

FIRE INSURANCE SHOWS BIG TOTAL

Oregon Properties Are Carrying \$186,000,000, Not Including Marine Risks.

(From Bureau of the Journal.)
Salem, Or., April 12.—Property in the state of Oregon is carrying insurance against fire loss to the amount of \$186,000,000. This does not include marine insurance, which amounts to another \$24,000,000.
The premiums received by the insurance companies during the last year, according to a report issued today by the State Insurance Commissioner, J. W. Ferguson, amount to \$1,820,377.21. Losses incurred during the year amount to \$1,431,719.25, of which there has been paid \$1,274,354.56.
The net premium for taxation amount to \$1,229,642.21. The percentage of net income to the net premiums paid is 45.8 per cent.

GOVERNOR WEST IS PLANNING CHANGE IN PRISON CONTROL

operation of other members of the board.
In order to relieve the other two members of the state board from any embarrassment that might arise from the use of funds derived from the sale of prison made brick for the establishing of other enterprises at the prison to give employment to convicts, Governor West said he had outlined a tentative plan which would put the entire responsibility upon himself, and at the same time there would be no technical violation of law.

Contract Plan Feasible.

The plan is to enter into a contract with some one who is a friend of the state prison and Governor West's policy to operate the prison brick yard and pay 25 cents a day as provided by law, for each convict employed, with the agreement that he shall sell brick to the state, for its institutions at \$5 per thousand and that he will give to the state, for the purpose of establishing and operating certain enterprises at the state prison, all profits he receives over and above the cost of the brick.
"This plan will be as satisfactory as the old plan," said Governor West, "because it forces me to take the matter entirely out of the hands of the board, but it will be the means of accomplishing what we have accomplished and without the necessity of having to answer questions as to the use of funds. It will do until we can get a law enacted which will provide for the handling of state institutions as they ought to be handled. This contract would only be in effect long enough for us to get funds to start the other enterprises."

Key Does Not Like Talk.

State Treasurer Thomas Kay, a member of the state board, said he thought Governor West was taking the right position when he announced himself as being in favor of placing the control of the penitentiary on the same basis as other state institutions.
"We have discussed plans of cooperation among the state institutions many times in board meetings," said Mr. Kay, "and all of us agree a law should be enacted permitting it. So far as these interviews are concerned, which the governor has been giving out concerning his attitude toward other members of the board, I think he ought to wait until he has talked the matter over with the board. He has not talked them over with me, nor with Mr. O'cott, so far as I know, and he is putting us in an unpleasant light."

\$400,000 LOSS BY FIRE IN HEART OF OMAHA

RUSH OF COLONISTS TO WEST CONTINUES

Assistant General Passenger Agent A. D. Charlton of the Northern Pacific this morning received a telegram from General Passenger Agent A. M. Cleland at St. Paul, stating that there has been a heavy rush of colonists to the western states during the past week and that this rush will continue until the end of the colonist travel period, next Monday.

The spring colonist travel westward has not been quite so heavy as last year, for various reasons, principal of which has been the cold weather in the middle states until the past few days. In all parts of the middle states the snow has been lying deep until recently, and it is said to have kept many from taking advantage of the reduced rates. These rates will go into effect again in the fall, however, when it is believed many who contemplated coming west this spring will make the trip.

It is reported that most of the people who came west this spring came with the intention of buying land and were prepared to make investments.

MINE CONFEREES AS FAR APART AS EVER BEFORE

Philadelphia, April 13.—President White of the United Mineworkers of America, said today that so far none of the miners' demands had been granted, either wholly or in part and that the conferees are as far apart as ever. The conferees between the operators and the men's representatives continued throughout the morning and at noon were adjourned until Monday.

SUSPECTED OF TRYING TO ASSASSINATE TAFT

Washington, April 13.—Suspected of an intention to assassinate President Taft, a man giving the name of Michael Taft, was arrested at the White House today after he had twice forced his way into the private parlors. A clasp knife in his pocket was his only weapon.

Questioned, the man said he is a German subject who had vainly asked the German ambassador for a letter of introduction to President Taft. On reaching the White House he rushed up the steps and past the doorkeeper. Ejected, he again repeated the performance. He was then arrested.

Winter is 35 years old, unmarried and poorly dressed. He declared he meant no harm to the president, but refused to tell what he wanted to talk about to the executive. He was taken to the Washington asylum, where he was pronounced harmless.

Later the German embassy stated that no one answering Winter's description had been there.

FOREIGN GIRL SAVED FROM MARRIAGE PLOT

Los Angeles, Cal., April 13.—Twelve hours after her arrival from Dalmatia, Mary Copie, a pretty girl of 18, is under the protection of the humane society, following her rescue from the home of Tony Rasch, whose unwilling bride, it is alleged, she was about to become.

The girl was met at the railway station by Mrs. Luce Ravitz, who is said to be her godmother, and taken to the Rasch home, instead of that of relatives, to which she believed she was going. She found a celebration in full swing.

The girl's relatives notified the police, who rescued her from the wedding feast. It is alleged the Rasch woman sent her money to come to America. The case has been turned over to the federal authorities.

HOOD RIVER CITIZENS OPPOSE BOND ISSUE

Hood River, Or., April 13.—Since the special meeting of the city council Wednesday evening, held for the purpose of passing the ordinance providing for the amending of the city charter by an initiative vote empowering the city to incur an indebtedness of \$50,000, which is \$45,000 in advance of the present charter provision, many of the citizens are making serious objections to the proposed change because the council has not indicated where the money is to be spent. It is rumored on the streets that the money will be used for the purchase of the water plant from the Pacific Power & Light company and others state that it is the intention to take over the Hydro-Electric company's light plant. It seems that the biggest city scrap is scheduled to be held in the ballot box when the matter comes to a vote. The measure to amend the charter will likely go down to defeat.

Federal Building Wanted.

Hood River, Or., April 13.—Hood River has aspirations to get a federal building in the near future. The post-office building is out of date and the city is the business center of the county. Hood River's citizens in this direction have turned the tide of votes in the coming primaries toward W. R. Ellis for representative in congress. He obtained for eastern Oregon three federal buildings during his term of office.

Funeral of Isaac Anderson.

Forest Grove, Or., April 13.—The funeral of Isaac R. Anderson, who died at his home near Dillay, Wednesday night, was held today at the Dillay Methodist church, Rev. Jones officiating, with burial in Forest View cemetery. Mr. Anderson was a native of Canada and was 75 years of age. He came to Washington county from Washington state two years ago. His widow and a son survive.

Columbia River Lights.

The reporter dropped the receiver and fled.

COLLEGE STUDENTS FILL GOOD POSITIONS

Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis, Or., April 13.—Seniors and short course students from Oregon Agricultural college are called for to fill all sorts of positions, as is indicated by the announcement this week of a number of appointments. Walter E. Morris, who came here four years ago from Pennsylvania, has been made instructor in commercial branches in the Marshall field high school for next year. He is senior class orator this year and business manager of the new Commerce Pharmacy quarterly, as well as a prominent debater and orator.

Howard Chapin, Medford, who was in this year's short course, has gone to take charge of the fruit ranch in Kings Valley owned by Mr. Howard of Aberdeen, N. D., succeeding Otto Elmer, who returns to government service, continuing his pre-college investigations in the fruit districts of Oregon and Washington.

F. H. Getchell, Corvallis, is an orchard inspector for the Canadian government's department of agriculture, and James French, also of Corvallis, is on the Allen-Allen orchard tract at Hood River. Both were at the past two winter short courses and have had some regular work in the college.

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ASTORIA PASSENGER ENTERS OPEN SWITCH AND STRIKES FREIGHT

E. M. Fleischner, Wm. Gadsby, Frank Dooly and Other Passengers Are Shaken Up.

Rainier, Or., April 13.—An open switch, said to have been left by a brakeman, permitted the westbound Astoria & Columbia River railroad passenger train from Portland to run into the rear of a freight train at Charlton station, near Nehalem Junction, at 3:30 this morning. The engine of the passenger and the caboose of the freight were smashed, the passenger train had a shattering disintegration and several passengers were severely shaken up.

The freight engine was unhooked and proceeded soon after with the passenger to Astoria. Nehalem Junction is a short distance south of Goble.

NO ROTATION OF NAMES ON BALLOT IN MARION

Salem, Or., April 13.—There are 12 candidates for representative, on the Republican ticket in Marion county, with five to nominate, and County Clerk Allen says he has printed the ballots without rotating the names.

"When I was ready to have the ballots printed," he said, "I telephoned the attorney general's office and asked for an opinion as to whether the names of the legislative candidates should be rotated to give an opinion at that time, so I took the position that the law did not require rotation unless there were five candidates for each place, or 25 or more candidates for the five legislative positions."

Attorney General Crawford has ruled that where there are more than five candidates for legislative office, regardless of the number to be elected, the names must be rotated.

YAMHILL COUNTY REGISTRATION LARGER THAN EVER KNOWN

McMinnville, Or., April 13.—The registration for Yamhill county is the largest ever known, there being 3301 voters registered as compared with 2465 before the census two years ago, showing a gain of 836. Of the 3301 voters 2075 are Republicans, 507 Democrats, 180 Prohibitionists, 165 Socialists and the balance scattering.

With two or three exceptions there is not much opposition or political ambition manifest for the county and district offices. For county clerk, assessor, coroner and school superintendent the only candidate is the present incumbent. The race for county surveyor promises to be the hardest, the aspirants being H. W. Herring, incumbent, and R. W. Jones, city engineer. Three men want the sheriff's office, being Sheriff Henderson, Harvey Neal, formerly chief of police of McMinnville, and Harry Stott of Yamhill. For recorder one man is on each ticket. Roy Graves is candidate for re-election as representative but there is no candidate on either ticket for the other place. Neither is there any candidate on either ticket for representative of Tillamook and Yamhill counties.
