Roosevelt will have solid delegation 88 votes from Illinois, in national convention."

This looks like the beginning of the end."

FRENCH SLEUTH CHASES TWO IRISH PLOTTERS

Vancover B. C. April 10.—M. Chauvelin of the Gars du Nord, Detective agency in Paris, is in the city on the lookout for two men, Arthur Newell and Harold Dove, who are believed to be concerned in a plot to assassinate the president of the French republic. Both men are Irish and have lived in France for a number of years and were well known members of an anarchist club in Rouen.

A warrant was issued for their arrest three months ago, following the arrest of seven notorious criminal leaders in Paris who were eventually discharged after being arrested on a charge of treason against the president. Newell and Dove were traced as far as Seattle and there all signs of them were lost. M. Chauvelin spent two weeks in Washington state and in the belief that they entered Canada, crossed the border in pursuit of the men.

PERNICIOUS ACTIVITY; CHARGE AGAINST TAFT

Pittsburg, Pa. April 10.—Charging that the administration is fostering political activity, Theodore Roosevelt made a ringing denunciation of Taft and his methods in a public address here yesterday. Colonel Roosevelt charged that the forest service was being used to advance the candidacy of the president, much against the public welfare.

In speaking of the political situation in Kentucky Colonel Roosevelt said: "Remember, we can have no good legislation unless you have honesty both in business and in politics. At this mo-

ment the most flagrant dishonesty, the most flagrant dishonesty are being perpetrated by the politicians in their effort to thwart the people's will in the state of Kentucky.

"Failure immediately to suspend the officials in question, to disavow their actions and to refuse to profit by them must make the administration accessory to the outrageous infamy set forth by the ex-chief justice of Kentucky."

Bishop O'Reilly left for the eastern cities Sunday last, on his annual three-months' collection tour, for the benefit of the poor of his diocese. The diocese and sub-diocese of the pontiff's diocese Sunday mass in Baker City, were the Rev. Fathers M. J. Hickey and M. J. Kelly. HIGHWAY BILLS TO BE CIRCULATED TOMORROW

Initiative petitions for the four highway bills of Governor West's harmony committee will be received from the printer this afternoon and commence circulation for signatures tomorrow, according to an announcement made by G. T. Ford, president of the Oregon Association for Highway Improvement, this morning. A committee from the association will present the desirability for support of the bills before the business organizations of the city at their meetings next week. Copies of the petitions will be sent to Governor West and by him forwarded to members of the state wide committee with one member for each county, except Multnomah, which has five.

Approximately 10,000 signatures are required for each bill. The list of the harmony committee includes the state highway bill, highway commissioner bill, the county building act and two constitutional amendments permitting the issuance of state bonds and defining the limitations of county bonding. The two tourist labor bills, left unchanged as produced by the state wide committee will be circulated with the harmony committee measures. A number of signatures have already been obtained for these bills.
