

OLD WATER RIGHTS TO BE ADJUDICATED

Blue Mountain Grange Petitions State Board to Survey Grande Ronde.

(Special to The Journal.)
Salem, Or., April 10.—In response to an urgent petition from Blue Mountain grange, the state board of control today decided to investigate the water rights along the Grande Ronde river, in eastern Oregon, and if found to be in the chaotic condition alleged, to begin the adjudication of rights without delay. Those who have been petitioned by the state engineer's office to make an investigation.

An irrigation began in the Grande Ronde valley in the early '80s. It is pointed out that unless the adjudication of water rights be made soon all the witnesses who knew of the beginning and the initiation of the water rights will be dead. A majority of them have already passed away.

The petition also alleges that water rights along the Grande Ronde were taken into court and carried to the supreme court of the state, the decision of which left the settlement of those rights in a more uncertain and chaotic condition than before.

Another condition, as asserted in the petition, which makes the adjudication of the water rights urgent, is the suit brought by the Island City Milling company against the city of La Grande for damages for interference with the company's water right, which suit is now said to be threatening to involve in litigation all the rights along the river.

GELLATLY, BONEBRAKE, CENTERS OF CAMPAIGN

Corvallis, Or., April 10.—A strong fight is probable in the Republican primaries for two nominations. The coveted positions are county sheriff and state representative.

Sheriff W. A. Gellatly is a candidate for reelection and he is opposed by Marion Hayden of Alesco. Both are well known in the county. The Democrats will have no candidate's name on the printed ballot, but it is rumored they will write the name of some possible candidate on the ballot at the primaries. The contest for the Republican nomination for representative is between P. O. Bonebrake, incumbent, and W. P. Lafferty. Mr. Lafferty decided only a few days ago to enter the race.

Supporters of Mr. Lafferty assert that Mr. Bonebrake should not be returned to the legislature because he introduced into the last legislature a bill authorizing an increase in the salaries of various county officials of Benton county. Mr. Bonebrake asserts he introduced the bill to meet a general complaint that county salaries are not rightly adjusted, with special reference to the school superintendent and assessor, whose salaries are each \$45.00 per month. The bill carried a special provision for a referendum to the voters of the county and will be voted on at the November election.

SOME HOOD RIVER MEAT SHOPS UNCLEAN

Hood River, Or., April 10.—At the sessions of the city council Monday evening it was voted to increase the recorder's salary to \$75 per month and the treasurer was voted a salary of \$50 per month.

An ordinance was passed providing for paying the business section of the city and it was proposed to oil the principal streets leading into the country.

A protest was filed with the council from the owners of the property that has been used by the city for a dumping ground for the past years and the city will be restrained from using this ground for this purpose.

City Health Officer Edgington addressed the council relative to the unsanitary condition of some of the city's meat markets and the health committee was instructed to take immediate steps to abate the unwholesome conditions.

Big Cold Storage Plant Begun.
Hood River, Or., April 10.—Work was begun today on the superstructure of the large chemical cold storage plant of the Davidson Fruit company at the place and when completed will be the largest fruit storage plant in the state. Indications point to a crop of apples that will total 1,200,000 boxes this year.

WOODBURN WATER PLANT WILL BE IMPROVED

Woodburn, Or., April 10.—This city has a municipal water plant, having completed the transfer of the old system during the week. The work of overhauling the plant and making extensions will be taken up at once. Already the contract for the erection of a structural steel tower, with a concrete tank, the bottom of which will be 100 feet above the surface, has been let and will be rushed to completion. A mile of water mains have been purchased to be used in making necessary extensions.

FARMERS FAVOR BERRY CULTURE IN BENTON

Corvallis, Or., April 10.—The Benton County Fruit Growers' association, organized a few weeks ago, gives promise of becoming a very successful concern. During the last three or four weeks there has been ordered by members of the association approximately 18,000 small fruit plants of various kinds. Of these the greater part are loganberries, while a variety of the red raspberry is second in popularity. Besides these plants many ordered elsewhere, and the total number of plants set out this year is believed to be close to 100,000.
